- * I do question the effectiveness of the Internet courses and would urge you to gravitate toward offering as many of these courses as live courses as possible. This may just be a personal preference and I'm sure you have data to prove the value of Internet courses, but I've not found to be very useful.
- * The objective focusing on competency in extensive applied research in public attitudes and behaviors is good.
- * Offering a course on science writing is excellent! I would consider requiring this course, or strongly suggesting it, for students in the health care/life sciences track along with a health policy course.
