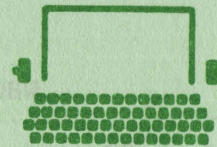

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TWELFTH COMMENCEMENT SET

Thousands of students, faculty and staff members and their families will attend IUPUI's 12th annual commencement ceremony next Sunday (May 10) at 3 p.m. in the Indiana Convention-Exposition Center. This year 3,507 degree candidates are expected to earn I.U. or Purdue degrees, depending on their area of study. The 1981 commencement will bring to more than 35,000 the number of students who have been graduated from IUPUI since its first commencement in 1970.

Conferring degrees from the 15 I.U. or Purdue schools or divisions at IUPUI will be I.U. President John W. Ryan, and Purdue President Arthur G. Hansen. Following formal ceremonies, students and their families will be honored with separate parties and ceremonies, sponsored by the school from which they received their degree.

Commencement participants should arrive in their designated areas at the Convention Center no later than 2 p.m. Only those in academic attire will be admitted to the robing and procession area.

Expected to earn degrees in 1981 are 318 M.D.'s from the School of Medicine, 544 from the School of Nursing, approximately 130 dentists and 36 dental hygienists from the School of Dentistry, 13 from the Graduate School, 511 from the School of Education, 470 from the School of Engineering and Technology, more than 200 from the School of Law, and 155 from the School of Science.

The Division of Allied Health Sciences lists 255 graduates, the School of Business 293, Continuing Studies 47, the Herron School of Art 66, the School of Liberal Arts 139, the School of Public and Environmental Affairs 112. Twenty-five degree candidates are in the School of Physical Education, and 179 in the School of Social Work.

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HONORS AND ACCOLADES

Philip W. Woodbury, School of Medicine senior, was one of six I.U. graduate students named recipients of John H. Edwards Fellowships for 1981. The students are nominated

by the deans of the I.U. schools and the directors of the graduate divisions, and the winners are selected by a university-wide committee.

Gerald L. Bepko, associate dean of academic and administrative affairs at the I.U. School of Law-Indianapolis, will give a lecture on "Truth in Lending Simplification" to members of the Ohio Bar Association Saturday. The lecture is part of a one-day continuing legal education conference sponsored by the Ohio State College of Law.

Dr. Ann Marriner, associate dean of the baccalaureate program, School of Nursing, presented a paper about "Creative Use of Conflict for Organizational Effectiveness" at the National Conference on Nursing Administration Research in Seattle, Washington, on April 20.

Jeffrey A. Kisling, Department of Respiratory Therapy at Riley Hospital, has been invited to present a paper "Computers and Neonatal Respiratory Therapy Education" at the First International Symposium on computers in Perinatal Medicine in Cleveland, Ohio, on May 20.

Over 300 applications for the three-year Fellowships, which may provide support of up to \$30,000 to each individual, were received by the Battle Creek, Michigan Foundation. It is designed to increase individuals' leadership potential in order to deal more creatively and effectively with society's problems. Class II of the Fellowship Program is expected to take an international approach to dealing with human issues.

Dr. H. Glenn Bohlen, assistant professor of physiology, recently received the Lampport Award for meritorious and original research in cardiovascular physiology by a young investigator. The award was made by the Circulation Section of the American Physiological Society at the meetings of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology held at Atlanta, Ga., April 12-17.

David A. Funk, professor of law, has an article, "Legal Futurology: The Field and Its Literature," published in the current issue of the Law Library Journal.

Dr. Shirley Karlson, associate professor, School of Nursing, presented a paper on "Environmental Support, Autonomy and the Well-Being of Family Member Caregivers," at the 38th Annual Scientific Meeting of the American Geriatrics Society in Boston, Mass., last week. This is a study conducted by Dr. Karlson and Dr. Sue Fuller during their year in Denver as a Robert Wood Johnson Nurse-Faculty Fellow in Primary Health Care. She was one of only two nurses presenting papers at the three-day meeting.

Dr. Robert G. Lehnen, professor of public and environmental affairs, recently was a guest lecturer at the spring seminar of the Central Archive of the University of Cologne, Germany. The seminar, "The Analysis of Non-Metric Data", dealt with applied statistical analysis for various programs and social surveys. A class of 30 professionals from through Germany attended for three weeks.

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
