## BUSINESS SCHOOL EXPANDS, DEVELOPS OPERATIONS IN CITY

The Indiana University School of Business has begun a major program of development and expansion in Indianapolis, university officials told the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce last week.

In a joint meeting of the chamber's board of directors and education committee at the Columbia Club, I.U. Dean of Business Schuyler F. Otteson reported these major developments:

- -- The Indiana General Assembly recommended to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education that high priority be given to plans for a new Indianapolis campus classroom building which would provide space for new and expanded business programs.
- -- Dr. Arthur M. Weimer, former dean of the school and a recognized national authority on finance, will move from Bloomington and assume teaching and program development responsibilities in Indianapolis.
- -- Dean Otteson will maintain offices in Indianapolis and Bloomington and be administratively responsible to the university's vice-president for Indianapolis.
- -- Dr. Howard G. Schaller, associate dean of the school and former dean of the Tulane University School of Business Administration, will be responsible for the school's Indianapolis programs and continue as the school's chief academic officer.
- -- The appointments of five "exceptionally qualified" professors to the school's full-time faculty in Indianapolis will soon be announced. The participation of faculty from Bloomington in the graduate and undergraduate programs in Indianapolis will continue and accelerate.
- -- The school's faculty and administrative offices in Indianapolis will be moved from the 38th Street Campus to the Union Building on the main campus to be near students, the faculties of other schools, and the major IUPUI computer and library facilities.

Dean Otteson said these developments have begun and will continue under the I.U. academic reorganization program. The School of Business phase of the reorganization, approved by the I.U. board of trustees last November, includes provision that the school will serve the Indianapolis and Bloomington campuses with a single, unified faculty.

Dr. Otteson said the reorganization and the steps taken to implement the plan recognize the university's responsibilities to expand existing programs and to develop new programs in business education, research, and public service for Indianapolis and Central Indiana.

More than 1,000 of the 18,000 students enrolled in Indianapolis are working toward bachelor degrees in business and an additional 350 are working toward advanced degrees. The school's graduate courses are also important for students in the Indianapolis Law School and in the School of Medicine's health care administration programs.

The I.U. School of Business is ranked among the top dozen American business schools.
