CLAY COURT CHAMPIONSHIPS COMING

Two of America's teen tennis sensations -- Andrea Jaeger and Kathy Rinaldi -- will be competing in the 72nd Annual U.S. Open Clay Court Championships, according to Tournament Director, Stan Malless.

Miss Jaeger, a 16-year-old from Lincolnshire, Ill., was runnerup here last year and is currently ranked among the top five women in the world. The 14-year-old Miss Rinaldi, from Jenson Beach, Fla., made history recently when she became the youngest player ever to win a match at Wimbledon.

The tournament, which will begin August 3, is held at the Indianapolis Sports Center and annually attracts world class tennis players. Last year's singles champions were recent Wimbledon titlist Chris Evert Lloyd, who has won in Indianapolis six times, and Argentina's Jose-Luis Clerc. Clerc's victory broke a seven-year string of titles by Jimmy Connors and Manuel Orantes of Spain.

Tickets are on sale from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Sports Center, 725 West New York Street. Qualifying matches are scheduled to begin on Friday, July 31, and the tournament will culminate with the finals slated for Sunday, Aug. 9. For further information call 637-4788.
