Indiana University School of Medicine, in response to President Donald Trump's Jan. 27 executive order restricting entry into the U.S. by people from seven nations, has

reached out to students who could be directly impacted by the order. Medical Student Education also has provided a list of resources for learners on all campuses.

"We want to ensure all of our medical students, residents, fellows, faculty and staff who may be impacted know that IU School of Medicine remains an inclusive and welcoming environment. We want to provide whatever support we can to ensure our learners and colleagues know how much we value them as members of our community," said Dean Jay L. Hess, MD, PhD, MHSA, vice president for university clinical affairs.

Regional campus tour stops in Terre Haute Feb. 17

IU School of Medicine's regional campus tour series continues this month with a visit to the Terre Haute campus on Friday, Feb. 17. The tours are designed to enhance how IU School of Medicine operates as one school. Department chairs, clerkship directors and coordinators, and associate and assistant deans from Medical Student Education are visiting all nine campuses on the Medical Adventures Soaring to new Heights (MASH) bus tour. Dean Jay Hess and other executive and associate deans are also participating.

As part of the daylong gatherings, faculty are discussing best practices, troubleshooting issues and meeting with students to share advice about career choices. Leadership from local health care affiliates that host clerkship rotations also attend.

Visits to the Fort Wayne, West Lafayette, Northwest-Gary and Bloomington campuses were conducted in January and late last year. Remaining campus visits for this academic year will occur by late March.

Research News

Department of Surgery receives grant to study acute radiation exposure

Steven Miller, PhD, associate professor of surgery, and Joseph Unthank, PhD, professor of surgery and physiology, in collaboration with Christie Orschell, PhD, professor of medicine, received a one-year Research Support Funds Grant from IUPUI in the amount of \$35,000. The project funded through this grant, "Role of Abnormal Iron Metabolism in the Development of Delayed Effects of Acute Radiation Exposure," aims to identify mechanisms regulating the onset of delayed effects of acute radiation exposure, which is characterized by multi-organ dysfunction and pathology.

Six faculty to participate in advanced scholars program

The IU School of Medicine Division of General Internal Medicine and Geriatrics has selected its first cohort of six faculty scholars to participate in the division's new advanced scholars program.

Lyle Fettig, MD; Jennifer Hur, MD; Areeba Kara, MD, MS, FACP; Emily Machogu, MD; Amy Munchhof, MD, PhD; and Shilpee Sinha, MD, FACP, will participate in the Advanced Scholarship Program for Internists in Research and Education (ASPIRE), a one-year award that provides protected time and senior mentorship for each scholar to develop and conduct a project that fosters their professional development.

ASPIRE's long-term goal is to improve medical care and advance the academic mission of the Division of General Internal Medicine and Geriatrics and its role in the Department of Medicine.

Two pilot funding opportunities are available for awards up to \$100,000 each to support breast cancer research investigators. The awards are funded by the Vera Bradley Foundation for Breast Cancer and the Indiana University Melvin and Bren Simon Cancer Center.

Historical photo display highlights FDR's visit to Riley Hospital for Children

The Riley Hospital Historic Preservation Committee (RHPC), in partnership with the Riley Children's Foundation and the IUPUI University Library Special Collections and Archives, is showcasing historical photos from President Franklin D. Roosevelt's Sept. 5, 1936, visit to Indianapolis.

The photos, which show President Roosevelt's visit to Riley Hospital for Children, are on display in the lobby of the hospital's Ruth Lilly Learning Center and will be available for viewing through June.

This is the first historical photo display to be presented by the RHPC; another display is planned for the second half of 2017. The RHPC celebrates and preserves the history of Riley Hospital for Children at IU Health, which marks its centennial year in 2024.

Transgender Health Conference is March 10

Training will be done by knowledgeable practitioners who are currently providing health care to the transgender population in Indianapolis, including gender-affirming hormones, surgery, mental health care, speech therapy, medical nutrition, HIV prevention and legal services.

Registration on March 10 begins at 7 am with a light breakfast; conference programing begins at 7:30 am. Pre-registration is required, but there is no cost to attend. This conference qualifies for Continuing Medical Education credit.


