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IUPUI announces new Signature Center Awards

Three of the 10 proposals selected for funding in the second round of the Signature Centers Initiative at IUPUI were submitted by IUSM faculty. The award provides \$150,000 in funding over a three-year period.

"The 10 selected proposals are the result of an elaborate evaluation process involving the school deans

and two independent campus committees - the IUPUI Council of Associate Deans for Research and the IUPUI Research Committee," said Executive Vice Chancellor Uday Sukhatme.

There were 54 proposals in all and the quality of proposals received was very high. It was a difficult job to select which proposals would be funded, he noted.

The Signature Centers Initiative is a cornerstone of IUPUI's Academic Plan, Sukhatme said. "It clearly highlights the importance of the research component of the campus mission, and is a significant investment in the drive to further raise IUPUI's research agenda and academic strength. Most of the centers funded last year have shown significant successes already, and I am confident that the new centers funded this year will be equally productive!"

The IUSM proposals selected as IUPUI Signature Centers and a description:

The Center for Atopic Dermatitis will bring together a collaborative team of scientists and clinicians to develop an integrated approach to research, education and care of patients with chronic inflammatory skin diseases. The objective of the center is to create a clinic which will specialize in the care of patients, facilitate research, and coordinate clinical trials of new treatments for patients with atopic skin diseases. Principal Investigator: Jeffrey Travers, MD, PhD, Kampen-Norins Professor and chair of dermatology and professor of pharmacology and toxicology

The Institute for Intrinsically Disordered Proteins is dedicated to understanding the role of protein structure in disease. While an ordered protein structure is believed to be important to understanding protein function, cancer and neurodegenerative disease may be linked to the function of proteins with relatively greater intrinsic disorder. The Center will utilize both experiments and novel computational tools to understand the structure and function of disordered proteins in human disease, in order to accelerate the process of discovery of disease-fighting drugs. Principal Investigator: Vladimir Uversky, PhD, DSc, senior research professor of biochemistry and molecular biology

The Vascular and Cardiac Center for Adult Stem Cell Therapy will conduct multidisciplinary research aimed at repairing and enhancing the function of cardiovascular tissues. Translation of adult stem cell research findings to diseases of the cardiac and vascular systems will allow researchers in this center to explore novel approaches to repairing cardiac and vascular damage and improving the function of the vascular system. The unique collaborative expertise of both basic and clinical scientists gathered together in this center will allow the rapid translation of advances in adult stem cell research to clinical trials of new therapies. Principal Investigator: Keith March, MD, PhD, Cryptic Masons Professor of Vascular Biology and Medicine, professor of medicine and director of the Indiana Center for Vascular Biology and Medicine.

Reach Out and Read—OMSL literacy project

The mission of Reach Out and Read (ROAR) is to make early literacy promotion a standard part of pediatric care so children grow up with books and a love of reading. In Indiana, the program is conducted in more than 125 clinics and is supported by physicians, nurses and volunteers.

On the IUSM campus, the Office of Medical Service Learning (OMSL) sponsors medical students who volunteer their time to read to children as they come with their parents for clinic visits. Students both demonstrate interactive reading skills to parents and show how reading can be fun to kids in pediatric waiting rooms and emergency rooms. After each session, children get to take a book home, and more than 185,000 books a year are distributed in Indiana. Medical students volunteer two to four times per month during the school year.

ROAR volunteer Rachel Smith explained why she thinks the program is valuable and why she participates. "Reading at the Wishard primary care center is often the highlight of my week. Kids in a waiting room can be a pretty captive audience, and whether a child is not feeling very well, is super shy, or just rambunctious, it's fun to watch him or her get drawn into the story. It's also great to see the sense of accomplishment in beginning readers when they finish a page or in kids for whom English is a second language when they learn a new word."

According to Victor Njoku, ROAR co-chair and volunteer, it's important that the health-care system play a role in developing the minds of kids, and medical students benefit from this project because it reminds them of why they chose to go into medicine—they feel this is a wonderful opportunity to give back to the community.

The Clinical Investigator Training Enhancement Program, a clinical research training program for physicians, nurses, dentists, doctoral and postdoctoral scientists, is accepting applicants.

Winners were selected by a committee convened by Mayor Ballard and were based on nominations submitted by businesses and organizations and meetings held with nominees' representatives.

Yan Xu, PhD, professor of OB/GYN, has accepted an invitation to serve a four-year term as a member of the Molecular and Integrative Signal Transduction Study Section, Center for Scientific Review of the NIH, beginning July1. Members are selected on the basis of their demonstrated competence and achievement in their scientific discipline.

This is a notable shift away from the old model, in which academic medical centers with strict ethical protocols managed the majority of Phase One trials. Dr. Elliott is professor in the Center for Bioethics at the University of Minnesota .

Also, two volunteers for Phase One trials who call themselves "guinea pigs" share their experiences of being in a trial.
