EYE BANK MONTH OBSERVED

Indianapolis clubs have had displays at Lafayette Square and Washington Square. They will be at Glendale Shopping Center and Greenwood Park Mall this next weekend (March 18-20). Dennis Price, 3830 Ferguson Road, is chairman of the Marion County Eye Collection Center. A total of 83 collection centers are operated by the clubs around the state.

Although it is a year-around program, this month Hoosiers will have a special opportunity to help the Indiana Lions' program of securing eye tissue for use in transplantation, research into the diseases of the eyes, and for the teaching of future ophthalmologists. The Indiana Lions Eye Bank, established in 1958, is recognized nationally as a leader among the accredited eye banks in operation in the United States. Lions Clubs not only provide the funding necessary for the continued success of the eye bank, but also provide the necessary manpower to see that the eyes are collected at the local hospitals and delivered immediately to the Indianapolis facility for processing.

IN MEMORIAM

The IUPUI family was saddened to learn of the death Saturday (March 5) of Melvyn (Mel) J. Garland, athletic director and head men's basketball coach. Garland, 40 years old, was stricken with leukemia a little over a year ago.

"His family, his friends and this university have lost a courageous man, an exemplary athlete and true leader. Mel's life was much too short but all of us can be inspired by his exceptional talents and, in the last few months, his determination and bravery in adversity," said Vice President Glenn W. Irwin, Jr.

Graduated from Arsenal Technical High School in 1960 with All-Star, All-State, and Indianapolis Athlete of the Year honors, Garland earned All-Big Ten honors in basketball and baseball at Purdue for three years. He was voted Purdue's Most Valuable Player in basketball during his junior year, and during his senior year he was the Big Ten Medal winner for outstanding athletic and academic achievement. Also in 1964, he was a District All-American baseball player. He taught and coached at Greenfield Central High School, Indiana State University, and Evansville Harrison High School before taking over as head coach of the Metros in 1979, turning around a losing program.

Services were held Tuesday (March 8) at Northminster Presbyterian Church. The family has asked that memorial contributions be made to the I.U. Foundation for the Mel Garland Memorial Fund to benefit IUPUI athletes and physical education students, or to the Leukemia Society of America.
