SERVICES HELD FOR DEAN MATTISON

Services for Donald M. Mattison, dean emeritus of the Herron School of Art and nationally recognized Indiana artist, were held Wednesday at Flanner and Buchanan Fall Creek Mortuary. Mr. Mattison, 69, died Monday in Methodist Hospital after a long illness.

A native of Beloit, Wisconsin, Mr. Mattison came to Indianapolis in 1933 as head of the art school. He served in that capacity until his retirement in 1970 and saw Herron grow into an outstanding art school where this year more than 500 students have attended classes and worked toward degrees in printmaking, painting, sculpture, visual education and art education.

Mr. Mattison was an accomplished painter as well as a skilled administrator. His works have been exhibited at the Metropolitan Museum of Art and National Academy of Design, both in New York City; the Corcoran Galleries in Washington; Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, Indianapolis Museum of Art, Tarkington Library at Princeton University, Chicago Art Institute and at Yale University.

In recent years, Mr. Mattison turned to portraiture. Among his subjects were United States Supreme Court Justices Thurgood Marshall and Shermon Minton, former Indiana Governors Paul V. McNutt and Harold W. Handley and author Booth Tarkington.

Mr. Mattison was graduated from Yale University in 1928, winning a Prix de Rome in painting during his senior year. He studied three years as a fellow of the American Academy at Rome, and then several years at Columbia University, New York University and the New York School of Design.

He was a consistent prizewinner at annual exhibits of the Indiana Artists Association, the Hoosier Salon and the Indiana State Fair.

He was a member of the National Association of Schools of Design, Midwest College Art Conference and College Art Association of America.

Survivors include his widow Mrs. Mary Mattison; daughter, Mrs. Weld Coxe of Philadelphia; stepdaughter, Mrs. Marianne Ullyott of St. Paul, Minn., and Sisters Dorothy M. Spaugh and Ruth M. Eaton.

Memorial contributions may be made to the Donald M. Mattison Scholarship Fund at Herron School of Art.

WHITE COAT COUNT

A mid-July count of residents and interns showed that 478 of them were training in the Indiana University Hospitals under the direction of the School of Medicine, according to Dr. A. David McKinley, assistant dean in charge of the Office of House Staff Affairs.

Hospitals included in the tabulation include the Veterans Administration, LaRue Carter, Marion County General, Riley and University.

Of the total 456 are M.D.s. The other 22 are divided into 12 dentists, three chaplains, three psychologists and four pharmacists.

In 1970 there were 332 residents and interns -- 315 M.D.s, four chaplains, nine dentists, nine dentists, three psychologists and one pharmacist.

No one factor has caused the increase, said Dr. George T. Lukemeyer, executive associate dean of the medical school. Some house staffers were appointed independently by participating hospitals in 1970, so an increase would be expected when they all are placed under the School of Medicine.

Also, over-all expansion of the medical school and some of its specialty departments, efforts by the school to make the positions more attractive, completion and use of new hospital facilities and changes in Indianapolis itself all have a bearing on the increase. The result is more efficient service and a shorter average stay per patient in the Medical Center hospitals.
