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CAMPUS FIRE EXTINGUISHING DEMONSTRATIONS ARE SCHEDULED

The IUPUI Department of Fire Prevention and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration have scheduled outside fire extinguishing demonstrations at several campus locations from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sept. 14 through 18.

These demonstrations will be conducted by a member of the Indianapolis Fire Department Fire Prevention Bureau to give university personnel the opportunity to learn the proper use of fire extinguishers to put out fires. The demonstrations will also show the consequences of using the wrong type of extinguisher on a fire and will address HOME FIRE SAFETY as well.

Being prepared to react to a fire emergency properly and effectively is essential to the success of the IUPUI fire safety program.

VISITING PROFESSOR NAMED

Indianapolis businessman Thomas W. Binford has been appointed visiting professor of business administration at Indiana University. He will teach classes at both IUPUI and Bloomington beginning this fall, according to Schuyler F. Otteson, dean of the I.U. School of Business.

Binford is former chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Indiana National Bank and its parent corporation, Indiana National Corporation. He also is a director of several other companies. He has served as chief steward of the Indianapolis 500 Mile Race since 1974, is a director and former president of the United States Auto Club and is active in several national and international racing organizations.

"We are delighted that this leader of the Indiana business community will share his experience and expertise with our students and assist us in working with the Indiana business community," Dean Otteson said. "We believe his contribution to the school will be unique because of the widely varied nature of his entrepreneurial and management activities, ranging from banking and finance to manufacturing to professional sports."
