

SCHOLARS HONORED

Area high school scholars and above-average students at IUPUI will be special guests Friday at a program celebrating the first anniversary of IUPUI's new Honors Program for "exceptional students" to be held from 9 a.m. to noon at the School of Nursing.

Members and sponsors of several Indianapolis high school chapters of the National Honor Society, as well as high school guidance counselors have been invited to attend the half-day seminar according to Dr. Donna Dial, founder and director of the program.

Dr. Glenn W. Irwin Jr., I.U. vice-president, will welcome students and a panel of experts who will discuss the program. Special focus will be on foreign study for honors students, which next year includes a session in Italy. Students also will learn about IUPUI's H-option, which permits above average students to expand and develop regular courses into honors courses that earn special credits.

Professional and graduate school faculty members will explain honors programs in their areas, and staff representatives from the Offices of Financial Aids and Admissions will discuss grant and loan opportunities and enrollment procedures. For more information, call Ext. 2660.

THANKS TO YOU

With 17 of its 32 units topping their goals, IUPUI ended its 1980 United Way campaign by collecting \$104,646 to benefit agencies in the Greater Indianapolis area.

"The results were fantastic," Chairman Ken Beckley said. "Our \$100,255 goal was the highest we've had here and the number of persons who gave cash or pledged contributions through payroll deduction (2,644) also set campus records. We attribute much of the success to 32 fellow employees who were coordinators for their schools, division, or administrative units. While our campaign has ended, we anticipate another \$3,000 will be contributed by the end of the year."

Dr. Charles Fisch, Distinguished Professor of Medicine and director of the Krannert Institute of Cardiology, will give the prestigious Lewis A. Conner Memorial Lecture, a keynote address, on Monday at the annual meeting of the American Heart Association in Miami, Fla., an unusually high distinction.

<u>Twenty-one faculty members</u> of the Department of Radiology and some other departments of the Indiana University School of Medicine have collaborated on seven papers to be presented this week (Nov. 16-21) at the annual scientific meeting of the Radiological Society of North America in Dallas, Texas. The largest scientific radiological society in the United States, the RSNA annually draws about 6,000 physicians and has a total registration of more than 15,000.
