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THREE DIRECTORS NAMED BY BOARD

Beverly E. Hill was named director of the Medical Educational Resources Program (MERP) in the I.U. School of Medicine, Robert B. Harris was approved as director of the Center for Economic Education in the I.U. School of Liberal Arts, and Judith L. Gersting was named acting chairman of the new Department of Computer and Information Science in the Purdue School of Science, all at IUPUI, by the I.U. board of trustees meeting in Bloomington Aug. 5.

Hill was selected after a three-year search for a successor to the late Elmer Friman. She comes to MERP from the University of Southern California where she has been director of biocommunications for five years for the USC School of Pharmacy. She is active in the Health Sciences Communication Association, a national organization from which she has won top awards. Hill received her bachelor's degree in biology from the College of Holy Names, her master's in education from Dominican College, and her doctoral degree in education in instructional technology from USC. She will hold the academic appointment of adjunct professor of medical educational resources in the I.U. School of Medicine.

At MERP she will supervise one of the top electronic teaching and continuing medical education facilities in the country.

The new director of the Center for Economic Education will hold the academic rank of assistant professor of economics. For the past three years he has held the same posts at the University of Connecticut, before which he taught at Hampden-Sydney College in Virginia. His degrees are from Ohio State University, and his professional memberships include the National Tax Association-Tax Institute of America, the Atlantic Economic Society and the Eastern Economic Association.

Gersting is rejoining IUPUI as a professor of mathematics as well as holding the position of acting chairman of the Department of Computer and Information Science. For the past year she has been at the University of Central Florida at Orlando. Before that, she taught in the Department of Mathematical Sciences in the Purdue School of Science at IUPUI for 10 years, starting as assistant professor and ending as a full professor. She is a 1962 graduate of Stetson University and received her advanced degrees from Arizona State University.

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SPORTS CENTER NEARER REALITY

Four contracts pushing Indiana University-Purdue University at Indianapolis closer to a top niche as one of the country's leading amateur sports centers were awarded Aug. 5 by the I.U. board of trustees.

Three, totaling \$571,780, were approved for the I.U. School of Physical Education/Natatorium Building, providing the major contracting necessary to complete

installation of structural steel, steel roof decking, roofing and skylights. The awards, all to lowest bidders, went to the Hugh J. Baker Co. of Indianapolis, \$253,100; Crown Corr Erection of Highland (Ind.), \$99,680, and D. C. Taylor, Inc., of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, \$219,000. The fourth went to Tousley-Bixler Construction Co. of Indianapolis for \$219,000 for site clearing, demolition, mass earthwork and topsoil replacement of the 28-acre outdoor activities area, just west of the Physical Education/Natatorium Building. The site will include playing fields for sports like baseball and soccer, plus a track and field stadium. The natatorium and the track and field stadium will be two of the sites for the pre-Olympics National Sports Festival next July.

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UNION BUILDING TO BE RENOVATED

A plan for partial renovation of the Union Building at IUPUI was approved by the I.U. board of trustees. Included are redecorating and furnishing hotel rooms, the cafeteria, lobby and lounge areas. Estimated cost is \$770,000. Appropriate state agency approvals will be requested.
