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## INDIANAPOLIS LAW STUDENTS GET "POTOMAC FEVER"

A unique program to teach second- and third-year law students in several important areas of Federal law has been established at Washington, D.C., by the Indiana University School of Law--Indianapolis.

The Washington Legal Education Program, directed by Associate Professor William A. Stanmeyer, has an enrollment of nine students -- eight from the I.U. School of Law--Indianapolis and one from the J. Reuben Clark Law School at Brigham Young University. It is administered by the law school at Indianapolis in co-operation with the Lincoln Center for Legal Studies. Classes are held at Mount Vernon College, Washington, with field experience in the offices of members of the United States Congress.

The five first-semester courses -- each taught by a nationally recognized authority -- are U.S. Supreme Court practice, Federal communications law, Congressional internship (the drafting and processing of legislation in the House of Representatives), Federal trade law, and Federal bankruptcy law.

Stanmeyer said the program could be compared with the many community-based clinical courses offered by the Indianapolis law school in co-operation with the State of Indiana, Marion County and the City of Indianapolis. Though the parallel is not exact, both programs are capital-based and both offer the benefit of direct experience and learning.

"It seemed logical to explore the need for a Washington-based program," Stanmeyer said. "Everyone is affected by Federal law every day. Yet, except for those who graduate from one of the six law schools in the D.C. area, most students are denied an opportunity to observe Federal law as it is written, practiced, and tried before the Supreme Court. Few young attorneys have any feel for these areas and when a Federal problem comes along, many are not prepared to serve their clients well. I think the experience will be invaluable."

So far, so do the students. At least that's what they tell Stanmeyer. And an article for the law student newspaper, Dictum, says that "Potomac fever" is spreading through the class.

For the future, Stanmeyer hopes for a broader curriculum and the possibility of more students, as many as 100 with half from the Indianapolis law school and half from other institutions. He emphasizes the program's goal is to enhance the Indianapolis curriculum by providing a framework for theoretical and practical understanding of basic legal principles.

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## IUPUI TO HOST CONFERENCE

"Crime, Corrections and Cultural Conflict" is the theme for this year's annual meeting of the Indiana Academy of the Social Sciences which will be held Friday in the IUPUI Lecture Hall and Blake Street Library. It also will be the topic for Roy Girard, assistant director of the U.S. Department of Justice's Bureau of Prisons, who will address the group at 1 p.m.

Speakers for the 10 a.m. plenary session include Allyn Sielaff, director of the Illinois Department of Corrections; Robert Heyne, commissioner of the Indiana Department of Corrections, and Dr. Gopal Pati, associate professor of management at I.U.-Northeast. Afternoon meetings will be section sessions in business administration, economics, geography, history, political science and sociology--all disciplines which constitute the academy.
