MINORITIES IN HIGHER EDUCATION FOCUS OF VIDEO TELECONFERENCE

On Mar. 14, Black Issues in Higher Education will present "Men of Color: Absence in Academia," a live interactive broadcast that will unite some of the most respected authorities on education and social issues in the country. Participants include Leroy Keith, president of Morehouse College; Jacqueline Fleming, psychologist and author of Blacks in College; Reginald Wilson, senior scholar, American Council on Education, and Sarah Melendez, University of Bridgeport Connecticut. The two-hour program will offer a detailed look at the participation of African-American, Hispanic, Native American and Asian-American men in higher education.

EUROPEANS -- WESTERN AND EASTERN -- ON WAY TO IUPUI

Mar. 15 will see the arrival at IUPUI of the minister-counselor of the German embassy in Washington and the arrival of six university officials from Eastern Europe.

Gunter Pleuger will talk about "The Reunification of Germany" at an 8 a.m. Indiana Educators Breakfast, in University Place Hotel. His visit is sponsored by the Humanities Institute at IUPUI. A 1966 graduate of the universities of Cologne and Bonn with a Ph.D. in law, Pleuger has served in international public service roles since 1969, including posts at the United Nations and New Delhi. He was appointed embassy minister-counselor in 1988.

The Eastern European visitors, on a seven-city USIA-sponsored trip to the U.S., will meet with university officials at IUPUI and in Bloomington. Their three-week trip, called "Eastern Europe and the United States: An Educational Dialog," also will take them to New York City, Knoxville, Tenn.; Columbia, S.C.; Salt Lake City; Washington, D.C., and Anaheim, Cal. They include high-level representatives from the University of Sofia (Bulgaria), University of Cludj-Napoca (Romania), Agricultural University in Nitra, Czechoslovakia; Karl Marx University of Economics in Budapest, Hungary, and Warsaw University, Poland. In their discussions with universities in this country, they will focus on decision-making in higher education, international linkages and the role of American higher education in regional economic development.

Teaching headliners, the latest in effective teaching methods and the "debut" of the electronic classroom will highlight the Mar. 16 Edward C. NEW INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS CLUB SLATES TWO SPEAKERS

The newly formed IUPUI International Affairs Club, an initiative of the IU Center for Global Studies, tries to enhance international awareness and education and to focus on the changing political, economic, and social structures in the world. In this vein, two speakers this month will talk about topics as diverse as the recent election in Nicaragua and political reform in Poland. First, Janet Gottschalk, visiting professor of international health at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston (and formerly on the nursing faculty here), will speak Mar. 14 at 11:30 a.m. in Cavanaugh, room 438. She has recently returned from Nicaragua where she was part of a 16-member delegation, affiliated with the Witness for Peace organization, sent to monitor the presidential election process. Second, on Mar. 19, Andrzej Swiatkowski, professor of law and administration at the Jagiellonian University in Krakow, will talk at 11:30 a.m. about "The New Solidarity Government: Legal and Administrative Aspects of Reform" and answer questions about the changes in Eastern Europe.
