MRS. BERNIE PERRY, PRESIDENT OF DENTAL DAMES, reports as follows on the recent basketball game between the Dental School faculty and the seniors.

The senior-faculty basketball game was a resounding success. Mike Baumgartner, coach of the seniors, led his charges to a 33-31 victory over the graying profs. Up and down the floor, the youthful spirit of the seniors proved to be just too much, even in the face of the fantastic coaching of Dr. Fred Hohlt.

The serious side of the encounter was realized when \$330.00 was collected to provide dental care at the Dental School and Riley Hospital for children who otherwise could not afford it.

RICHARD B. FISCHER, A SOPHOMORE, recently represented the student body at the American Dental Association's Student Conference on Dental Research in Chicago. The purpose of the annual meeting is to familiarize students with the opportunities and requirements in dental research.

Here are some of his observations from the meeting....
"Research is going on in every area related to dentistry:
clinical specialities, basic science related to dentistry,
dentistry and social sciences, dentistry and the educational
processes, etc.

"Scholarships, grants, fellowships, and traineeships are available from government and private agencies. Also advanced training is available in universities, military service, and public health service. In universities alone there are 170 full-time faculty positions unfilled now with at least four new dental schools opening in the next 18 months. Statistics show that one out of every ten physicians is a Ph.D., whereas there is a great need in dentistry in this area (one out of every 53 dentists is a Ph.D.)

"Research facilities are located in universities, private industries, the ADA, regional dental research institutes, federal institutes, etc. Scientists participating in dental research (part-time or full-time) may be basic scientists, faculty, students, practitioners, or others, but almost all have advanced degrees.

"Probably the greatest reason for going into academic dentistry is the feeling of "staleness" of the highly trained mind and the educationally sterile environment of the practitioner a few years after graduation. Many feel this and then realize that it is too late to go back."

Mr. Fischer invites anyone with a possible interest in academic dentistry to talk to him as he has more information and some pamphlets on the subject.
