FROM COMPUTERS TO PSYCHOLOGY

A Carnegie-Mellon computer scientist says the intuitive, thinking machine is here and may soon outsmart its creator. Meanwhile, the computers are talking and listeners are advised not to be fooled by the drunken manner of speech affected by some machines. . . The American Psychological Association approved new doctoral programs in 16 state universities last year. 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FOOD FOR THOUGHT AND EATING

Here's another culinary wonder coming to you from the Dietetic Department -- this time it's Warm Fresh Peach Cobbler with Hard Sauce. The recipe yields six yummy servings.

Cobbler

Cake Flour 2 tablespoons
Nutmeg 1/8 teaspoon
Sugar 1/2 cup
Very Ripe Peaches, Sliced 3 cups
Butter or Margarine 2 tablespoons

Mix flour and nutmeg with sugar and fresh peaches. Cook and stir until thick. Add butter (or margarine). Measure into baking pan. Top with regular pastry. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes. Serve warm with Hard Sauce to gradually melt atop each serving.

Hard Sauce

Butter or Margarine

Powdered Sugar

Fresh Lemon Juice (not flavoring)

Vanilla

3 tablespoons
1/2 cup
1/2 teaspoon
1/2 teaspoon

Cream butter until light and fluffy. Add powdered sugar gradually. Add lemon juice gradually. Beat until very smooth. Add vanilla gradually.

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
