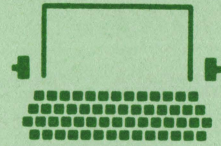


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CONFERENCE TO FOCUS ON CHILDHOOD DEPRESSION

Dr. James R. Simmons, Arthur B. Richter professor of child psychiatry at the I.U. School of Medicine, will be joined by two other nationally known authorities to present the Third Annual Arthur B. Richter Conference in Child Psychiatry Wednesday through Friday sponsored by the school's Department of Psychiatry.

A symposium on "Depression in Children and Adolescents" will be the focal point of the conference. It will be held Thursday at the Downtown Hilton Hotel.

Visiting authorities will be Dr. Dennis Patrick Cantwell, professor of psychiatry at the University of California at Los Angeles School of Medicine, and Dr. Stella Chess, professor of child psychiatry at the New York University School of Medicine.

"Children and Language Disorders, Long-Term Follow-Up" will be the subject of Dr. Cantwell's opening lecture at 1 p.m. Wednesday in the auditorium of the School of Nursing. The lecture is open to everyone interested in the problem, according to Dr. Paul D. Riley, I.U. assistant professor of psychiatry and chairman of the program committee.

The hyperactive child will be the subject of a discussion by Dr. Cantwell at the Dean's Hour at 4 p.m. Wednesday in the auditorium of Emerson Hall. This lecture is open to all medical students and faculty members.

In demand as a lecturer (he has presented more than 240 lectures and papers), Dr. Cantwell is the author or co-author of more than 140 articles in professional journals. A graduate of the University of Notre Dame and the Washington University School of Medicine, he now is director of residency training in child psychiatry at UCLA.

Dr. Chess will join the group Thursday at the Downtown Hilton. Also a well known lecturer who has been in the field of child psychiatry for about 30 years, she is considered the foremost authority on the traits in the temperament of children that last throughout life. She has worked with the New York Longitudinal Study of Temperament (now in its 25th year) and has demonstrated that it is possible to predict what sort of adult an infant will become.

Thursday's agenda includes a series of seminars at the Downtown Hilton, followed by a dinner meeting of the Indiana Psychiatric Society at the Airport Hilton.

The conference will close Friday with a talk on "Childhood Psychoses" by Dr. Cantwell at psychiatric grand rounds at 11 a.m. at LaRue Carter Hospital.

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FOUNDERS DAY HONORS. . .AND MORE

Three Indianapolis faculty members were cited for their outstanding contributions in Founders Day ceremonies Wednesday in Bloomington. Dr. Harvey Feigenbaum, professor of medicine and pioneer in the field of echocardiology, was named a distinguished professor of medicine. Dr. Richard L. Schreiner, associate professor of pediatrics, received the Frederic Bachman Lieber Memorial Award for excellence in

teaching. Jean Rose Hutten, associate professor of nursing, was one of six recipients of AMOCO Awards, also for excellence in teaching.

Dr. Stuart J. Cohen, associate professor and director of research in education with the School of Medicine, has been chosen as one of 42 outstanding young American professionals to receive a three-year fellowship from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation. More than 380 applications were received from professionals in 200 colleges, universities and agencies.

Dr. Ralph E. McDonald, dean of dentistry, and Dr. H. William Gilmore, professor of operative dentistry, are co-editors of Current Therapy in Dentistry, a book recently published by C.V. Mosby Co. Also, 19 of the authors contributing articles to the work are present or former faculty members or graduate students at the I.U. dental school.

David Stahl, graphic designer supervisor for Publications/Information Services, has been cited in the Graphics: USA/NY awards competition. He won for two entries -- as designer of a series of colorful IUPUI recruiting posters and as supervisor of the "UniverCITY" booklet which describes the university's close ties to the city of Indianapolis.

Erna Simek, associate professor of occupational therapy, has received an invitation to attend the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped which will be held in Washington, D.C. April 30-May 2.

Rolf F. Rehe, associate professor for typography at the Herron School of Art, has been in South America this month as one of the main speakers for a series of seminars on newspaper design, arranged by the Technical Center of the Inter-American Press Association in Miami. According to a paper presented at the recent annual meeting of the American Association of Dental Schools in Los Angeles, the I.U. School of Dentistry ranked fourth in research productivity among the nation's 60 dental schools, after the University of Michigan, the University of California (all branches counted as one) and Tufts University. The report by two dental faculty members at the University of Southern California rated schools by the number of publications in a dozen leading refereed journals over the period 1960-1979. Indiana had the following publication rankings among the schools in the individual specialties examined: pedodontics, first; endodontics and oral pathology, fourth; prosthodontics, sixth, and periodontics, eighth.
