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NASA astronaut to deliver keynote

This week on Sound Medicine

This weekend, Saturday, Sept. 25, and Sunday, Sept. 26, Sound Medicine topics include multiple organ transplants; an effective test for diagnosing Alzheimer's disease; and acupuncture for cancer patients.

Dr. Rodrigo Vianna, director of intestinal and multivisceral transplantation at Clarian Hospital, is one of the few surgeons in the world who can perform multiple-organ transplant surgery, a procedure to replace just about everything in the patient's abdominal cavity. Dr. Vianna will discuss the medical conditions that benefit from such a procedure with Sound Medicine co-host Dr. David Crabb.

University Pennsylvania researchers have developed a spinal fluid test that diagnoses Alzheimer's disease with 100 percent accuracy. Ruben Vidal, PhD, associate professor of pathology and laboratory medicine at IUSM, will explain how the test works and when it may become available.

Jennifer Meador-Stone, MD, volunteer clinical lecturer in medicine at IUSM, will explain how acupuncture can be used to treat cancer patients to alleviate pain and to lessen side effects from other treatments. Dr. Meador-Stone, also an acupuncturist, will give a talk on acupuncture as a cancer treatment at the IUSM Mini Medical School Tuesday, Sept. 28.

In part two of an interview with David Stipp, author of *The Youth Pill*, Stipp will discuss the ethics of longevity research with Sound Medicine host Barbara Lewis and IU bioethicist Eric Meslin, PhD.
