Einterz to lead new global health center

Robert Einterz, MD, associate dean for global health and professor of clinical medicine at IUSM, will be director of the IU Center for Global Health, a new initiative to improve the health of under-served populations around the world.

IU President Michael A. McRobbie announced the new center and its director during a recent event celebrating the 20th-anniversary of the IU-Kenya Partnership, which will serve as the "core" of the new global health center. The center will be housed at IUSM.

Dr. Einterz is the co-founder of IU's partnership with the Moi University School of Medicine in Kenya and the Academic Model Providing Access to Healthcare (AMPATH) program, which has provided HIV/AIDS treatment to more than 110,000 Kenyans at 25 sites throughout rural and urban western Kenya.

IU will make an initial start-up grant of \$100,000 to the center to aid in its establishment.

Only six days left to vote on the tenure clock extension

There are only six days left for eligible IUSM faculty to vote regarding the proposal to increase flexibility in the tenure clock, which will allow for tenure applications to be submitted anytime between seven and nine years on faculty. To date, 84 percent of the faculty have voted. This vote needs a response from all tenured and tenure track faculty.

On Monday, Nov. 15, eligible faculty will receive the last email reminder with a link to the ballot. The vote will close on **Thursday**, **Nov. 18**, **at 11:59 p.m.**

Letter regarding changes in expenditure reporting

Colleagues:

Effective November 1st, Indiana University and all other public higher education institutions are required to report expenditures related to legislative liaison activities with Indiana General Assembly members, their families, and their staff. Such expenditures include food, beverages, tickets, gifts and entertainment.

Jeff Linder and Judy Palmer are working together with the University Budget Office to develop an internal reporting mechanism which will enable us to comply with the requirements of this new law. Information about the new reporting procedure will be circulated in the next few weeks. A change in the way that you are currently processing reimbursements and payments for legislative related expenses from your IU Foundation accounts will also be required given a decision made by the IU Foundation board.

Until these new procedures are in place, please continue to follow the longstanding practice of letting Jeff Linder know if you or others on your campus are planning any legislative contacts. Such communications continue to be important in order that all our legislative contacts be coordinated; but it is also essential to ensure accurate and complete reporting of all legislative liaison expenditures in compliance with new statute. While we would anticipate limited activity in the next few weeks, we are aware that some of you may be contacting some local legislators who were elected this past week.

If you process any reimbursement requests prior to receipt of information about the new process, then please note specifically on your reimbursement request and on the receipt the specific amount of the dinner, entertainment, or other expenses including gifts which were expended on the legislator, his/her family member(s) or legislative staff then their families. Please send copies of the reimbursement request and the receipts to Jeff Linder. I apologize for the additional work required until the electronic process is in place, but we must keep a running total on all reportable expenses in order to facilitate University compliance with this new law.

Please share this email with all others on your campus or in your office who may be making contacts with legislators and the other persons listed above who are covered by the new reporting law. Thank you so much for your cooperation in this matter. It is always challenging to implement new reporting requirements but it is very important for us to comply with the new law and its requirements.

Critical Care Bed Tower timeline extended

The timeline for construction of the Methodist Critical Care Bed Tower has been extended. The change is related to plans for a comprehensive statewide referral study examining ways in which changes in referral sources and other factors potentially will affect what clinicians and patients need as part of the Methodist Hospital campus expansion.

"The continuing uncertainty of health care reform, the realignment of physician practices and changes to the competitive landscape in central Indiana are all reasons why we're revisiting the bed tower design," said Sam Odle, president and CEO of Methodist Hospital.

It is anticipated that the completion date for the tower will be closer to 2017 or 2018 than the original date of 2015. An official timeline for this extension has not yet been established.

This week on Sound Medicine

Topics to be discussed this weekend, Saturday, Nov. 13, and Sunday, Nov. 14, on the award-wining weekly radio program *Sound Medicine*, include a report on using robots to help children with muscular diseases and the first images to show how chemotherapy changes the brain.

Sound Medicine reporter Colleen Iudice will visit the Robotic Rehab Center at Riley Hospital for Children to report on how robots are helping children with cerebral palsy and similar diseases. She will talk to Hermano Igo Krebs, MD, a principal research scientist at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, who has been studying robotic rehabilitation for nearly 20 years. In his work, he's found that stoke patients who used robotic therapy saw 10 to 20 percent improvement in movement. Today he's looking at how robotic therapy machines can help children like the patients at Riley Hospital.

Joan Luby, MD, a professor of child psychiatry at Washington University School of Medicine, has been doing research in the field of depression among preschoolers for 20 years. Early on, her work was met with great skepticism. Today her viewpoint is shared by others who have documented depression in the very young.

It's well known that chemotherapy can cause mental cloudiness—a condition known as "chemobrain." Now, for the first time, researchers have used brain imaging to document how chemotherapy affects brain tissue.

Co-host Steve Bogdewic, PhD, will talk with Andrew Saykin, PsyD, director of the IU Center for Neuroimaging and a researcher at the IU Simon Cancer Center, and Brenna McDonald, PsyD, MBA, assistant professor in radiology and imaging science at IUSM. The two researchers and their colleagues found that gray matter changes were most prominent in the areas of the brain that are consistent with cognitive dysfunction during and shortly after chemotherapy.

Actress and writer Marianne Leone wrote a memoir, *Knowing Jesse*, about her late son, Jesse Cooper who, after having a cerebral hemorrhage soon after birth, developed severe cerebral palsy, was non-verbal and suffered from frequent seizures. She discusses her fight to give her son a meaningful, full life.

Call for Proposals from the American Cancer Society

The IU Simon Cancer Center seeks proposals from new investigators seeking to initiate independent research projects. This program is made possible by support from the American Cancer Society Institutional Research Grant.

Funds are available for four to five pilot projects in amounts up to \$25,000. Special funds also are available for one pilot study in the amount of \$30,000 within the special topic of cancer disparities focused on underserved populations. Proposals must address benefits to specific populations and present a clear plan for pursuing external funding. The funding period will be Feb. 1, 2011 to Jan. 30, 2012.

Funds are available to investigators holding the rank of assistant professor, research assistant professor or assistant scientist. Faculty from the IU schools of medicine, including regional campuses, nursing, dentistry, optometry, public and environmental affairs, health and rehabilitation sciences, liberal arts, law, science and informatics are encouraged to apply.

VA fellowship training programs

Several fellowship training opportunities are available from the Department of Veterans Affairs:

VA Medical Informatics Special Fellowship: This is a two-year core training program of the VA Health Services Research & Development Center of Excellence on Implementing Evidence-Based Practice at the Indianapolis VAMC, a close partner of the Regenstrief Institute, Inc. and Regenstrief Center for Healthcare Engineering. This program will prepare graduates for careers in medical informatics, with particular research skills in the areas of redesigning and transforming healthcare delivery.

VA HSR&D Associated Health Post-doctoral Fellowship: This two-year fellowship provides research and educational learning opportunities in various aspects of the VA health system. This program will prepare fellows for careers in health services, implementation and operations research, with a particular emphasis on redesigning and transforming healthcare delivery.

VA HSR&D Physician Post Resident Fellowship: This fellowship provides two years of post-residency research, education, and clinical learning opportunities to eligible physicians. Fellows spend approximately 75 percent of their time in research and education and 25 percent in clinical care at the Roudebush VAMC.
