



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From the Dean

Striving to Become the Premier U.S. Dental School

t this time the search for a new dean for our School of Dentistry is continuing, and initial interviews of five candidates have been completed. Our Search and Screen Committee, led by Dr. Angela Barron-McBride, dean of the IU School of Nursing, has spent many long hours in a diligent effort to identify the most qualified person to lead our school into the next century.

In the meantime our faculty have united in a collective effort to establish our school as THE PRE-MIER U.S. DENTAL SCHOOL by the turn of the century. Becoming the premier dental school in the U.S. literally means establishing excellence in every area—from teaching and patient care to facility maintenance. Our faculty have recognized that they have the necessary expertise, the required energy, and the potential for re-establishing our school as the best in the nation!

This new and innovative curriculum has been evolving for more than 18 months and will markedly alter the scope as well as the manner of teaching in the preclinical basic sciences.

Quite clearly, the cornerstone of this effort is the development of a new curriculum—a curriculum which integrates the basic and clinical sciences and implements many of the recommendations provided in the recent report by the Institute of Medicine. This new and innovative curriculum has been

evolving for more than 18 months and will markedly alter the scope as well as the manner of teaching in the preclinical basic sciences. Instead of taking individual courses in each of the basic sciences (e.g., biochemistry, anatomy, physiology), our firstand second-year dental students will study individual biological systems, such as the gastrointestinal tract, in a block instructional approach which will integrate all of the basic sciences as well as the clinical sciences provided through a combination of lecture, laboratory, demonstration, and problem-based learning experiences. This approach obviously requires a significant amount of meticulous planning, faculty development in educational methodologies, and additional resources. Through continuous assessment of outcomes and instructional refinement, we expect to perfect an instructional model which will be copied by other dental schools for teaching and integrating the basic and clinical sciences. In addition, our clinical program for third- and fourth-year students is being refined and broadened to include a series of experiences which will better prepare them for total patient care and the utilization of new technologies anticipated with the next few decades.

Our School of Dentistry's outstanding international reputation for excellence has been gained primarily through the strength of our graduate programs in all of the dental specialties, and all of these programs must be enhanced well beyond traditional accreditation standards. To help us become the premier dental school, our graduate program directors and their graduate faculty are currently reviewing their programs to identify

further improvements needed to best prepare future graduates for clinical practice and teaching of their specialty in the next century.

Implementing this ambitious plan necessarily requires substantial improvements and expansion of the infrastructure of our facility. Simultaneous with the foregoing efforts in curriculum development, a number of our faculty have been defining our infrastructural needs to improve our present program and support future activities. These needs range from upgrading all of our clinics with state-of-the-art instrumentation to the creation of additional facilities for preclinical instruction involving patient simulators, an instructional resource laboratory, smaller rooms equipped for problem-based instruction, areas for teaching doctor-patient relationships, and enhanced library resources and independent study areas. Developing the necessary infrastructure will require a significant financial investment and will require support from a wide variety of sources.

To permit us to collectively move forward with dispatch, we have set aside July 15, 1996, as the date for making major decisions on the curriculum content and format as well as the resultant requirements for infrastructure. With the continued support of our alumni, our faculty are convinced that Indiana University School of Dentistry has the potential to become THE PREMIER U.S. DENTAL SCHOOL. They are working diligently to make it happen!

A Salute to Greatness

Donors from around the world help Indiana University endow a professorship to honor the memory of Ralph W. Phillips

hether chatting with one student in a dental school laboratory or addressing 500 dentists at an international symposium, Dr. Ralph W. Phillips thrived on the act of sharing knowledge. He was better at it than just about anybody—perhaps because he had a gift for making 500 dentists at an international symposium feel as if they were sitting in a lab, chatting with him one-on-one.

Dr. Phillips seemed to find strength in the people around him, a fortunate circumstance since there was never any shortage of people in the orbit of this extraordinarily talented and accomplished teacher.

In reaping his phenomenal success as one of the dental profession's most sought-after lecturers, Dr. Phillips—who as a 22-year-old in 1940 was recruited by Indiana University to help develop a dental materials program—appeared on more than 1,000 educational programs during a career that spanned five decades and carried him to most parts of the globe. He organized

and chaired more than 40 conferences related to biomaterials and dental research. His efforts as a teacher and researcher at the IU School of Dentistry earned him the university's prestigious title of Research Professor. Dental professionals and students around the nation who did not personally have an opportunity to hear him lecture were exposed to Dr. Phillips' knowledge through scientific papers and books, including his major work, The Science of Dental Materials, which was published in its ninth edition two months before Dr. Phillips' death in May 1991.


"Dr. Phillips was in great demand as a speaker because of his ability to analyze scientific advances in dental science and apply them to dental office procedures," Dr. Maynard K. Hine, IU dean emeritus, said at the time of Dr. Phillips' death. A trailblazer in dental materials research, Dr. Phillips was one of the first to investigate the relationship between laboratory tests and clinical performance. Clinical investigation of dental materials eventually became an essential component of all meaningful research programs in the discipline.

In 1992, a group of Dr. Phillips' colleagues and former students led by corporate leader Donald A. McKenzie, a past chair of the fundraising committee for the American Fund for Dental Health, collaborated with Indiana University School of Dentistry to find a fitting way to salute their friend and mentor. Through the Indiana University Foundation they launched a major campaign to raise \$300,000 with the goal of endowing a professorship in Dr. Phillips' name and memory.

"A named, university professorship is one of the highest honors that can be conferred," Mr. McKenzie remarked when the campaign was announced in '92. "A professorship will provide long-lasting recognition to a great teacher and scientist. Dr. Phillips was a remarkable pioneer in dentistry who enriched many lives."

As Mr. McKenzie's steering committee soon discovered, there were many other friends and associates of Dr. Phillips who felt the same way, and they responded generously to the call for funds. In the fall of 1995, Barry F. Smith, then the IU School of Dentistry's director of development, announced that the goal to establish the Ralph W. Phillips Professorship in Dental Materials had been reached.

"We, the members of the steering committee, are deeply grateful to everyone—including a great many members of the IU School of Dentistry alumni—who made it possible for IU to create this living memorial to Ralph," says Marjorie L. Swartz, professor emerita of dental materials and Dr. Phillips' co-worker for 40 years. "Thanks to the generosity of these donors, we are now able to move forward to the next stage of this project: choosing the faculty member who will be awarded the Phillips' title."



Expenditures will be made from the interest earned on the funds, which will leave the principal intact and allow the endowment program to remain self-perpetuating.


A selection committee for the Phillips Professorship is currently being composed. It will be headed by the chair of the Department of Restorative Dentistry, the department in which the dental materials research facilities and faculty are housed. Members will be the director of graduate operative dentistry, the director of graduate prosthodontics, dean of the dental school, and an alumnus of the IU graduate program in dental materials.

"The Ralph W. Phillips Professorship will enhance the Department of Restorative Dentistry's research mission, which ultimately will have significant bearing on various aspects of clinical dentistry," says Dr. George P. Willis, chair of restorative dentistry. "I look forward to working with the selection committee to identify an individual who has demonstrated a strong commitment to materials science. The donors who contributed to this fund have put us in the enviable position of being able to reward a faculty member for exceptional research and teaching efforts. For that we are most appreciative."

"Dr. Phillips was key in making Indiana University School of Dentistry recognized throughout the world as a leader in the science of dental materials and in dental education," Mr. McKenzie said in 1994.

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



Scholarships and Awards 1995-96

Annual Scholarship and Award Programs Benefit Dental, Dental Hygiene Students

Each year their arrival is enthusiastically welcomed by dental and dental hygiene students at the IU School of Dentistry. Scholarships and awards—both large and small and coming from a variety of sources—help ease the burden of acquiring an education in dentistry.

Throughout the past academic year, 38 awards were presented to an appreciative group of recipients, including third-year dental students **Yuval Arazi** and **Brad B. Ching**. They were presented with the 1996 **Howard K. and Shizuko Maesaka Awards** during a dental school ceremony in front of their classmates on March 21.

Maesaka awards are given to third-year dental students who demonstrate excellence in preclinical technique in prosthodontics. Recipients are chosen by faculty in the Department of Restorative Dentistry.

The awards honor a 1926 graduate of the IU dental school and his wife. Dr. Maesaka died in 1975 and Mrs. Maesaka resides in Oahu, Hawaii. Their sons are Ray K. Maesaka (DDS'60), IU profes-

sor emeritus of prosthodontics, of Indianapolis, and Clifford T. Maesaka (DDS'61), of St. Paul, Minn., and Venice, Fla.; and their grandson is Clifford T. Maesaka, Jr. (DDS'86), of Louisville, Ky.

Dr. Ray Maesaka returned to the school to present the award on behalf of the Maesaka family.

This year's ceremony had a decidedly Hawaiian flavor, complete with a congratulatory lei for each recipient. (Mr. Ching is from Honolulu and Mr. Arazi is from Jerusalem, Israel.)

A videotape of Mr. Ching's parents—Drs. Walter and Gwyneth Ching—sending best wishes from their Honolulu home was played to the class, and Mr. Arazi's wife, Tami, a nurse at St. Vincent hospital, attended the presentation. Mr. Ching also received letters of congratulations from the governor of Hawaii and the mayor of Honolulu.

On a sad note, Mr. Ching's father, who had been in poor health, died about 6 weeks after the award was presented. Dr. Walter Ching was a 1963 dental graduate of Indiana University. His obituary appears on page 36.

This year the scholarship was once again given in memory of Dr. Tillman E. Miller, an Elkhart dentist and 1980 graduate of IUSD who died in 1990. Dr. Miller was a past president of the society.



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

National Recognition for Dr. Margherita Fontana and Mr. Russell McCabe

Two Indiana University School of Dentistry students were recognized for their research efforts at this year's American Association for Dental Research meeting, held in conjunction with the International Association for Dental Research general session. Dr. Margherita Fontana, a PhD degree candidate in dental sciences from Caracas, Venezuela, was one of five postdoctoral students in the nation to win an American Association for Dental Research Edward H. Hatton Award. The Hatton awards recognize students who exhibit potential for a productive career in dental research; they are supported annually by a grant from the Warner-Lambert Company. Dr. Fontana's awardwinning study is titled "Efficacy of Streptococcus mutans Fimbriae Antibodies: Microbial Caries Model." Her faculty research mentors for the project are Dr. Richard Gregory of the Department of Oral Biology, and Drs. Ann Dunipace and George Stookey of the Oral Health Research Institute.

From a field of 12 finalists, third-year dental student Russell McCabe, of Chesterton, Ind., won 1st Place in the AADR Student Research Group Caulk/Dentsply Competition. He has been voluntarily involved in dental research studies since the summer preceding his entry into dental school. He completed his most recent project, titled "Nuclear Matrix and Intermediate Filament Proteins of a Human Osteosarcoma Tumor," under the faculty guidance of Dr. Joseph Bidwell, of the Department of Periodontics and Allied Dental Programs; and Dr. Janet Hock, an adjunct periodontics professor at IU and a scientist in skeletal diseases research at the Lilly Research Laboratories of Eli Lilly and Co.







r. Wilfrid Keaton, an IU clinical associate professor of oral and maxillofacial surgery since 1990, shared the stage with two of his newest colleagues at the Spring Alumni Conference to paint a contemporary picture of IU's Department of Oral Surgery, Medicine, and Pathology. The department is one of five at the dental school, and is run by Dr. Mark Wohlford, acting chair.





Faculty Farewells

ndiana University recently said goodbye to three longtime contributors to the full-time dental faculty.

Dr. **David K. Hennon**, professor of pediatric dentistry and orthodontics, retired at the end of 1995, having served the school with excellence for more than three decades.

Dr. Hennon was with the U.S. Naval Reserve in the early 1950s, and is a veteran of the Korean War. He began his distinguished teaching career at IU after earning A.B. ('57) and D.D.S. ('60) degrees from IU and completing a U.S. Public Health Service postdoctoral fellowship. Appointed to the faculty in 1962 as an assistant professor of preventive dentistry, Dr. Hennon accepted a position in the pediatric dentistry department 12 years later and, after earning the MSD degree in pediatric dentistry in 1975, he became director of the graduate pediatric dentistry clinic, serving in that capacity from 1976 to 1982.

Dr. Hennon complemented his role as a teacher by continuing his own pursuit of education. He completed IU's orthodontic certificate program in 1983, and acquired the dual professorship title in 1988.

Dr. Hennon is a diplomate of the American Board of Pediatric Dentistry and a fellow of the American College of Dentists. He is a past president of Theta Theta Chapter of Omicron Kappa Upsilon national dental honor society and of the American Society of Dentistry for Children's Indiana section. He is former editor for the Indianapolis District Dental Society and former director of the Wheeler Boys' Club's dental clinic.

Since 1967 Dr. Hennon has maintained a part-time practice, first in general dentistry, then in children's dentistry, and since 1985 in orthodontics.

Dr. Hennon has long held a great interest in hypnosis as it relates to dentistry; he belongs to the International Society of Hypnosis. In 1983 he contributed a chapter on the use of hypnosis in children's dentistry for a book, *Managing Children's*

"A review of Dave's 38 publications documents a diversity of knowledge and skills in the areas of nutrition, fluoride metabolism, hypnosis, and craniofacial anomalies," Dr. Ralph McDonald, IUSD dean emeritus and former chair of pediatric dentistry, wrote in a recent issue of pediatric dentistry's alumni publication, *Our Tree*.

Dr. Hennon will be well remembered for his important contributions to Indiana University's Craniofacial Team, housed at Riley Hospital for Children. Working with many youngsters early on in their lives, Dr. Hennon once reported taking an impression for a dental obturator on a two-day-old infant. "I derive personal satisfaction from working with the team and seeing the results that we can now obtain for these youngsters, who years ago would have gone through life with much more disfigurement," he said in an Alumni Bulletin article in 1988.

Dr. Hennon participated in a variety of IUPUI Faculty Council groups and was also a devoted member of the dental school's Teaching Committee, which produced 25 annual Teaching Conference retreats for the dental faculty beginning in the '60s. Dr. Hennon chaired the final meeting and was honored, along with Dr. Norris Richmond, now professor emeritus of operative dentistry, for having participated in all 25 retreats.

In addition to Dr. Hennon's retirement, the IU administration recently accepted resignations from two outstanding faculty members: Drs. Larry L. Graham and Dwight C. Swimley.

Dr. Graham, professor of oral and maxillofacial surgery, contributed to the education of pre- and postdoctoral surgery students at IU for 25 years,

serving in a full-time position since 1976. He was IU's director of the oral and maxillofacial surgery program at Wishard Memorial Hospital and the Regenstrief Center, a facility highly regarded in the state for the quality of emergency care provided to medical and dental patients. Dr. Graham conducted a surgery clinic for third- and fourth-year dental students and also taught a variety of advanced didactic and clinical surgery courses to IU's residents.

A graduate of IU's D.D.S. ('65) and surgery residency ('70) programs, Dr. Graham also holds a B.S. degree ('61) from Indiana State University. He served a two-year stint in the U.S. Army at Fort Polk, La., in the 1960s. He has maintained a part-time private practice in Indianapolis since 1970.

In the mid-'80s Dr. Graham created a series of education television tapes on such topics as surgical augmentation of atrophic chins, mandibular staple implants, and cephalometric analysis in orthognathic surgery.

Dr. Graham is a fellow of the American College of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons and a member of OKU.

After resigning from his full-time appointment last October, Dr. Graham re-joined the faculty as a part-time volunteer in the Department of Oral Surgery, Medicine, and Pathology.

Dr. Swimley, clinical associate professor in oral and maxillofacial surgery, came to IU eight years ago as a retired U.S. Air Force Colonel.

His most recent assignment before arriving here was at the Medical Center at Lackland AFB, Texas, where he had directed the oral and maxillofacial surgery residency program.

Dr. Swimley received a bachelor's degree from Mansfield (Pa.) State College in 1954, a D.D.S. degree from Temple University, Philadelphia, Pa., in 1959, and a master's degree from the University of Texas School of Biomedical Sciences in Houston in 1970.

He is a diplomate of the American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery, and a fellow of the International College of Dentists and the American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons. He is a 1973 recipient of the USAF Surgeon General's Award.

During his years at IU Dr. Swimley directed the oral and maxillofacial education program for predoctoral students. He coordinated paincontrol activities in the surgery department from 1987 to 1990.

Faculty Appointments

Indiana University recently welcomed six new full-time professors to the School of Dentistry faculty. A synopsis for each of their professional backgrounds follows.

Committee Launches Search for IDA Endowed Chair

Recent contributions to the Indiana Dental Association/Indiana University School of Dentistry Pursuit of Excellence Endowment Program have made it possible for the IDA to realize its goal of endowing a faculty position at the school.

Contributions totaling \$1 million have set in motion a worldwide search for the person to fill the newly established position titled Indiana Dental Association Chair in Restorative Dentistry.

The IDA is the second state dental organization in the nation, and the first in the Big 10, to fund an endowed chair for its state's dental school.

Leading the search is a committee headed by Dr. George Willis, the school's chair of the Department of Restorative Dentistry. Serving with him are IDA representatives Dr. Lloyd Phillips, chair of the IDA's Endowment Committee, of Indianapolis, and Dr. James Frey, the IDA's president in 1994-95, of Fort Wayne; and IU faculty members Dr. Edward DeSchepper, associate professor of operative dentistry, Dr. Hala Henderson, associate dean for academic affairs, and Dr. LaForrest Garner, associate dean for minority student services.

The IDA Chair in Restorative Dentistry will be a full-time, tenure-track position within the Department of Restorative Dentistry—the person filling this role will not serve as the department's administrator.

The Department of Restorative Dentistry includes the disciplines of operative dentistry, fixed and removable prosthodontics, endodontics, and dental materials. Candidates seeking the position must have a DDS or DMD degree from an American Dental Association-accredited institution or the equivalent. Advanced training in an area of restorative dentistry and/or a PhD degree in a related area is also desirable.

Candidates must be licensed to practice dentistry in the state of Indiana or eligible for such licensure.

The successful candidate must have a national/international reputation as an exceptional clinician and/or researcher. A minimum of 10 years of clinical and/or research experience is required.



Prof. Mesenbrink's Class Reaches Out to Communities

In the last semester of their final year in the dental hygiene program, IU students once again took a message about the importance of oral healthcare to a variety of sites within the state in partial fulfillment of a Community Dental Health course taught by Professor Pamela Mesenbrink.

The dental hygiene Class of '96 divided into several small teams, with each choosing a special healthcare project to pursue beyond the walls of the dental school.

Among the groups were students Katherine Medley and Detrich Harris, both of Carlisle, Ind., who teamed up to participate in a recent dental health program at Carlisle Elementary School. Thirty-nine children without dental insurance were given dental checkups and/or sealants.

The IU students worked on the project with Sullivan, Ind., dentists Neal Heape (DDS'77) and Gregg Smith (DDS'79). The volunteer effort

was made possible by an Indiana State Department of Health grant.

Professor Mesenbrink's Community Dental Health course teaches dental hygiene students how to plan, implement, and evaluate dental health programs for civic organizations and schools. Programs designed by students over the years have been tailored to meet the needs of virtually everyone in the community, from toddlers in day care to the elderly in nursing homes or geriatric centers.

In all, the efforts of this year's class touched the lives of some 2,000 men, women, and children at more than 50 central Indiana facilities and institutions, including the Indiana School for the Blind; the Indiana Boys School (a correctional facility); the Damien Center (a counseling center for AIDS patients or persons who are HIV-positive); and the Care Center, a homeless shelter for women and children in Center Township.

Dr. Eggertsson Receives 1st P&G Fellowship

Dr. Hafsteinn Eggertsson, a first-year PhD candidate in oral biology, has been chosen as the school's first recipient of a Procter & Gamble Postgraduate Research Fellowship.

"This fellowship is available through funds provided by P&G to support an outstanding graduate student working toward a Doctor of Philosophy degree," says Dr. George Stookey, acting dean. The fellowship will fund Dr. Eggertsson's studies for a maximum of three years; it will be used in part to support his participation in major research meetings and activities related to the preparation of his dissertation.

A dental graduate of the University of Iceland, Reykjavik, Dr. Eggertsson began his IU education as a graduate student in operative dentistry and has earned an IU certificate in that field. His research interests are concerned with laser fluorescence techniques used to detect interproximal caries.



Grandma Jarrell Gives Kevin the Shirt Off David's Back

When **Kevin T. Jarrell**, of Kokomo, Ind., posed for his dental graduation portrait last winter, he was a mere 24 years old—the youngest guy in his class, and at least a decade younger than the shirt on his back.

"My grandmother saved a few of dad's white dress shirts from his dental school days, so I wore one for my photo," Kevin told us recently.

His dad is Kokomo orthodontist Dr. **David P. Jarrell**, who preceded Kevin in dental school at IU by exactly 30 years. Kevin's mother, Barbro (Hultberg) Jarrell, met Kevin's dad while he was a dental student and she was employed as a dental assistant in IU's pediatric dentistry clinic.

Back in the '60s, dental students didn't save their dress shirts for special occasions. They wore them Monday through Friday in adherence to the school's strict dress code.

David's shirts weathered the ensuing generation well, no doubt because of the loving touch—and impeccable storage capabilities—of his mom, Mary Jarrell, also of Kokomo.

"My grandmother kept a couple of the shirts to do her gardening in, and she gave me the two that were in the best condition," says Kevin. "I started wearing them to school occasionally during the past year, and I thought that wearing one for my graduation photo would be a nice gesture."

Like his classmates, young Kevin ordinarily dons attire that runs along the fashion lines of *J. Riggens* and similar contemporary designers, but he appreciates all the work that went into the shirts of yesteryear. "That thick, 100 percent cotton cloth requires a lot of careful ironing to make it presentable," he explains, looking as if he knows his way around an ironing board. (He does a thorough job of pressing but admits to skipping the starch.)

After graduation Kevin will enter an Advanced Education in General Dentistry (AEGD) program at Louisiana State University in New Orleans. These intensive clinical programs for new dentists are typically long on work and short on free time, so Kevin will have reason to be glad, at least during the next year, that he's a student in the ready-to-wear '90s.

Longtime Educator Dr. G.E. Kelley Retires from USI

Dr. Gordon E. Kelley (BS'57, DDS'64, MSD/ preventive dentistry '67), Evansville, who is currently on sabbatical from his position as

associate dean for health professions at the University of Southern Indiana School of Nursing and Health Professions, retires this summer after a long and notable career in education.

A former assistant professor of preventive dentistry at Indiana University, Dr. Kelley accepted a position in 1971 as associate professor of dental auxiliary education and director of Allied Health Programs at what was then Indiana State University at Evansville. When the institution became the University of Southern Indiana, Dr. Kelley became chair of the Division of Allied Health. He was appointed to his current position at the University of Southern Indiana in 1988. In addition to his administrative position Dr. Kelley has been a teacher of pharmacology and therapeutics as well as head and neck anatomy.

Dr. Kelley is a retired colonel in the Dental Corps of the U.S. Army Reserve. He is a past president of the Indiana Society for Hospital Education and Training, and has served on the board of directors for Vanderburgh County's Diabetes Association and Cancer Society, and for the Indiana Lung Association in the Evansville area.

Dogging Sherlock's Trail

Many IU grads are acquainted with Dr. Gordon Kelley's contributions to higher education in Indiana, but some may be surprised to know that, outside of academic and dentistry circles, he is an avid writer who has created a unique niche for himself as an expert on the whereabouts of Sherlock Holmes.

At the request of the *Alumni Bulletin*, Dr. Kelley describes the avocation he has pursued with devotion for several decades:

"I have been collecting old radio programs on tape for over 30 years and was fortunate to have been able to produce and present a two-hour program on radio station WSWI for several years. I introduced these old shows from my collection, then played them in their entirety each Saturday. The program, 'Radio Theater,' was on the air from June 1985 until October 1992.

"Among the shows I like are the Sherlock Holmes episodes. I looked for and tried to obtain as many of the available show copies as I could. I soon became frustrated with the errors I found. Broadcasts were incorrectly titled, the dates were incorrect in many cases, and often the stars were not named. Many shows were missing titles and others were missing dates. Because of this and the fact that I was buying several mislabeled programs, I found myself purchasing duplicate copies.

"To save myself and other collectors trouble, I decided to make a master list of all Sherlock Holmes radio broadcasts, complete with actors, episode titles, and broadcast dates. This soon expanded to include movies because I was also collecting videotapes; and then I added television, and commercial tape copies and story readings.

"At that point I had no idea of publishing a book, but as my data grew and I accumulated so much material, I found I was making my own book of sorts. Since I belong to a writer's group, I was encouraged to see if the material was publishable. Editors at Scarecrow Press, Inc., in Metuchan, N.J., thought there was a book in the material, so we proceeded.

"The book, Sherlock Holmes Screen and Sound Guide, was released in the spring of 1994 to generally good reviews. It includes chapters covering silent and sound films, cartoons, and television and radio programs not only here in the U.S., but worldwide. Episode or story presentations are listed chronologically, along with actors production staff, and dates of release or presentation. Many of the episodes have plot summaries if the story deviates from the originals as written by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle.

"Actors are listed in the index, as are all of the story titles; so it's possible, for example, to find how many times *The Hound of the Baskervilles* was presented. A short synopsis of the 60 original stories is included in the book, which is mainly categorized as a reference book and should be found in most libraries. Sherlockians around the country also have purchased the book for their personal use."

John Mayhall to Head Dental Anthropology Association

John T. Mayhall (DDS'63), professor of dental anatomy at the University of Toronto Faculty of Dentistry, has been named president-elect of the Dental Anthropology Association, an international group of more than 300 dentists and physical anthropologists. He is the first dentist to serve as the association's president.

The Dental Anthropology Associa-

tion, says Dr. Mayhall, has members from throughout the world with a wide variety of interests.

"There are those who are involved with research on the morphology and use of the dentitions of non-humans, primarily primates," he reported to the *Alumni Bulletin* recently. "Others are working on the dentitions of prehistoric peoples

throughout the world. They tend to be interested in tooth wear, methods of aging, and identifying the sex of individuals using the dentition while some are more interested in attempting to define population movements using dental morphology.

"There are a few of us who are studying the genetics of tooth morphology and size while many

are studying caries and periodontal disease and using their results in an attempt to characterize the diet and cultural uses of

teeth in prehistoric populations. There are several members who are involved with the forensic aspects of the dentition as well as facial reconstructions. Others are studying the growth and development of the face and use this to define population differences and to theorize on the reasons for the construction of the face.

"As you can see, the diversity of interests in our organization allows

everyone to learn about the dentition in the widest sense. Generally, the members are not dental practitioners although there are a few of us with degrees in both dentistry and anthropology. It's amazing to some of us how much the dentition is studied by non-dentists. As dentists we tend to think that we have exclusive rights to the knowledge of the oral cavity, but we are only one group of several that realize the value of the dentition in studying a wide variety of cultural and environmental conditions.

"I have studied the dental morphology of Inuit (Eskimos), Finnish populations, North American Indians, Australian aboriginals, South American Indians, and for most of these populations have looked at their oral pathology, tooth morphology, and size. Recently, I have concentrated on non-destructive methods for defining the volume of tooth crowns using moiré contourography and digital image

analysis. Along with colleagues in Finland and Australia, I have been able to define the volume, size, and areas of molars of several groups indicating that the technique can define growth and development of the crown in a truly three-dimensional manner. As well, we have reported on the effects of the sexchromosomes on the size and morphology of molars, and this has led to indications of the location of the genes for tooth development on the sex-chromosomes. Finally, along with a visiting Japanese scientist, I am examining new ways of characterizing wear with the hope that we will be able to describe tooth wear in terms of the amount of tooth material lost in a given time."

Dr. Mayhall also plays several roles within his academic community. He's a member of the University of Toronto's Governing Council and vice chair of the university's Academic Board.

IU Grads Earn Leadership Roles in the AAE

During the 53rd annual session of the American Association of Endodontists, held April 24-28 in Dallas, Texas, two Indiana University graduates were elected to top posts in the organization.

Carl W. Newton (DDS'75, MSD/ endodontics '77), Indianapolis, was elected vice president of the AAE for the 1996-97 term. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Endodontics

A longtime educator at Indiana University, Dr. Newton chaired the former Department of Endodontics from 1983 to 1993. He also directed the endodontic residency program at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Indianapolis, for a decade. Now practicing full time in Indianapolis, Dr. Newton continues to serve on the IU faculty as a part-time volunteer.

Dr. Newton's efforts with the AAE, the AAE foundation, and the American Association of Dental Schools have focused on dental education and continuing education for practitioners. He is a past president of the Indiana Association of Endodontists, a former chair of the endodontic section of the AADS, and a past director of District IV for the AAE. Over the years he has been a frequent contributor to the *Journal*

of Endodontics and has served on its scientific advisory panel.

Dr. Newton and his wife, Linda, have three children.

H. Robert Steiman (MSD/endodontics '79), Detroit, Mich., was elected to the board of directors of the American Board of Endodontics, the certifying board for the specialty.

Dr. Steiman is a professor of endodontics at the University of Detroit Mercy School of Dentistry, where he received his dental degree in 1973. He has been on the faculty there since 1967. He also holds a PhD degree in physiology from Wayne State University School of Medicine. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Endodontics, and a consultant to the Commission on Dental Accreditation of the American Dental Association.

Dr. Steiman served on the board of directors of the AAE from 1992 to 1995. He held key posts in the AAE's annual session programming for the last three years and was general chair of the meeting in Dallas.

Dr. Steiman maintains a part-time endodontic practice in Sterling Heights, Mich. He and his wife, Dee, live in Gross Pointe Farms, Mich. They have two daughters.

A Salute to "Mom"

Harold C. Dimmich (DDS'26), 1010 Cumberland #509, West Lafayette, IN 47906, was recently in the mood to do a bit of reminiscing about his dental school days. He fondly recalls "Mom" Ringler, who was the Xi Psi Phi fraternity's housemother more than 70 years ago:

"In September 1922, the Indiana Dental College (acquired by IU in 1925—eds.) was located at 635 North Pennsylvania Street. At that time each of the three nationally recognized fraternities for dentistry had its own fraternity house where members could reside. About 40 students belonged to each fraternity. I was a member of Xi Psi Phi.

"Xi Psi Phi outgrew the first home it rented and, after renting another for just two months, a big stone mansion at the northwest corner of Fall Creek and North Meridian became available. It was a beautiful private mansion with a large porch, and a curving driveway leading to a home for caretakers and servants. The price was high, but we bought it.

"We became prestigious, soon requiring a full-time resident housekeeper to cook, clean, and look after us. Mrs. Ringler, whose first

name I can no longer recall, appeared on the scene as an applicant for the housekeeping job. She was about 65 years old, a widow from Paris, Ill. We had the good fortune to hire Mrs. Ringler, who from then on became known to all fraternity members as Mom Ringler.

"Mom was an excellent cook who sent her 'boys' to school after serving them a special breakfast. She had her own room in the house, but seemed to keep a 24-hour schedule. Mom listened to our social and financial troubles. She knew our individual habits, including everyone's school hours and routines.

"We initiated her into membership of Xi Psi Phi and gave her a fraternity pin, which she wore continuously. She was 'mom' to all members for the seven or eight years she stayed, but her most lasting and closest attachments were to those of us she mothered during her first four years.

"Mom eventually moved away from Indianapolis, but for years she would return as an invited guest to the Indiana dental convention in May. Each year she would take an easy chair at the top of the wide stairway that joined the main floor and mezzanine floor of the old Claypool Hotel, which has since been torn down. There, she would eagerly look down the stairs, waiting to recognize and welcome each of her boys as he arrived. At the May meeting, I believe it was in 1940, we hired a professional photographer to take a picture of Mom surrounded by some of her favorite students.

"Mom Ringler sewed the buttons on our clothes and assisted us in countless other ways as we went through dental school. She loved her boys, and her boys loved her."


In another change, the dental school's annual awards program for dental and dental hygiene graduates was moved to the IUPUI campus and held as a noontime banquet on April 12.















housands of dental graduates have passed from Indiana University's classrooms and clinics into the distinguished profession of dentistry since Dr. Maynard K. Hine first arrived on the IU scene 52 years ago.* While he has looked with pride upon all graduates down through the decades, two grads are especially dear to the man who holds IU's longest record of continuous service as dean of dentistry** (1945-1968) and who has the distinction of having served as the first chancellor of the IUPUI campus (1969-1973).

The more recent of those two graduates earned his Doctor of Dental Surgery degree this May. He is William C. Hine Jr., one of Dr. Hine's four grandsons.

"I've always known I wanted to be a dentist," says the young Dr. Hine, who was born during Dr. Maynard Hine's stint as chancellor of IUPUI.


Will was extremely pleased that his grandfather participated in Commencement. Also on hand for the celebration were Will's parents, William Sr. and Betsy Hine, of Terre Haute. Will's father is dean of continuing education at Eastern Illinois University, and his mother is a librarian at Indiana State University. Also present were Will's wife, Michelle, an elementary school teacher in Wayne Township; and his younger brother, Charley, an IU senior on the Bloomington campus (who, by the way, has his sights set on dental school).

During his four years in dental school Will enjoyed living in the same town as his grandfather, which made frequent visits between the two possible. And Will has recently learned that he won't have to say goodbye to grandpa anytime soon—he's just been accepted into the IU School of Dentistry's newly established one-year postdoctoral general practice program, coordinated by Dr. Heidi C. Crow, a visiting assistant professor of hospital dentistry in the Department of Oral Surgery, Medicine, and Pathology.

The other graduate close to Dr. Maynard Hine's heart was his own father, Dr. Clyde L. Hine, who graduated from the Indiana Dental College in 1904. When Indiana University acquired the College in 1925, graduates of the College were offered an IU diploma. Dr. Clyde Hine took advantage of that offer during his son's tenure as dean. Dean Hine signed his father's diploma on March 16, 1952.

Dr. Clyde Hine practiced general dentistry in Tuscola, Ill., the town where Maynard was reared. But, as Maynard Hine has pointed out on several occasions, he is a bonafide Hoosier. "When I was due to arrive, my mother went home to be with her sister in Waterloo, Ind., where I was born on August 25, 1907," Dr. Hine explained to IU faculty member Arden G. Christen when Arden was preparing an oral history of Dr. Hine's life a decade ago. "I

lived in that town for three weeks until my mother was able to make the trip back to Illinois. So you see, I'm a Hoosier. I have many relatives still around DeKalb County."

Dr. Hine's wife, Harriett, for whom several IU scholarships

and awards are named, died in 1972. The Hines' other two children live in Maryland: Maynard K. Hine Jr. is retired from the Defense Department, and Judith Hyde is an administrator at a healthcare facility.
