New chair in anatomy and cell biology

Kathryn Jane Jones, PhD, director of the Neuroscience Institute at the Stritch School of Medicine, Loyola University Chicago and president of the American Association of Anatomists, has accepted the position of chair of the Department of Anatomy and Cell Biology at the Indiana University School of Medicine. Pending formal approval by the IU trustees, Dr. Jones will begin her new duties Jan. 1.

She will succeed David B. Burr, PhD, who is professor and chair of anatomy and cell biology and professor of orthopaedic surgery and biomedical engineering. He was appointed to the chairmanship in 1990. Dr. Burr will remain on faculty and pursue his research on bone strength and agents that undermine bone density.

Dr. Jones' research interests include the therapeutic use of steroid hormones in neuronal regeneration, neural-immune interactions in nerve injury and repair, combinatorial treatment approaches in spinal cord injury, and amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a fatal motoneuron disease.

Currently, she is working in collaboration with clinical colleagues in otolaryngology to translate the use of steroid hormones in different types of peripheral nerve injury, including facial nerve damage, to the clinical situation, and in neurology to extend her discoveries of immune-mediated neuroprotection to the field of ALS, in which recent evidence is beginning to suggest immune involvement in the progressive loss of motoneurons that develops with this disease.

Dr. Jones also will have an adjunct appointment at the Roudebush VA Medical Center in Indianapolis. BACK TO TOP

Tierney to lead Regenstrief Institute

William M. Tierney, MD, Chancellor's Professor and Joseph J. Mamlin Professor of Medicine, has been named president and chief executive officer of the Regenstrief Institute, Inc., pending approval by the Indiana University trustees. He also will serve as associate dean for clinical effectiveness research at IUSM.

An international leader in medical informatics and health services research, Dr. Tierney studies the effects of innovative, computer-based interventions to improve health care quality and lower costs of

health care delivery. He serves as chief of medicine at Wishard Health Services, where he practices as a hospital-based general internist.

Dr. Tierney will step down from his current position as director of research for the IU-AMPATH Program in East Africa to assume his new position, which begins in October.

He succeeds Thomas S. Inui, MD, who remains with the institute, where he focuses on global health research. Dr. Inui has served as president and CEO of Regenstrief Institute and associate dean for health care research since 2002.

Travel reimbursement policy changes

Beginning **Aug. 1**, employee and non-employee travelers will have 60 days from the return date of their trip to submit travel reimbursement claims. Reimbursements submitted after this 60-day period will be subject to income tax assessment.

Reimbursement claims submitted after 120 days from the return date of the trip will not be reimbursed. Indiana University Foundation funds may not be used for the reimbursement after this time period. These deadlines are required by the IRS, and will be strictly observed.

New centralized postdoc job database

- Access all postdoc opportunities at IUSM in a centralized database

This week on Sound Medicine

This weekend, Saturday, July 10, and Sunday, July 11, Sound Medicine host Barbara Lewis and guests will discuss hospital deaths, quality assurance for health care and acupuncture.

Co-host Kathy Miller, MD, associate professor of medicine and breast cancer specialist at Indiana University School of Medicine (IUSM), will provide an update on the most significant papers presented at the recent meeting of the American Society of Clinical Oncologists.

Co-host David Crabb, MD, chairman of the Department of Medicine and professor of biochemistry and molecular biology at IUSM, will explain the nuances of a study that found a 10 percent increase in hospital deaths in July, the first month that new medical residents are on duty.

Greg Pawlson, MD, MPH, executive vice president of the National Committee for Quality Assurance, will discuss development of metrics to measure value-based health care.

Rachel Manber, PhD, professor of psychiatry and behavioral science at Stanford School of Medicine, will discuss her study of using acupuncture to treat depression in pregnant women.

Gerald Imber, MD, a surgeon and author, will discuss his latest book, *Genius on the Edge: The Bizarre Double Life of Dr. William Stewart Halsted*, who is known as the father of modern surgery and struggled with drug addiction throughout his life.

This week's *Sound Medicine* "Checkup" will explore the effects of hot peppers in your diet with David Heber, MD, PhD, director of the Center for Human Nutrition at David Geffen School of Medicine, UCLA.

Infant and prenatal care courses

The Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute (CTSI) Community Health Engagement Program (CHEP) will sponsor several programs for prenatal and infant caregivers Tuesday, July 20, at Memorial Hospital in Jasper, Ind.

They are:

- "Integrating Screening and Treatment of Substance Use into Prenatal Care," from 9 a.m. to noon, will provide information aimed at reducing incidents of alcohol, tobacco and other drug use by pregnant women, which has been estimated at a high rate in Indiana, affecting nearly 18,000 babies per year. Recent research indicates that only 5 to 10 percent of pregnant women are identified and receive appropriate treatment for substance use disorders. - "Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) Risk Reduction," from 1 to 4 p.m., will provide information aimed at reducing the risk factors for SIDS, as well as demonstrate how nurses and other health-care practitioners can help parents by modeling safe sleep practices. Current statistics suggest that SIDS remains the leading cause of death among U.S. infants between one month and one year of ages, despite significant progress made in reducing SIDS over the past decade. www.indianaperinatal.org/sections/calendar_event.php?id=95.
