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NIEDERPRUEM WINS MOORE AWARD

pr. Donald J. Niederpruem, professor of microbiology and immunology at the Indiana University School of Medicine, has been selected as the first recipient of the Edward C. Moore Award for Outstanding Teaching at IUPUI, it was announced Feb. 11 at the annual IUPUI Learning Resources Symposium.

Dr. Glenn W. Irwin Jr., vice president of I.U. for Indianapolis, introduced Dr. Niederpruem and presented him with the \$1,000 prize that goes with the award. Establishment of the award was announced last year to honor Dr. Moore on the occasion of his retirement as dean of the faculties and executive dean and to recognize his commitment to the advancement of quality teaching here. Dr. Moore, who has continued in his retirement as acting dean of academic affairs at I.U.—Kokomo and special assistant to Dr. Irwin, was on hand for the conference.

Any faculty member may nominate anyone on the IUPUI faculty for the honor, sending it and any supporting evidence to the office of the vice president. An anonymous committee appointed by Dr. Irwin weighs the dossiers and makes a recommendation for the final selection.

The Learning Resources Symposium was considered an outstanding success by the sponsoring committee, which was headed by Dorothy Webb, representing the School of Liberal Arts. A large group of faculty members turned out for the keynote address by Dr. Robert Kegan, lecturer at the Harvard Graduate School of Education, and stayed to participate in one or more of the 17 small group discussions-demonstrations of the best in modern teaching techniques.

SEARCH COMMITTEE NAMED FOR MEDICAL DEAN

Dr. Morris Green, Perry W. Lesh professor and chairman of pediatrics at the School of Medicine and physician-in-chief at the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children has been named chairman of a search and screen committee to replace Dr. Steven C. Beering as dean of the I.U. School of Medicine.

Dr. Beering, who has been dean of the medical school since 1974 and who also has served as director of the entire I.U. Medical Center, will become the ninth president of Purdue University on July 1.

Green's appointment was made by I.U. President John W. Ryan, who also named him to head an advisory committee to furnish counsel to the search committee from a number of university and outside constituencies.

Besch Jr., Showalter professor of pharmacology, chairman of pharmacology and professor of medicine; Catherine G. Palmer, professor of medical genetics and president of the medical faculty; Dr. Charles Fisch, distinguished professor of medicine and director of the Krannert Institute of Cardiology; Dr. Hugh C. Hendrie, Albert Eugene Sterne professor of clinical psychiatry and chairman of psychiatry; Dr. Robert L. Campbell, Betsey Barton professor of neurosurgery, professor of surgery and director of the Section of Neurosurgery; Dr. Eugene C. Klatte, distinguished professor of radiology and chairman of radiology; William H. Mohr, medical student and former I.U. student trustee; Dr. Patrick J. B. Corcoran, national chairman of the Council on Medical Education, professor emeritus of medicine, and immediate past director of the Evansville Center for Medical Education; Michael J. O'Connor, administrative assistant, ex officio.

Dr. Ryan expressed his hope that a new dean of medicine could be named by July 1. The search and screen committee will report its findings to Dr. Glenn W. Irwin Jr.

ANOTHER FIRST

Indiana's first Nuclear Magnetic Resonance (NMR) medical imaging device, one of the most promising of the new diagnostic instruments, went into operation last week at University Hospital. By a complex system of powerful magnetic force, radio signal transmissions, and computerized graphics, the machine can "picture" the body's soft tissues — the organs and muscles — more thoroughly than any other machine now in use.

Part of an investigative program under the direction of Dr. Eugene C. Klatte, distinguished professor and chairman of the Department of Radiology, the NMR imager at University Hospital is one of a dozen such instruments now being used in clinical research at medical institutions in the United States. Information obtained is expected to demonstrate that the NMR is a safe method of providing scientists and physicians with information about diseases that cannot be provided through existing methods of diagnosis such as X-ray, ultrasound and angiograms.

The NMR has been used in laboratories for some time to examine small samples of living tissue without destroying or altering them. (Such a machine was installed last year in the Department of Physics of the Purdue School of Science at IUPUI.) It provides investigators with information about basic life processes without interfering with life itself and now has been adapted to do the same for physicians who are looking at the total human body.

LEGALIZATION OF LIFE EXPLORED

"The Accelerating Legalization of American Life" will be the topic for invited participants and interested discussants at a round-table discussion at 2 p.m. Thursday in Room 318 of the University Library. Sponsored by the IUPUI Center for American Studies, the symposium will discuss the increasingly litigous state of the union.

Headliner for the afternoon discussion and an evening lecture will be E. Gordon Gee, president of West Virginia University, a lawyer and expert in the areas of

legal problems in education and labor law. His free lecture is scheduled at 8:15 p.m. in Lecture Hall 101. In addition to the lecture, all interested persons are invited to attend the round-table and a reception at 5 p.m. in the Commons at the School of Social Work.
