DEBATERS WIN POINTS

A debating team from IUPUI has won the first-place trophy in a 20-school competition at Butler University.

The team of Miss Gail Stygall and Thomas E. Kieper won all four of its rounds while arguing affirmatively on the tournament proposition "Resolve: Should the Federal Government Control the Supply and Utilization of Energy in the United States?"

The IUPUI negative team of Mrs. Eugene Hammil and Isaiah Stansberry won two of its four debates and the combined totals for the two teams gave IUPUI the fourth-best total ranking in the tournament.

In the rankings of individual speakers, Miss Stygall placed fifth and Kieper was 13th.

The Indianapolis Law School moot court team reached the quarter finals in the national moot court competition sponsored by the New York City Bar Association before losing to one of the finalists, the University of Kentucky.

The Indianapolis team, beating Big Ten and Chicago teams to win the regional competition and the invitation to New York, won over the University of San Diego and University of Georgia teams in the 25-team quarter finals before losing to Kentucky.

There were 230 teams entered in the national competition, which is judged on the basis of the ability of the moot court teams to prepare and argue a case in a trial situation.

The Indianapolis Law School team included Frank Northam and John Thar of Indianapolis, and David Campbell of Terre Haute. All are third-year law students.

Their faculty adviser, Professor Jeffrey W. Grove, said the judges ranked the Indianapolis team at the top in the oral argument phase of the competition.

The telephone rate increase recently approved by the Public Service Commission will increase the annual telephone rental for IUPUI by approximately \$60,000.

The central telephone account for CENTREX absorbed an increase about two years ago but will not be able to absorb the current increase. Accordingly, the monthly rental rates for each telephone number will be increased by \$2 per month. The rates for extension phones (\$8.70) will not be adjusted at this time.
