Mock Site Visit 2 concludes; watch for details later this month

Throughout this week, IU School of Medicine hosted three mock evaluators as part of a second mock site visit designed to closely replicate the April 2017 site visit. A key step in preparation for reaccreditation, the visit concluded on Wednesday with a summary session of the evaluators' key impressions and recommendations.

The three evaluators came from medical schools with regional campuses. Two of the evaluators' medical schools just recently went through successful reaccreditation efforts, making their insights particularly valuable.

"This isn't just about compliance. While successful reaccreditation is critically important, this is about much more than that," explained Jay Hess, MD, PhD, MHSA, dean, IU School of Medicine, and vice president for clinical affairs, Indiana University. "We are preparing the next generation of healers, who will impact the lives of countless patients and impact the culture of medicine for decades to come. Leading up to and continuing after reaccreditation, the school will build on our insights to ensure that we have uniform excellence in education across all nine campuses and a continuous quality improvement system that ensures year-over-year excellence in the future."

New health systems science course focuses on care delivery

Heeding the national call for changes in medical school curricula, IU School of Medicine is focusing its curriculum on practice issues that are patient centered rather than disease centered. As part of this emphasis, a new course, "Health Systems Science: Teamwork and Communication to Facilitate Patient Care," is being introduced into IUSM's curriculum. The HSS course will be offered to MS3 students between Oct. 27 and March 23, with the objective to help students gain knowledge and expertise about working in multi-professional groups to improve health delivery to patients.

Student input played a key role in developing this course. Feedback from last year's MS2 students on the Quality Health Delivery module shaped the design of the course. In addition, MS2 and MS3 students were actively involved in the development of the HSS course curriculum.

The health systems science course includes longitudinal experience of providing patient care through a multidisciplinary approach. It helps students understand the roles of other healthcare team members by allowing medical students to consult with volunteer student resource persons from other programs in nursing, pharmacy, and public health. The course will enable students to take a closer look at -- and gain appreciation for-- the healthcare issues they will encounter during their careers.

The new course consists of six separate sessions. Part of the first and last sessions will be delivered in person, while the other four sessions will be online.

"The activities for each of the six sessions will give students deeper insight into what it takes to provide outstanding patient care in a modern healthcare environment," said Ken Lazarus, MD, senior academic content specialist.

This new course is facilitated through the American Medical Association-Accelerating Change in Medical Education grant.

IU Health's Murphy shares details about Bloomington medical campus

The design phase of IU Health's Bloomington Medical Campus is well underway, with groundbreaking projected for the second quarter of 2017 and about three years of construction to follow, according to IU Health President and CEO Dennis M. Murphy.

But the impetus behind its construction, planned along 75 acres north of the Indiana 45/46 Bypass next to the IU Golf Course, is less about the buildings themselves and more about evolving models of health care and the opportunities for innovation and entrepreneurship they will create, Murphy told attendees of a Greater Bloomington Chamber of Commerce luncheon held recently at IU's Franklin Hall.
