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### IUPUI ECONOMIST SAYS RECESSION HERE "AVOIDABLE"

The IMEX, an index of leading economic indicators for the Indianapolis metropolitan area, turned down for the first quarter of 1979, but the downturn does not necessarily mean a recession must hit Central Indiana. The IMEX, developed by Robert J. Kirk, associate professor of economics at IUPUI, declined moderately, from 95.48 in the fourth quarter of 1978 to 95.10 in the first quarter of 1979.

Kirk's research shows that when recessions have occurred at the national level in the past, the IMEX already had moved downward for a period of three to four quarters.

Four components make up the IMEX. In the first quarter of 1979, three turned down and one turned up. Going down were the deflated money supply, housing permits and new claims for unemployment insurance. The fourth component, weekly hours worked in manufacturing, went up.

The deflated money supply indicator is based on checking accounts and savings and time deposits, minus certificates of deposits of \$100,000 or more in the three major Indianapolis banks.

Housing permits have drifted downward since a peak reached in the fourth quarter of 1977. The pool of potential new home buyers may be drying up in the face of rising prices of homes, increasing cost of mortgages, and declining growth in real income.

Kirk said the strength in the average weekly hours worked in manufacturing reflects the build-up of inventories as firms replenish stocks depleted during the strong fourth quarter of 1978 and the placing of orders in anticipation of higher prices. "If the consumer is 'running out of gas' in terms of declining real income growth and is unwilling to assume more installment credit," Kirk said. "then there is an increasing chance that inventories would accumulate. Business firms would respond with layoffs.

"A recession could be avoided if other sectors of the economy can pick up the slack in the housing and consumer durables sectors," he said. If nonresidential construction, the capital goods industries and the nonmanufacturing sector of the economy pick up the slack, then a positive rate of growth can be sustained. However, with fuel availability the problem it is, household expenditures may be further weakened and other sectors that were expected to sustain the economy could become vulnerable."

The geographic area covered by the IMEX includes Marion County and the seven surrounding counties.

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### CHINESE ADDED TO WEEKEND COLLEGE SCHEDULE

East meets West on weekends this fall when Weekend College offers the first Asiatic language course at IUPUI.

The inclusion of C101, Elementary Chinese, makes five foreign languages now offered at IUPUI. Taught by Ling-hsia Yeh of the I.U. Department of East Asian Languages and Cultures, the course introduces the student to Mandarin Chinese. The instructor will use the <u>pin-yin system</u> which is the most current, official and easy-to-recognize romanization system from the People's Republic of China.

### BE ENERGETIC TO REDUCE ENERGY

<u>IUPUI</u> is going on an energy diet: Every faculty member, staff member and student is invited to join a campaign to cut electrical consumption by 10 percent.

Vice President Glenn W. Irwin, Jr. this week announced the beginning of the "Be A Watt Watcher" campaign that will go on for the next six months in an effort to save as much as \$600,000 in electrical costs for the university. To make it more "interesting" and to indicate the university's seriousness on energy reduction, \$500 in cash prizes will be offered to those who suggest the best practical energy-saving ideas.

<u>Electrical costs at IUPUI are huge--more than \$18,000 a day</u> is in the budget for next year. And costs are rising--we spent about \$12,000 a day in fiscal 1978-79.

So the stakes are high, and there is <u>room for improvement</u>. Physical Plant personnel have taken steps to reduce electrical usage but, short of large expenditures for new equipment and systems, they cannot do much more. But you can. You see things every day to help cut energy usage. The point is to be aware of them, and act on them.

The program begins in earnest now with supervisors and faculty members meeting with employees and announcing in classes the campaign and the incentive suggestion program. Also, energy-conscious people will be recognized in a series of newsletters, and hints on how to save energy will be distributed widely. Next week the Green Sheet will have a special energy supplement.

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
