

PEDIATRIC DENTISTRY OFFERS NEW PROGRAM FOR LITTLE ONES

xpectant parents, parents of children newborn to three years old, grandparents, and others who care for children are invited to the first campus program, "Infant and Toddler Dental Care." The new education outreach program, the first of its kind in the nation, is the brain child of India-born, Dr. Hala Henderson, chairman, Div. of Undergraduate Pediatric Dentistry and professor of pediatric dentistry. Her assistants, JoAnn Heasley, coordinator of the infant dental care program, and Elizabeth Hatcher, special projects coordinator, will teach the basics of good dental hygiene, even for little people with only one tooth. Focus will be on very young children and a condition known as "Nursing Infant Syndrome" in which decay and abscess are caused by nursing bottle or breast during sleep. Many infants with this problem have been treated at the School of Dentistry. Adults will be shown how a terry cloth "toothbrush" can be used to clean tiny teeth of infants and toddlers. They will be shown the importance of dental hygiene for infants and of a dental checkup before the age of three, the traditional age for a first checkup. Civic and religious groups, social organizations, hospitals and day care centers are expected to sponsor the program. The first campus program is Oct. 6, noon-1 p.m., Nursing Building, room 204. Hours there are 8 a.m.-7 p.m., Mon.-Thurs., 8 a.m.-5 p.m.--Fri., 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m.--Sat., closed Sunday. Science and Engineering Library at 38th St. has a little known collection of more than a quarter-million technical reports on microfiche from NASA and NTIS (National Technical Information Service). Hours are: 8 a.m.-10 p.m.--Mon.-Thurs., 8 a.m.-5 p.m.--Fri.-Sat., 1-5 p.m.--Sunday. Back on the downtown campus, the toothsome School of Dentistry Library is closed Sunday. It is open 7:30 a.m.-10 p.m.--Mon.-Thurs., 7:30 a.m.-5 p.m.--Fri., 9 a.m.-4:30 p.m.--Sat. The School of Law Library is esthetically beautiful and a good study place. Hours there are 8 a.m.-11 p.m.--Mon.-Fri., 9 a.m.-7 p.m.--Sat., noon-9 p.m.--Sunday. Finally, the School of Medicine Library, in the Medical Science Building, is the place to burn midnight oil.
