And Whereas.


These Games offer a rare opportunity to make friends from 38 nations in our half of the world for our campus, our city, and our state;



PAINLESS PAN AM PARKING: ARRIVE EARLY, USE 10TH STREET AND GARAGES



In the map above, the area bordered by the dash lines shows where Pan Am Games spectators will park weekdays. Weekends and evenings they will use all lots south and north of Michigan St. and east of Agnes St. Staff, faculty and students are urged to use garages and not spectator parking, but with some exceptions, they can park wherever their permits are valid. The exceptions are lots 86, 87 and 88, which will be VIP lots requiring special permits that will be given faculty and staff who regularly use them; Lot 81 which will be closed for an information tent, and all lots south of New York Street. You are urged to use 10th St. as much as possible, arrive before 9 a.m. when most games begin, be patient and follow the directions of police officers who will be working overtime to keep things moving. New students who come to campus to register Aug. 17-20 for fall classes will not be charged the \$3 spectator parking fee.

GAMES COVERAGE CAN BE FOUND in the two special editions of the Sagamore, Aug. 10 and 17, available on campus and downtown. They will include Pan Am information about the campus and the city. The annual orientation edition will be available Aug. 24.

STILL—PAX/I NEEDS VOLUNTEERS AND TICKETS ARE AVAILABLE FOR MOST SPORTS. The Games are just days away now, but volunteers are still needed. The credentials and uniform people are running a great show at the Deaf School. The wait is not long and people are friendly. Pan Am fever is finally catching on. PAX/I says people are needed for driving and warehousing. Also, except for the final basketball game, tickets are still available. Call 239-1111.

PAN AMIRACLES: PUBLICATIONS, PARKING, POLICE

There's no better opportunity to boast about ourselves than during the Games, and there's no better boaster than the Office of PUBLICATIONS, directed by Noel Duerden. Natives and guests alike also need information, and Noel's fine staff has provided that too—in two languages, of course. In "Amiga's Guide to IUPUI," guests will learn that only American money will work on campus, that police are ready to handle all emergencies, where to get photocopies, emergency help, what kind of money works, transportation and much more. In the booklet "Viva!", we brag a little and do it well. In "Factos" we give just the facts on facing pages—one in English, the other in Spanish. Also, Publications has printed La Pinata all year, not to mention many Pan—Am related flyers. Publications has kept us informed.

PARKING SERVICES has been in the hot seat from the beginning. On a campus already congested with vehicles, Parking Services was handed the thankless job of finding a way to accommodate guests and all of us "regulars." It simply comes down to asking us all to "move over" and make room for company. John Gilbert and his staff have overseen parking arrangements, special passes, attended dozens of PAX/I meetings and answered hundreds of calls about parking. During the games, we repeat, stay north of New York, use garages (there will be no charge if you have a surface permit), drive on 10th Street, and remember Parking Services people also have to park.

POLICE Chief John Mulvey and his able assistant Larry Propst have tried to imagine every security problem that could face us during the Games and have worked out a real plan. Our own officers will be joined by imports of IU police from Bloomington, Gary and the Northwest campuses. Also, Mulvey has the help of Spanish-speaking Hispanic officers from several municipal police departments from around the state. All the officers have undergone Spanish language and culture training. They will literally live on campus 24 hours a day during the Games. The IUPUI Police Department needs and deserves our cooperation and support everyday of the Games.

MERE MENTION WILL HAVE TO DO Deadlines and space limitations makes it necessary to only mention some of the other Pan Am miracle workers on campus. But you should know that Marjorie Albohm, from the International Institute of Sports Science and Medicine, IU School of Medicine, is head athletic trainer for the Games and she, along with Jay Bradley, are responsible for 350 athletic trainers from the U.S. who will provide medical care for all athletes. Associate Dean John Hunger and the School of Environmental Affairs have enlisted and trained students for security work during the games. Some are earning credits, and John gives even more credit to his secretary Cindy Baker for all her help. Even if there was space enough, enough could not be written about the involvement of Dale Neuburger and his staff at the Natatorium, and about Dean Nick Kellum and his staff in the School of Physical Education. Also, Ed Erotas and his Union Building staff have made ready 20 rooms that await media groups from the U.S. and Canada.

ALL CERTIFIED SPANISH-SPEAKERS CAME THROUGH IUPUI

The Games. Not just on campus, but all over Indiana, when it's all said and done, much of it will have been said in Spanish and nearly every volunteer who heard and understood the language and talked with VIPs, guests and athletes will have been tested, interviewed, polished and finally certified through the Pan American Events and Language Programs Office (PANAMELP) at IUPUI. Mary Carr, director, and Marta Cruz, her assistant, have provided PAX/I with more than 2,000 Spanish speakers who range in age from 16-70 and who are from as many walks of life as you can imagine. In addition, both women were deeply involved in the Model Organization of American States held last December in Washington, D.C. and attended by nearly 300 students. They set up testing sites and held language programs in many high schools all over the state. They directed IUPUI's Mini Pan Am Games Day last spring that brought 1,200 students to campus. They just completed an intentsive language session for the 215 Spanish-speaking high school students who are now assigned to the Athletes Village. PANAMELP has touched thousands of people who will touch thousands more and they have been involved with students from more than 90 secondary schools in the state. If all this was not enough, the office published La Pinata, the monthy information newsletter you found in the Green Sheet and they helped many of us all over campus with Spanish words and phrases. (Oh, yes. Marta Cruz got married.) During the games they will be on 24-hour call. Mary will be in the field as attache to 109 people from Panama and Marta will be assistant attache to the 900 expected from Cuba. Neither will get a breather when the games end. Mary, who has been on loan to us from the Lawrence School Corporation, begins her teaching duties on Aug. 24, a day after the Games end, and Marta begins a job search.



KNOW WHAT IS OFF LIMITS Emily Wren, administrative affairs, advises that only ticketholders or those with proper credentials will be admitted to all sports venues—on campus and off. Also, the second floor, north—south corridor of the Education/Social Work Building will be strictly off—limits to those without official PAX/I credentials. Entry to the Conference Center also will require special ID. All other buildings will be accessible, as usual.

BOB AND BILL PERSONIFY PAN AM SPIRIT

Robert Baxter and William Spencer, both in the vice president's office, have worked nearly every day for two years on some phase or other of the Pan American Games. Bob, with lots of help from his secretary Phyllis Boston, "copes," He coordinates all campus-related Pan Am events--police, buildings, activities and more. Beyond the campus, Bob has attended more meetings than he can remember in his job as co-chairman of the Language/Meeting Services Division of PAX/I. In that job, he and other volunteers have provided translators and every imaginable need--transportaion, entertainment, food, lodging, shopping, medical needs--everything for pre-Games meetings of officials from the 38 involved countries. There's another whole page, single-spaced which explains his duties, but there's nothing to explain how he stays calm and keeps smiling. A long time ago, it seems now, Bill Spencer literally wrote the book on the Games. He took a mountain of paper -- graphs, unintelligle directions and explanations -- and wrote it all into a succinct, readible and, better yet, understandble official guidebook to be used by everyone connected with the games. Bill invented the easy to read events chart on page five, and has kept a running calendar of every event related to the Games. Bill thinks. He writes. He is excited about the Games and proud of IUPUI's involvement. His only advice for the Games: "Be friendly and have fun."





In these photos taken by Ron Hanson, are two volunteers who will be actively involved in the Pan Am Games. The woman on the left has apparently forgotten to read her Pan American Games Volunteer Handbook. The woman on the right has it right. Volunteers are to wear their official uniform at all times when they work at the Games. Shoes are to be "decent" (As opposed to indecent?), and of the street or tennis variety. Shirts are to be tucked in, jewelry is to be demure or not at all, clothes are to be clean and pressed, hats or visors are to be worn--frontwards probably. Volunteers are not allowed to bring cameras to any sport venue. And, at no charge to anyone, they are to be clean, neat, courteous, polite, friendly. Further, it will not hurt anything if they do not make hand gestures that are likely to offend people from other countries -- or this one for that matter. Volunteers are to be prompt in showing up at their designated post, and they are to remember to tack down the PAX/I patch on their shirt, lest it peels off from being in the washing machine every night -- one uniform per volunteer, please.

PHYSICIANS AND SPORTS MEDICINE TEST AND MEET

Dr. Ronald Blankenbaker heads the Sports Medicine Laboratory at the medical center that will do 1,200 drugs tests on Pan Am athletes. He will make a presentation during the sports medicine conference at IUB Aug. 5-7. Doctors, trainers and coaches will be among the 500 expected participants in the Pan American Sports Congress when it meets to learn the latest on sports-related health. "Our" Doc Bowen, now secretary of Health and Human Services is honorary chairman and speaks at noon on Aug. 7.

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
