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

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

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

This will be my fifteenth annual report as president of the American Turners, and also my last report, due to the change in our constitution which provides that no president shall hold office for any greater length of time than two two-year terms, which restriction I heartily agree with, was instrumental in having the change made, and believe it will work out to the best interests of the American Turners because of necessity we will now have executive officers located in different cities from time to time, which at least should create some enthusiasm in the city in which our president is located for a period of two or four years. The more people who know about our problems from the executive end, the more ardent and sympathetic workers we will have.

Without searching the books too closely to verify the exact figures in the report which I make, I would say that in 1937, when the Executive Committee went to Detroit, we had approximately \$500 cash on hand and owed in outstanding obligations around \$23,000. Our membership was listed at that time as 21,694 members. However, at that time we were not getting an honest count of membership because many societies were carrying inflated numbers of their membership lists because our demand for payment of a per capita tax for each member was not enforced, and compromise settlement had been made from time to time, or obligations written off. After the societies were required to pay for each membership card which they issued, our membership dropped to approximately 18,000 members in 1941. Our membership rose to 26,000 in 1948 or 1949, and today has dropped back to 25,000 in 1952.

Our financial position has changed in that in 1937 we had practically nothing and a lot of debts. Today there are no debts owing except the current month to month obligations. We have on hand as of April 2, 1952, \$40,095.40 in the endowment fund and \$23,657.57 in the various accounts under the control of the National Council. These two accounts amount to \$63,752.97, and if we were to figure the \$23,000 in indebtedness which we wiped out, it would make a change in our financial position to an overall gain of \$86,752.97 since taking over the National Committee.

Since 1937 we have by convention action donated our normal college and summer camp at Elkhart Lake to Indiana University, where it presently is operated as a normal college of the American Gymnastic Union (American Turners) of Indiana University, and is a school of that college. We have continued to supply scholarship students and to furnish scholarships to Indiana University as in the past. Part of your per capita tax goes to this charitable and educational cause.

There have been other fundamental changes made in the last fifteen years, which include giving each of the regions of the American Turners a voting and full member of the National Council, thereby making it mandatory to keep control of our organization among the Turners in each and every district and region.

Our officers are elected at the convention by a vote of the whole convention, which is the democratic way of controlling our organization.

The endowment trust funds are under the control of the organization because the members of this trust are elected from the membership at large, and also from the national officers, which cannot be controlled by any clique or district.

We have instituted our Annual Christmas Seal Sale, which has resulted in a net profit to our organization this year in the amount of \$2,406.72 as of April 3rd. This money is used to promote our national festivals, to help defray expenses of our cultural and gymnastic championships, and for defraying the cost of instituting some of these educational features in our local societies.

There is presently in the Jahn Educational Fund the amount of approximately \$65,000, which is controlled by five trustees. There are also five advisory trustees on the board, from which successor trustees are chosen in case of vacancy among the trustees. I believe it would be a nice gesture if the Jahn board would allow its trustees to be elected at the national convention. It has been the contention of the Jahn Fund that they are entirely separate and independent of any domination whatsoever of the American Turners. This may or may not be true. However, I think in order to get away from the claimed closed corporation theory under which the trustees say they operate, that the better gesture would be, now that the fund has been established, and of which approximately \$29,000 of the National Committee money was used to set it in force, that the trustees should now amend their declaration of trust to allow their trustees to be elected by the American Turner organization at its national convention.

Since our committee has been in charge, we have set up a retirement program for our instructors and other employees of Turner societies who have been employed by the Turner societies for a period of one year or over. This seems to have done away with the uses of the instructors fund, and I believe that in view of the fact that we have old age security and our pension fund, that the active use of that fund for the purpose for which it originated seems to have been removed, and I believe the trustees of that fund should give some consideration to combining that fund with the American Turners Endowment Fund, and I am sure that at the following convention a plan could be worked out where some of the trustees of the Instructors Fund could be placed on the board of the Endowment Fund, so as to give that board a voice and vote in the operation of the combined funds. If that were done, the Endowment Fund would be placed in quite a respectable position, and eventually would become a fund upon which the national organization could depend for its existence, and which could be put to use some day in actively furthering the Turner cause by the loans of money to societies. It seems that good business might require at this time the unification of these two funds. I do not think it is out of order to discuss unification with the Jahn Fund at this time because everything that the Jahn Fund can do or has for the protection of the Turner Movement, the same principales are written into the American Turners Endowment Trust, and the money would be just as safe and just as fully protected as being part of a separate fund. The National Committee has deliberately sought to build up this fund and to build up the resources of the American Turners, as it is only through being an organization with financial stability that the Turners can go forward. A pauper can help no one, not even himself. Some societies seem to think that the American Turners as a national organization should be pauperized. I disagree violently with this theory, and believe that when we are sufficiently strong, and when our per capita tax could be raised to \$2.00, in view of the rising cost of everything, that the extra money could be used for the employment of a second assistant secretary, who would be required to be a graduate in gymnastics and a man able to take charge and run all of our gymnastic competitions, including our Turnfest, which should be run under the direction of the National Committee.

I am more positive than ever that Turnfests run at the local level will be a financial failure for the reason that too many cooks spoil the broth. Three men with authority and knowledge could have done what the last Turnfest Committee did in the way of organization and supervision, and could have made and saved more money.

The president believes the National Committee should never take a loss of \$12,000 on any Turnfest, but that if properly run, money can be made from admissions, advertising and other sources to keep it nearly on an even basis. While a per capita charge is taken out of the national per capita tax for the promotion of turnfests and championships, I do not believe this money should be thrown away just because we have it in our national treasury. To think that out of the entire city of 250,000 and out of the 2,000 visiting Turners and participants, and out of a membership of 250 of the local societies, which with their wives and children would probably number 1,000, that there was taken in in cash admissions at the door the sum of only \$851.40 is really a tragic understatement of the inefficiency or lack of publicity that Turners received, either through the local committee or the press. If the time has past when people are interested in our Turnfest, and when Turners themselves do not patronize the same or even sell tickets to the people in the communities in which our national competitions are held, then what is the use of continuing a National Turnfest? It would be better that invitational meets be held at various years, and have the National Committee subsidize at least three meets every year in the amount of \$500 or \$1,000 each. We would be far ahead from the standpoint of developing competition, advertising and finances.

When Detroit took the national office over from Pittsburg, we had no filing cabinets, adding machines, typewriters, office desk or equipment except one library table and six chairs. Today our national office is run on a business basis. We have complete office equipment, including desk, chairs, typewriters, adding machine, mimeograph machine, safe, and places to keep our records. We think that your office is presently operated on a business basis by Dr. Eklund, your National Executive Secretary, in whom I have confidence as an honest and efficient executive. However, I believe he should have an assistant in the nature of a technical assistant who can go out on the road. We have sufficient money in our treasury so I believe that we should gamble for the next two years and hire a teacher or an executive assistant to start at the amount of \$5,000 a year, plus necessary travelling expenses, to see if there is any future in the Turner Movement or whether we should let it go to pot and gradually die out.

I believe there is a place in America for the things that the Turner organization stands for, but I think it must be on a clean and a larger basis. Those societies which have less than twenty-five members should be compelled to take out memberships at large or be stricken from our national list. It costs more to keep one of those societies on our list than we get in revenue, and a society of that size generally contributes nothing to us, but we find their chief interest many times is keeping up a membership, which they could do through a membership at large, and many times operating only a social room with the chief interest in the beverage department. This is not a Turnverein, and this does not put our best foot forward to the public. I believe that many Turner societies cheapen themselves so much that they have lost all self-respect.

In looking over the start of the gym classes in Toledo, I have just examined an original document written in 1858, in which the charge for gym alone was fifty cents per month, or \$6.00 a year. Compare that today with some of our societies that charge only \$5.00 a year dues, including their per capita tax. The dollar had a buying power in 1858 which was five to one over what it has today, and still many societies seem to be insulted when you tell them they should have minimum dues of at least \$18.00 a year. You cannot maintain your society and keep your self respect on dues in any lesser amount.

I think membership in all societies should be open to women as well as men. A majority of our societies now elect women to membership on a full basis. That is what we stand for, equality of privilege and membership. We should practice what we preach.

The national magazine, including the last year, has operated within its budget, but with a reduced amount of copies, which I think are sufficient. If we turned out more copies, the per capita tax would have to be doubled, as we would have to have additional help to turn out our magazine. This is a tremendous source of work. You may not realize it, but try to take it over yourself, individually, and you can see that it takes many, many hours of a person's time to get the magazine into shape. These are things which your executive secretary does, and very few people seem to appreciate the effort and time put in.

The profits on the Christmas seals are also due entirely to the thought and origination of your national secretary.

Last year the National Committee staged an A.A.U. Gymnastic Championship. In a city the size of Detroit we found that the people were no longer interested in gymnastics in a big city, in spite of the newspaper advertising. Although there was a street car strike on in Detroit, Detroit is still an automobile city, and had people been interested we would have shown a profit out of staging the A.A.U. competition, instead of a loss. However, the Turners secured much advertising out of staging the competition.

I believe our Annual National Championships should be held each and every year in volley ball, gymnastics, swimming and bowling, and should be promoted, as now, through our National Council.

Bowling has proven to be a very popular sport. More people participate in bowling than in gymnastics, and, in addition, they pay their own way and return a profit to the local society. I believe every local society should operate its own bowling alleys as a source of

revenue from which to make money so that we could furnish to our communities physical and health education in our gymnastic classes at a loss. That is one of our public functions, to contribute to the welfare and health of the community.

Many of our societies and our national society have been declared tax exempt on the basis of being educational or charitable or club and society institutions under the federal tax laws. Many more of our societies could secure exemptions if they would do the things that are necessary to secure them, by carrying on the functions of a Turner society, including gymnastics and cultural classes, and including in their

programs certain charities within their means.

As you are aware, during the last two years I have been quite inactive, which I told you I would be at the last convention, when I was unwilling to assume the presidency again. Part of this has been deliberate. I wanted to see how our national secretary, Dr. Eklund, could function without any help or without any leadership. I think the first year was used by him in securing education as to what he wanted and what could be done, and the second year more things were done. I think now he is in shape that with a new president he can help give active leadership and direction to your society. I am satisfied now our organization has had two years of preparation to have the organization turned over to new administrative officers.

Your first vice-president, Alfred Kirschner of New York City, and Carl Anderson of Moline, Illinois, second vice-president, are both capable and honest men and good Turners, and fully able to lead your

organization in the future should the membership desire.

I want to thank all of the national officers who have worked with me during these many years, and our national treasurer, Lisle MacKay, who has worked with your executive secretary faithfully, regularly and diligently, not only as national treasurer, but also as a builder of your national bowling tournament, and has served as a clearing house and guide for the same.

I will be happy if within the next fifteen years the Turners show the same amount of gain that we have in the past fifteen years, although we haven't nearly fulfilled the objects which I dreamed would happen

when I took over the presidency of the organization.

Turners seem to be led by men that are too old in some districts. When one gets seventy and over, he must take it easy. In order to have a live organization, I think we can safely entrust the active leadership to people who are between forty and sixty years of age; they should have discretion; but we seem to think that, in many instances, youth cannot be trusted. I violently disagree with this, and hope that some of our younger members of the active and young ladies class can learn about our organization through serving as members of the boards of directors of the local societies.

I have spent many happy days with members of our organization in cities all over America. It has been a source of education and pleasure to me. I would not like to do it over again, but would not give up my experience for a million dollars.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

1951 was a busy year for your Secretary. Late in 1950 the Christmas Seal program was inaugurated. The development of the technique and art for this program had to be designed. The profit derived of \$3,003.00 was not too impressive.

In December 1950 the National Executive Committee approved of the sponsorship of the National A.A.U. Men and Women's Gymnastic Championships. The planning of such an event is an immense job, requiring the planning of arrangements, publicity, entries and physical equipment required. Artistically this event was a success. To quote from the 1952 Gymnastic Rule Book: "The event attracted a record number of entries and for the first time in the history of the sport required five sessions over a two day period for successful completion. Detroit, Michigan's Fair Ground Coliseum proved to be an ideal spot for such an elaborate and colorful affair. Floor area reminded one very much of the Empress Hall in London and the Olympic Games competition with three and four events being contested simultaneously with plenty of room to spare."

Next followed the National Festival in Buffalo. Copy for the Rules for Health and Physical Education Competition had to be prepared for printing, entry forms for both this competition and cultural competition had to be designed, publicity and releases to societies advising of plans, procedure and progress.

The adoption of the Statutes of the American Turners and the ratification of the Principles required that a great deal of information be provided to societies on the new procedures required to collect and distribute per capita tax payments to the districts. With the reorganization of the Council new methods of approval for various applications and question which need action by the whole council had to be devised. The procedure adopted. I believe have been successful in carrying out the work requirements of the council, with two or three meetings each year to develop general policy.

Societies have not reacted generally to supplement their programs in compliance with the Principles, which require:

- "A planned program for Health and Physical Education for the development of a sound body."
- "A planned program of Cultural Education for the development of a sound mind."
- "A planned recreational and social program for all members of the family group."

"Participation in all worthy civic projects, both local and national."

Societies and district officers are still extremely slow in making the necessary reports and in replying to communications. A great deal of time and effort is lost, when a whole National program must be held up, because of the delinquency of a few in not responding.

The American Turners always have had a program, which fraternal groups, service clubs and others are desperately striving to develop. The only organization with an activity for all members of the family. All of this many Turner societies try to carry on without any consideration of normal business principles. Dues should be the backbone of

the finances of the society program. All other possible income devoted to development and expansion, with an adequate living salary for all employees, equal to that paid in the community for similar work. Unfortunately, this is not true of the business operation of most societies and the reason for loss of membership and a general degeneration of formerly great societies.

Great progress has been made at the National level of the American Turners in the last fifteen years, as reported by President Carl M. Weideman, in his report. This has not been true at the society level, except in a few isolated cases, which can be counted on the fingers of one hand. Let us hope that the revised Statutes and the Principles of the American Turners will provide the incentive and program for a new progressive era for the American Turners.

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The efforts of the year 1951 were directed to the preparation of the 38th American Turner National Festival held in Buffalo, New York, June 29th through July 2nd. The list of entires included 244 men, 289 women, 220 senior men, 298 senior women totaling 1035 participants in the Physical Education competition. In apparatus competition there were entered 127 first grade men, 81 second grade men and 16 third grade men. The women were represented by 165 lower grade

women and 79 upper grade women totaling 243 women.

Judging from our experience during the Buffalo Festival, it is apparent that too many events have been added to a National Festival and that it has become too complex and unwieldy to operate. Many of the activities could be eliminated due to the lack of participants and changes could be made in the accepted events to make for a more successful operation. There have been numerous suggestions and recommendations made and one plan of re-organization presented. It will be necessary for the National Health and Physical Education Committee to review these recommendations with the thought in mind, that if changes are to be made, resolutions must be drafted to present to a National Convention previous to a National Festival.

The Instructor's Refresher Course was not held due to the lack of applicants as announced by the authorities of Indiana University. The detail in establishing such a course cannot be accomplished in a short time. This takes long range planning. A location must be chosen that includes adequate facilities condusive to a successful program. A course of study must be prepared and instructors contracted well in advance to permit proper preparation of materials and subject matter. The final decision rests upon sufficient number of applicants to guarantee the justification of the project. It is believed that the time element and the preparation for the Festival by the instructors played an important part in the lack of applicants. The instructors had been concentrating their efforts toward our national Festival. They brought their teams to Buffalo and worked as supervisors and judges. It is my opinion that after such a strenuous season they were not susceptible to the suggestion

that they take time out from a well-earned vacation to attend a summer session. A second point to consider is that many instructors, in order to augment their salary, must accept summer jobs. Nevertheless, we should not completely abandon this project as it has merit.

The Instructor's Meeting was recommended for November 22-23, 1951 during the Homecoming held at the Normal College A.G.U. of Indiana University at Indianapolis. This meeting was not approved by the National Council.

Concurring with a directive of the 43rd Convention held in New York, a poll was taken of the National Council for a decision regarding National Championships. Opinions expressed pointed to the National A.A.U. and Olympic Gymnastic trials held at State College, Pa., April 25-26, therefore, gymnastics were eliminated. Volleyball Championships were approved and three bids were received. The result of the poll of the Physical Education committee resulted in Detroit—5, Cleveland S.T.V. — 3 and New York District — 1, therefore, the Championships were awarded to American Turners-Detroit, April 5th and 6th, 1951.

The National Council has decided that bids be sent out for the 1953 Championships and that these again include Swimming-Diving, Basketball, Badminton, Gymnastics, and Volleyball. The Physical Education Committee has been directed to make plans for the conduct of these Championships.

A recommendation adopted at the New York Convention determined that a Regional Festival or Turnfest be planned for 1953. It is believed that the procedure to follow would be that the Regional Counselor call an organizational meeting of all Societies in his respective Region including all Instructors to determine time and location and that a committee be appointed including all Instructors with the Regional Representative of the National Physical Education Committee as Chairman to work out the technical plans.

In conclusion, it is my opinion that there are too many members and advisors on the National Physical Education Committee, separated by hundreds to thousands of miles. The expense in calling a national meeting is almost prohibitive in relation to the national income, therefore, it is not efficient as it does not meet frequently in order to conduct the necessary business of the committee. The operation through correspondence has not proved satisfactory. Therefore, I recommend serious consideration by the National Convention in the re-organization of the National Health and Physical Committee.

ASSETS

We have examined the statements of financial position of American Turners General Fund, Physical-Cultural Fund, and Endowment Trust Fund as of December 31, 1951, and the statements of income and expenses for the year then ended, have reviewed the accounting procedures of the funds and, without making a detailed audit of the transactions, have examined or tested accounting records of the funds and other supporting evidence by methods and to the extent we deemed appropriate. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures we considered necessary.

In our opinion, the accompanying statements of financial position and related statements of income and expenses present fairly, the position of American Turners General Fund, Physical-Cultural Fund, and Endowment Trust Fund at December 31, 1951, and the results of their operations for the year, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with the preceding year.

Income of all funds is reported on the accrual basis except that pledges to the American Turners Endowment Trust Fund were not accrued as income because of their uncertainty.

REPORT OF BOWLING COMMITTEE

The 1952 Bowling Tournament held at Cleveland under the direction of STV set a new record in the number of entries, the quality of entertainment for out-of-town guests and the enthusiasm of the participants. The tournament for men was held at the historically famous Linsz alleys while the women's section was scheduled for the STV lanes.

The number of participants in the women's tournament was twice that of the highest previous tournament, more than 500 women taking part. The men numbered over 1,000. The prize list for the tournament reached the sum of \$9,600, making this the richest event in the ten-year history of the National Tournament.

The Cleveland committee deserves the higest praise for their very fine reception of such a large group of competitors. Those in charge handled the thousands of details without strain. Those who attended were unanimous in their approval.

The National Council provided a new Traveling Trophy for the men's division, the previous one having been retired. A resolution was passed providing that both men's and women's Traveling Trophies shall never be retired from competition but shall remain a permanent record of accomplishment.

The 1953 Tournament was awarded to Fort Wayne Turners. Centrally located, it should draw at least as many competitors as Cleveland's five tournaments.

The Bowling Tournament has reached such proportions that larger range planning should be effected as soon as possible. The site of the tournament should be fixed as far as two years prior to the tournament.

Several districts carried out bowling programs this year with varying degrees of success. The feature of handicap bowling which permits competition between all ages makes it a natural activity for the Turner family. It is to be hoped that bowling will appear on the activity

calendar in more and more districts. Tournaments are not automatically successful but require careful planning and promotion.

At the close of the 1952 Tournament a new National Chairman of Bowling was appointed by the National Council. Turner Wesley Thomas, local chairman of the 1952 tournament was named advisory member of the National Physical Education Committee in charge of Bowling.

INSTRUCTORS' FUND OF THE AMERICAN TURNERS

The Instructors' Fund of the American Turners was established for the purpose of aiding Instructors who have served the Turners faithfully and who are seriously in need of assistance.

The following are some of the provisions of the Trust Agreement and Rules governing this Fund: All contributions must be added to the principal of the Fund. The principal must be invested only in high grade, United States Government, State or Municipal Bonds. One-fourth of the income of this Fund must be added to the principal to insure the growth of the Fund. The balance of the income is available for distribution to worthy applicants. In order that an application for aid may be considered, the applicant must have rendered faithful service as an Instructor in a Turner Society of the American Turners. Application for aid may be submitted by the applicant or by the Executive Officers of a Turner Society, in which the applicant served. In making distributions of funds to needy applicants, it is obligatory upon the Trustees to take into consideration the acts of Instructors and/or their Societies in contributing to the Fund. All officers handling monies or resources of the Fund are adequately bonded. No Trustee can receive any salary or compensation from the Fund.
