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Ten hospital programs ranked by US News

Ten clinical programs at Indiana University, Riley and Methodist hospitals ranked among the top 50 programs in the nation according to *U.S. News & World Report's* "2007 America's Best Hospitals Guide." Clarian's hospitals were the only Indiana hospitals included in the rankings and among only 173 hospitals recognized out of the 5,462 evaluated nationwide.

Programs at Clarian hospitals, a partner of the IU School of Medicine, received rankings in 10 clinical programs out of 16 specialties in the July 16 issue. *U.S. News* has annually ranked America's medical centers for 18 years "to help patients find the best hospital when the need is great." Board-certified specialists from across the country rank hospitals based on reputation, a mortality index, advanced technology capabilities, credentialing by professional bodies, and nursing care. Hospitals must also meet one of three requirements for eligibility for ranking: affiliation with a medical school, membership in the Council of Teaching Hospitals or having a minimum of at least six of 13 advanced technologies available.

This year's rankings do not include pediatrics, but *U.S. News* indicates this is only a temporary absence. It will return in the near future with revamped and expanded information.

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\$10 million gift supports joint IUSM and Notre Dame facility

Charles M. "Mike" Harper, retired chair and chief executive officer of ConAgra Foods and of RJR Nabisco, has made a \$10 million gift to the University of Notre Dame to support the construction of Harper Hall, a new building for expanded medical school and cancer research initiatives at the Indiana University School of Medicine-South Bend in partnership with Notre Dame.

The gift will be combined with \$10 million recently appropriated by the state to IU for the project. Harper's gift is in memory of his late wife, Josie.

"My wife Josie and I grew up, dated and then were married in South Bend," he said. "In 1999 she passed away from lung cancer. Our four children and I can think of no better tribute to this wonderful woman than the establishment of a cancer institute in the shadow of the Golden Dome in partnership with the state of Indiana."

Dr. Rudy Navari, assistant dean and director of IUSM-SB and director of Notre Dame's Walther Cancer Research Center, lauded Harper's decision to make a gift that would have such significant impact on his hometown.

Harper Hall will be similar in design and adjacent to Raclin-Carmichael Hall, which houses IUSM-SB and Notre Dame's Keck Center for Transgene Research at the corner of Angela Boulevard and Notre Dame Avenue.

The new facility will include laboratories and offices for IUSM-SB and Notre Dame's cancer research activities under the auspices of a new Mike and Josie Harper Cancer Research Institute. Scientists from Notre Dame and IU will collaborate on research in the area of cancer biology, with an emphasis on

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Message from Medicare for medical staff

Effective July 1, Medicare patients have the right to question a hospital discharge if they think they are being discharged too soon. They must be provided a copy of the Important Message from Medicare (IM) within two calendar days of admission. This document provides the Medicare patient with the information they need to appeal a discharge.

Additionally, Clarian must provide a follow-up copy of the notice before the day of discharge. This document requires a date and a signature of the patient or their representative. Clarian is required to retain a copy and give a copy to the beneficiary.

Clarian plans to accomplish this in the following way. The first letter will be the responsibility of Patient

Access Services and will be provided at the time of registration to all bedded patients. The second letter will be the responsibility of Care Management. Each department is required to obtain the signature of the patient or their representative, date the form, and give the patient the original with the copy being kept in the medical record.

Clarian is asking all physicians to assist Care Management by providing the discharge information to them as soon as it appears the patient might go home.
