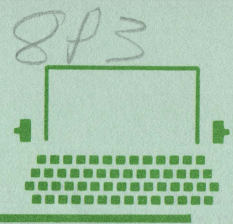

GrantSearch

UP-TO-THE-MINUTE MONEY SOURCES AVAILABLE ON CAMPUS

GrantSearch, which offers access to a national computerized database that provides daily updated information on government and private funding sources is now available at no charge. It is offered in cooperation with the I.U. Foundation and Research and Sponsored Programs. GrantSearch is capable of providing information that includes contact people, telephone numbers, deadlines, funding priorities, application guidelines, geographic restrictions and funding levels. Each GrantSearch is performed by entering key words related to a faculty project, and the information needed is displayed on a microcomputer screen in the Research and Sponsored Programs Office in the Administration Building on campus. Hard copies (printouts) of the information is available to faculty within five days following a request. SMOOTH SAILING OFFERED ON CAMPUS

You can navigate your way free through three marine courses that teach seamanship under sail or power, by way of the stars or technology, in lakes and along coasts. The U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and the newly formed Institute for Marine Technology Group are sponsoring the courses. Reginald C. Eggleton, a seasoned sailor, who is also professor of surgical research and adjunct professor of engineering and preventive dentistry, will teach the six-week courses on campus. They can be taken concurrently or individually. Local waterways will be used and participants do not have to own a boat. Some books and charts will have to be purchased, but there is no charge for the courses. The courses include Basic Course in Seamanship for Power and Sail which meets Tuesday evenings, Coastal Piloting (designed for sailing on Great Lakes or coasts) which meets Wednesday evenings, and Celestial or Electronic Navigation which are on Thursday evenings. EINHORN RECEIVES ONE OF FIRST PEOPLE-NOT-PROJECT AWARD

A new program sponsored by the National Cancer Institute has awarded a seven-year Outstanding Investigator Grant to Dr. Lawrence Einhorn, professor of medicine here. This is the first time the NCI has funded people rather than specific projects. The award which is to be devoted to pure research recognizes Dr. Einhorn's outstanding record of accomplishment in the development of new treatments, especially chemotherapy, for patients with cancers of the testis, lung, breast, bladder and colon. The grant provides support for individuals of national prominence with a proved track record in cancer research. Dr. Einhorn has that national prominence, as well as an international reputation in the field of medical oncology.-PP
