AT LEAST WE'LL HAVE OUR "ILLUSIONS"

A four-person show of "fictive-dimensional qualities" is next on the artistic docket at the Herron Gallery. The exhibition, call "Illusions," opens Friday with a public reception from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. at the gallery and continues through August 8.

Artists included will be California sculptor James Turrell; New York-based artists John Okulick, sculptor, and Paul Sarkisian, painter, and Ohio sculptor Thomas Macaulay.

Turrell's "Avaar: A Light Installation," which was completed during a two-week residency in May at Herron Gallery, is an isolated light installation defining illusions in the perception of a given space. This illusion creates a perception of an atmosphere appearing dense and full. John Okulick's wooden wall-construction reliefs create illusions of space and size looking along the contours of the work, according to which elements of different real length appear equivalent.

Sarkisian's paintings look like collages, but they are not. He is expressly concerned with creating an illusion and to this end he employs collage-like subject matter, distinguishing between "literal flatness" and "depicted flatness." Sarkisian strengthens his illusion-bearing properties through his painterly structure. Thomas Macaulay, acting chairman of the department of art and art history at Dayton Ohio's Creative Arts Center, will construct and exhibit an installation in the West Gallery. Macaulay's illusionist strategy is to blur the distinction between objects and images. To this end Macaulay will install an environmental work using outdoor and indoor images, creating an illusion of pup tents camouflaged within a series of constructed planes and tree-like elements.

Herron Gallery is free and open to the public Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., closed weekends.

PLANNING FUNDS SOUGHT FOR CLINICAL RESEARCH BUILDING

The I.U. trustees have authorized a request to seek \$200,000 from the state to plan a new Clinical Research Building at the I.U. Medical Center.

Contingent upon approval of funding by the appropriate state agencies, the trustees also selected two architectural firms who will be responsible for the planning work. They are Ellerbe & Associates, Bloomington, Minn., the

design architect, and Wright, Porteous & Lowe Inc., Indianapolis, the architectural firm that will coordinate the entire project.

Preliminary estimates of the construction cost for the entire project total \$27.5-million. Plans call for the structure to be built north of University Hospital and east of the Medical Science Building. The facility would contain about 200,000 gross square feet and allow expansion of work already being done in 10 specialized research centers now scattered throughout the Medical Center. The plan is to include centers for research in cancer, hypertension, arthritis, diabetes, human genetics and experimental oncology, with related support functions and a health sciences library in the new facility.

The trustees' decision to proceed with the request for planning money came during a special business meeting June 27 on the IUPUI campus.
