OBSTETRICS AND GYNECOLOGY IN KENYA

Over the years, Indiana University has maintained a strong, full-time presence in Medicine and Pediatrics for AMPATH in Kenya. We are

excited to now complement that focus with a full-time presence in Obstetrics and Gynecology. **Dr. Sierra Washington** has joined our team in Eldoret to lead our efforts on the part of the IU Department of OB/GYN.

Sierra received her bachelor's degree from Stanford University and obtained her MD from Harvard and her Master of Science from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. She finished her residency training in OB/GYN and Reproductive Services at the University of California at San Francisco last year and she has extensive experience working in infectious disease in Africa, both in Zambia and Cameroon.

Sierra was recruited to IU by Dr. Lee Learman, the current chair of the IU Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, who is excited to be putting the support of the department behind AMPATH. Lee recognized her talents and interests as being assets to both IU and AMPATH. Sierra will be helping to develop the OB/GYN residency program in global health issues as well as creating a new elective in Kenya for IU students who have an interest in OB/GYN and Maternal/Child Health in developing countries.

While Sierra is on the ground in Kenya for the next two years, she will be working collaboratively with OB/ GYN doctors from the University of Toronto and from Kenya. Together, they will develop a continuum of care for obstetrics and gynecology. This care will start in the homes and rural villages and continue to the health centers, district hospitals and the new Riley Mother and Baby Hospital in Eldoret.

Sierra and her U of Toronto and Kenyan counterparts will work with all levels of health providers, from traditional birthing attendants to community health workers, nurses, clinical officers and medical doctors, in order to reduce infant and maternal morbidity and mortality. They will lead research efforts to find answers to questions that are pertinent and relevant to the health of Kenyan woman and children and will work to train the next generation of leaders and health providers.

THE GIFT OF HOPE

Dr. Bob Einterz, General Internal Medicine, recently gave a presentation at this year's District V Annual Meeting about the incredible impact the Indiana-Kenya Partnership has had on the lives of Kenyans. One young woman's story was particularly moving. She came to the clinic deathly ill requesting only "to live so that I can take care of my children." Her husband had already died of AIDS and she did not want her children to become one of the thousands of AIDS-related orphans in Africa. It was a mother's plea for hope that regardless of nationality we all can understand. Through the Indiana-Kenya Partnership this woman's life was saved and so have over 75,000 other mothers, fathers, and children.

Of course we already knew this because not only have several of our own faculty traveled to Kenya but we now have a new member of our faculty, **Dr. Sierra Washington**, permanently stationed in Eldoret. However, despite

all their successes, there is still the ever present need for resources in order to provide basic patient care and train Kenyan medical students and residents. In order to assess this need, the Department of Ob/Gyn recently contacted Dr. Washington and asked her for a "wish list" for both her patients and learners. It was shocking how fundamental their needs really are and it makes one pause and reflect on all that we take for granted. Dr. Washington's clinic needs items such as: Monsel's solution, silver nitrate, (2) insulated speculums (approximately \$600 apiece), sutures, scissors, scrub brushes for hand washing and even money for women with DVTs who cannot afford anticoagulation therapy. For her learners

she would like them to have pocket edition "redbooks" (approximately \$20) and pregnancy wheels.

Therefore, in order to help Dr. Washington the Department of Ob/Gyn has asked the IU Foundation to set up a special Ob/Gyn subaccount fund that will only be used for Ob/Gyn program needs. Over the next two holiday months we are asking the Ob/Gyn faculty, staff, residents, and alumni to consider making a 100% tax deductible donation to one of two Ob/Gyn specific accounts. 1) "Kenya OB/GYN" (in memo portion of your check) to be used to purchase equipment/educational material, or 2) "Humanitarian Fund" (in memo portion of your check) to be used

by Dr. Washington to purchase such things as medication for patients or pay for transportation from remote villages to the clinic.

David Hass** and **Alan Golichowski.** Their paper on tocolytic therapy was published in *Obstetrics and Gynecology* and appears in the November-December 2009 issue of *ACOG Clinical Review*. "Tocolytic Therapy: A Meta-Analysis and Decision Analysis" **Haas, David M, MD, MS**; Imperiale, Thomas F. MD; Kirkpatrick, Page R. Klein, Robert W., Zollinger, Terrell W. OBJECTIVE: To determine the optimal first-line tocolytic agent for treatment of premature labor.

METHODS: We performed a quantitative analysis of randomized controlled trials of tocolysis, extracting data on maternal and neonatal outcomes, and pooling rates for each outcome across trials by treatment. Outcomes were delay of delivery for 48 hours, 7 days, and until 37 weeks; adverse effects

causing discontinuation of therapy; absence of respiratory distress syndrome; and neonatal survival. We used weighted proportions from a random-effects meta-analysis in a decision model to determine the optimal first-line tocolytic therapy. Sensitivity analysis was performed using the standard errors of the weighted proportions.

RESULTS: Fifty-eight studies satisfied the inclusion criteria. A randomeffects meta-analysis showed that all tocolytic agents were superior to placebo or control groups at delaying delivery both for at least 48 hours (53% for placebo compared with 75–93% for tocolytics) and 7 days (39% for placebo compared with 61–78% for tocolytics). No statistically significant differences were found for the other outcomes, including the neonatal outcomes of respiratory distress and neonatal survival. The de-

cision model demonstrated that prostaglandin inhibitors provided the best combination of tolerance and delayed delivery. In a hypothetical cohort of 1,000 women receiving prostaglandin inhibitors, only 80 would deliver within 48 hours, compared with 182 for the next-best treatment.

CONCLUSION: Although all current tocolytic agents were superior to no treatment at delaying delivery for both 48 hours and 7 days, prostaglandin inhibitors were superior to the other agents and may be considered the optimal first-line agent before 32 weeks of gestation to delay delivery.
