SENIORS SCREEN IN SICKLE CELL SEARCH

The Walker Eye Clinic, operated by IU's School of Optometry, participated in January's monthly clinic session at the Sickle Cell Center. Senior optometry students under the direction of Dr. Linda Casser conducted eye exams for individuals served by the center. Last fall, the optometrists screened many patients for vision problems, including renal changes which can indicate sickle cell anemia. The Walker Eye Clinic opened in September at the Madame Walker Urban Life Center. It provides primary eye care for the public, especially aiming for the IUPUI campus and downtown Indianapolis. GOOD TURNOUT INSPIRES CELEBRATION PLANNERS

Bolstered by the numbers of students, faculty and staff who attended our first Martin Luther King Jr. celebration on campus, the committee and the Black Student Union (BSU) that planned the Jan. 21 event are already making plans for next year. Lincoln V. Lewis, director of Affirmative Action and chairman of the planning committee, said, "Because of the tribute paid Dr. King, we achieved a higher level of awareness throughout the campus and community about his dream for the black community." The 14th Annual Martin Luther King Award Dinner was part of the celebration. Its sponsor, the BSU, announced that dinner was a sell-out and that, through the generosity of faculty and staff, more than 35 students were given sponsorships to the dinner. The commitee, which so far has no official title, was appointed recently by Howard G. Schaller, executive dean and dean of the faculties at IUPUI. It has been charged with the responsibility of promoting better community and internal relations at IUPUI and it will be handling other special projects.

PROF. JEGEN'S TAX TIPS: FICA, ABUSES, MILEAGE

--The FICA tax rate is now a total of 14% (7.05% for employers and 7.05% for employees). Also, the self-employment tax is now 11.8% And, both of these percentages apply to earnings up to \$39,600. Thus, the maximum annual social social security tax which is to be paid by employees during 1985 is \$2,791.80, \$4,672.80 for the self-employed. For individual taxpayers this increase will largely offset any tax savings from indexing, and I am certain that many of you will be paying more employment taxes in 1985 than you will income taxes.

--In recent speeches, IRS Commissioner Egger warned taxpayers who invest in abusive tax shelters that in the future these taxpayers will not be receiving "quick" income tax refunds for amounts which are indicated as refundable amounts on these taxpayers' income tax returns. Also, the IRS is confident that a significant number of taxpayers who invest in such abusive shelters will ultimately pay more in taxes, penalties and interest than they can afford.

--The standard mileage rate for vehicles used in business during 1984 is 20.5 cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles of business use of an automobile/vehicle which is not fully depreciated. The rates for business use (which is not fully depreciated) after the first 15,000 miles and for all business use of a vehicle (which is fully depreciated) are 11 cents a mile. The rate for charitable, medical and moving expenses is nine cents a mile. You may deduct either the business standard mileage rate or the actual expenses for the business use of your vehicle. In addition to the standard mileage rate, you may deduct the business-related portion of parking, tolls and interest on an automobile loan.

USING THREE DECS IN CAI, BACS, WCBIS

Dean Ralph E. McDonald and Dr. Rosario H. Potter, School of Dentistry, recently implemented Computer Aided Instruction (CAI) for dental students in a cooperative project with the Bloomington Academic Computing Services (BACS) Workshop for Computer Based Instructional Support (WCBIS). The system uses Digital's VAX computer at IUB. Three DEC graphic terminals are in operation at the school. Software is authored by Dr. Chamnan Hovijitra, staff programming analyst, using the new DEC language COURSEWARE for educational purposes. Dental students also access the system through the DEC terminals at IUPUI. The question-answer database system is now capable of operating either in a mock-test mode with retrials and automatic scoring or in a self-evaluating mode with subject material reinforcement in the form of explanations, reference material and sources, or hints for both correct and incorrect answers. A particularly effective feature of the program is the graphic capability to handle illustration material.
