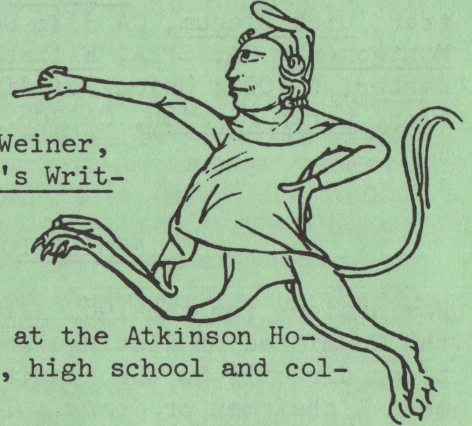

TO DISCUSS TEACHING OF WRITING

George Plimpton, well-known author and celebrity; Harvey Weiner, author of Any Child Can Write: How to Improve Your Child's Writing From Pre-school Through High School, and Elaine Maimon, author of Writing in the Arts and Sciences, will be the featured speakers in a unique conference, "Teaching Writing in the '80's," scheduled by the Indiana Teachers of Writing and IUPUI Friday and Saturday at the Atkinson Hotel. It is expected to attract elementary, middle school, high school and college teachers and parents.



Dr. Ronald J. Strahl, director of the IUPUI English composition program and director of the conference, said he knows of no other occasion when teachers at all grade levels have met to discuss their common concern about writing ability. The conference will come at the end of Writing Awareness Week, proclaimed this week by Mayor William H. Hudnut.

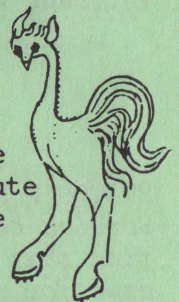
Twenty-two panels will cover a broad range of issues, with panelists drawn from elementary, middle school, high school and college teaching specialties. Registration begins at 9 a.m. Friday, with a fee of \$5 for the two-day conference. Reservations for banquet and luncheon (featuring Plimpton and Maimon) were to be made by Friday, Sept. 25.

Besides IUPUI and the Teachers of Writing, conference sponsors include the Indianapolis Public Schools, the Lilly Endowment, the Indiana Committee for the Humanities, the Midwest English Conference, the Writing Program Administrators Conference and Phi Delta Kappa. UNITED WAY GOAL SET

Rather than a dollar goal, the United Way campaign coordinators at IUPUI are aiming a 25 percent increase in the number of persons on campus who contribute to the campaign by payroll deduction. Last year 28 percent of the full-time employees used payroll deduction.



The 1981 campaign was launched Sept. 21 and will end Oct. 5. The prime goal is for every employee to contribute something to the campaign. The United Way serves 66 local agencies in Marion and five surrounding counties. In 1980, IUPUI employees took advantage of services offered by more than 40 of these agencies.

Associateship Awards -- Approximately 250 new full-time Associateship Awards for research in the sciences and engineering have been announced by the National Research Council. They will be awarded on a competitive basis in 1982 for research in chemistry, engineering, and mathematics, and in the earth, environmental, physical, space, and life sciences to be conducted in 18 federal research institutions whose laboratories are located throughout the United States. The programs provide Ph.D. scientists and engineers of unusual promise and ability with opportunities for research on problems largely of their own choosing. Awards (\$22,400 to \$50,000) are made for a year with possible extensions. Applications to the Research Council must be postmarked no later than Jan. 15, 1982. University, Christian Theological Seminary, IUPUI, Marian College and IVTech) is possible under a newly developed procedure.



They would meet new colleagues, see how another department operates and learn something about the practices in a different academic institution. This would produce many of the beneficial effects of a faculty exchange program elsewhere in the country, but would not require faculty members to leave home. Salary and fringe benefits would remain the sole responsibility of the faculty member's home institution.
