During the following two-day continuing education course, faculty and alumni made presentations on a variety of topics.

Gail Williamson Named Outstanding Dental Hygienist

Professor Gail F. Williamson of the Indiana University School of Dentisty faculty was honored as "outstanding dental hygienist" by the Indiana Dental Hygienists' Association during the annual session in Indianapolis in April. A plaque citing Professor Williamson's service to the Association was presented

at a luncheon in the Hyatt Regency Hotel. She was nominated by the Central Indiana Dental Hygienists' Association.

Professor Williamson has been a full-time faculty member at IU for 14 years. Since 1980 she has been an assistant professor in dental radiology, now a division of dental diagnostic sciences. She is a 1974 graduate of IU's dental hygiene program and also holds B.S. (1979) and M.S. (1982) degrees from IU.

Professor Williamson has been active in IDHA programs at both state and component levels. She was president of the component society (1985-86) and a delegate to the IDHA (1984-1986). She has also participated in continuing education programs and in IU alumni association activities, chairing the Dental Hygiene Alumni Day committee from 1984 to 1986. She served as president of Theta Chapter of Sigma Phi Alpha dental hygiene honor society in 1985-86.





On the closing of TEAM...

Closing our TEAM clinic was not an easy decision. The TEAM program, directed by **Dr. Donald R. Tharp**, offered an excellent method of teaching expanded duties and the management of dental auxiliaries. For many years the expert staff offered our fourth year students valuable clinical experience with expanded functions hygienists and assistants. However, prohibitive cost of the program, along with budget constraints, dictated the closing of the facility. On a brighter note, we will now be able to fund the establishment of our undergraduate orthodontic program (that is required for continued accreditation) and the expansion of the undergraduate periodontal surgery experience. The clinic space itself will host a much needed faculty research area, as well as an expanded special care clinic.

We are happy that it has been possible to assign TEAM personnel to other departments in need of their services and that experience in auxiliary utilization will continue in other departments. Much appreciation goes to Dr. Tharp and the TEAM staff for their many years of devoted service and excellence in patient care.

Lots of the dust, if not all, has settled from the major renovations and changing-around of offices and departments currently under way at the School of Dentistry. With the transitions affecting clinic locations nearly finished, the remaining moves are scheduled to take place before fall semester, according to Mr. James R. Levens, IUSD business officer. For those who may be feeling a bit lost in the midst of all the maneuvers, we offer a floor-by-floor account of major changes that are soon-to-be, or already completed.

Fourth Floor: a) Dental hygiene and dental assisting move into clinic and offices formerly used by the complete denture division of prosthodontics; b) Former undergraduate periodontics clinic is divided into two: one for undergrad periodontics surgery (east end) and the other for graduate periodontics (balcony area to be used for offices); and c) Room S426 becomes the Maynard K. Hine seminar room, moved from the first floor.

Third Floor: a) Operative dentistry undergraduate clinic reduced in size from 43 to 33 dental units and undergraduate endodontics reduced from 12 to 9 units; b) The 13 units given up by operative dentistry and endodontics now used for periodontics patients; c) Cashier's office in main clinic becomes cashier center for all third-floor clinics; d) north end of former dental hygiene clinic becomes another area for treatment of periodontics patients; e) south end of dental hygiene clinic now the clinic for the complete denture division of prosthodontics, and former hygiene offices now complete denture offices.

Second Floor: a) New bone research laboratory, under supervision of Dr. W. Eugene Roberts, chairman of orthodontics as of August 1, to be housed in west end of former TEAM Clinic. (Several plans currently under consideration for remainder of TEAM area.)

First Floor: a) Continuing Education (Room 130) moves to Room S105, currently the Maynard Hine room (located in the area of dental diagnostic sciences); b) Graduate and Postgraduate Education moves to Rooms 110-111, currently the offices of Ms. Edith Gladson and Dr. Ralph W. Phillips in dental materials; c) Dr. Phillips and Ms. Gladson move to Room 118 (next to the order office); d) Mr. Jim Levens, of the Business Office, and Mr. Donald O. Booth, of cash operations, move to Room 130 (currently housing graduate and continuing education); e) New office for minority student affairs, headed by Dr. LaForrest D. Garner, replaces Mr. Levens in Room 102 (this room will continue to be the location for the office of academic affairs).

Basement: The extramural facilitation program, headed by Dr. Donald \overline{R} . Tharp, formerly of the TEAM Clinic, shares office space in Bl9 with faculty and staff in dental biostatistics. This is also the new location for Dr. Glen O. Sagraves, assistant dean for clinical affairs.





People in the News

- **Dr. David C. Vandersall,** associate professor of periodontics, was recently elected president-elect of the Midwest Society of Periodontology, which includes eleven states and two Canadian provinces. He is also the author of an article recently published in the <u>Journal of Periodontology</u> entitled, "Diplomate of the American Board of Periodontology: Is It In Your Future?"
- **Dr. Ralph E. McDonald**, dean emeritus of the School of Dentistry, was chosen "Alumnus of the Year" for 1988 by the Arsenal Technical High School Alumni Association. He and his wife, Sarah Jane, are both Tech grads from the Class of 1938.
- Dr. Robert L. Bogan, associate dean for student affairs, and Dr. Varoujan A. Chalian, chairman of the maxillofacial prosthetics section of prosthodontics, were recently elected to the Board of Directors of the Marion County Cancer Society's Little Red Door. One of the Little Red Door's many services to the people of Marion County is its screening programs for early detection of cancer. The School of Dentistry has participated in the screening for detection of oral cancer for many years.
- Dr. James C. Setcos, assistant professor of dental materials, was among researchers from around the world who presented lectures on dentin bonding at a symposium in Rolling Meadows, Illinois, on April 27.
- Dr. LaForrest D. Garner, longtime chairman of orthodontics and acting chairman for the past year, was honored by the Indiana University Orthodontic Alumni Association during the annual banquet, held this year at the Union Station Holiday Inn in May. Recognizing Dr. Garner for his years of contribution to the department, 17 of them as chairman, Dr. James J. Baldwin, associate professor of orthodontics, presented him with an Orvis fishing rod with matching reel on behalf of the alumni. Dr. James P. Davis (M.S. '74), of Scottsdale, Arizona, presented Dr. Garner with a beautiful braided string tie made of leather and inlaid with turquoise stones.
- Dr. S. Miles Standish, who retired from IUSD on June 30, was one of seven faculty members on the IUPUI campus to receive a Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., M.D., Experience Excellence Recognition Award on May 5. Six IUPUI staff members also received awards during ceremonies at the Union Building, with Professor Carol Nathan, IUPUI associate dean of the faculties, presiding. The awards are given each spring to faculty and staff for contributions "above and beyond the call of duty." They are named for the former IU vice president at Indianapolis, who retired in 1986. Dr. Standish was cited for his "outstanding career in dental education, his enhancement of the reputation of the School of Dentistry and his contributions to the community and the state through his skills as a forensic dentist."

Dr. Ralph W. Phillips, a longtime research professor of dental materials at IUSD, received an honorary degree of Doctor of Science from McGill University in Montreal during the University's Health Sciences Convocation on May 30. Dr. Phillips was presented for the degree by Professor Ralph Y. Barolet, dean of the McGill Faculty of Dentistry and a 1972 graduate of IU's periodontics program. The other recipient of an honorary degree from McGill was Dr. Roger Guillemin, 1977 Nobel Laureate in Medicine and currently chairman of the Salk Institute's laboratories for neuroendocrinology.

Professor Jeri L. Francis, of the department of dental auxiliary education, was recently photographed (with one-year-old daughter, Alexandria) and interviewed for an article on day care for children which appeared in the Indianapolis News.

Prentice Orthodontic Scholarships were awarded in April to three graduate students: Drs. Alan Schafer, Jayesh Patel, and Brent Flynn. Dr. Schafer is currently finishing his second year of orthodontic graduate training and Drs. Patel and Flynn are completing their first year. The Prentice scholarship fund is named for Dr. Wilson E. Third year dental student Steven F. Rodgers was presented with an award for his table clinic, "Reactions of Rat Connective Tissue to Dentin

Discs Containing Nonmetallic Restorative Materials." This clinic won second place in the American Dental Association/Dentsply Student Clinician competition during the dental school's Table Clinic Day last March.

Dr. Yiming Li was announced as first recipient of the Dr. Maynard K. Hine Award for Excellence in Research, created last November. The award, sponsored by Procter and Gamble Company, will be given annually by the Indiana Section of AADR to a postdoctoral student for outstanding achievement in research. It bears the name of IUPUI Chancellor Emeritus Hine, served as IUSD dean for 23 years. Dr. Li is from Shanghai, China, and graduated from Shanghai Second Medical University in 1977. He holds MSD ('84) and PhD ('87) degrees from Indiana University. currently a postdoctoral fellow at the Oral Health Research Institute. Dr. Li plans to return to China in 1989.

This year's gathering, held at the Sheraton Society Hill Hotel, included a tribute to Dr. Standish, who retired from IUSD on June 30, 1988. The organization presented Dr. Standish with a portrait of himself. painted by Dr. Rolando A. DeCastro, professor of oral anatomy and director of dental art and illustrations. Alumni members have also commissioned Dr. DeCastro to paint a large formal portrait of Dr. Standish, which will eventually hang in the William G. Shafer Seminar Room and Library at the dental school.

Award for Minority Students Doubles in Size for 1988

For the fourth consecutive year a grant from the U.S. Department of Education has been awarded to Indiana University to support graduate studies for minority students of dentistry. Dr. LaForrest D. Garner, associate dean for minority student services, reports that the award, as part of the Patricia Roberts Harris Graduate and Professional Study Fellowship Program, has doubled in size to \$64,000 for the 1988-89 academic year.

Formerly known as the Graduate Professional Opportunities Pro-

gram, the Harris fellowships will provide \$16,000 each to four dental students instead of two, as in previous years. According to Dr. Garner, recipients usually receive the award (named after a former U.S. secretary of Health, Education and Welfare) for three years.

Last year's recipients, Mr. Michael A. Davis and Mr. Marvin P. Eady, Jr., have been named Harris fellows for 1988-89. New fellows are Ms. Jennifer L. Satterfield and Ms. Helen Sempira, who will be first-year students this fall.

Class of 1935's Gift Unveiled At Century Club Reception

A record-breaking number of participants joined in the fun at the Indiana University School of Dentistry annual reception for Century Club and Century II Fellows, held in the Regency Ballroom of the Hyatt Regency, downtown Indianapolis on April 28. The yearly reception honors hundreds of alumni and other friends and associates of IUSD who have helped support the dental school with their contributions.

In a special ceremony during the 1988 reception, representatives of the Class of 1935 unveiled a beautiful work of art given as a gift from their class to the school.

The subject of the large oil painting (4 feet by 6 feet) is Saint Apollonia, the patroness of dentistry, who is said to have lived in Alexandria, Egypt, about 200 A.D. As the story goes, she achieved sainthood for refusing to acknowledge the pagan gods of Rome, despite torture and threats of death by fire. She became a martyr by leaping into the flames.

In a brief ceremony class president **Dr. Ralph E. Gieringer** made the formal presentation of the paint-

ing to the dental school of behalf of his classmates. Other class members present for the occasion were Dr. Ralph Harlan Brown, Dr. LeRoy F. Sacks (class secretary/treasurer), Dr. Louis C. Siegel, and Dr. Donald J. Van Gilder.

The artist of the painting is **Dr. Rolando A. DeCastro**, professor of oral anatomy and director of dental art and illustrations. Dr. DeCastro says that he studied several artistic renderings of Apollonia before creating his own interpretation.

The Class of 1935's gift now hangs in the foyer of the main patient entrance, near the department of dental diagnostic sciences. With it hang two plaques, one describing Apollonia's rise to sainthood and another listing the names of the Class of 1935's 46 members.

IUSD faculty, staff and students wish to thank the members of the Class of '35 for their generous gift that now brightens the dental building. And, once again, deep appreciation is expressed to all members of the Century Club for their unflagging support of the dental school.


'Creek' Season On Its Way

PAUL BARTON, professor emeritus of journalism and community dentistry, came to IU in 1968 from Ohio State University. A native of New Haven, Connecticut, Professor Barton holds degrees from DePauw University and the University of Washington. He served in the U.S. Marine Corps during World War II.

Professor Barton's teaching experience includes faculty appointments at the U.S. Naval Academy and the University of Washington, in addition to IU and Ohio State. He is a former reporter for the Waterbury

(Connecticut) Republican; copy editor of the Washington (D.C.) Star; writer and editor for the U.S. Naval Institute Proceedings; writer for Changing Times magazine; and writing coach for the Baltimore Sunpapers.

At IU Professor Barton has worked closely with graduate students in the development of their master's theses and has taught classes in scientific writing. He also assisted faculty members in preparation of scholarly manuscripts. He formerly served as secretary of the dental school's graduate committee and faculty council, associate editor of the IUSD Alumni Bulletin, and chairman of the teaching committee. He was for many years an editorial consultant for the Journal of Periodontology and the Journal of Prosthetic Dentistry.

Professor Barton is an honorary alumnus of IUSD and a member of Omicron Kappa Upsilon national honorary society. He has been the recipient of a distinguished service award from the American Association of Dental Editors and an all-university distinguished teaching award from IU. He retired from his full-time position with the school in 1986.



DR. MALCOLM E. BOONE, professor of prosthodontics, was a private practitioner in Terre Haute before moving to Indianapolis in the 1960s. After several years of instructing part-time in the complete denture department, Dr. Boone was appointed to the full-time faculty in 1966. In 1969 he established a prosthodontic practice in Indianapolis.

Dr. Boone was born in St. Louis, Missouri. He attended Butler University and holds two degrees from the IU School of Dentistry (DDS '46, MSD '62). He

served in the U.S. Navy. His promotion to professor came in 1977.

Dr. Boone headed the complete denture graduate program for many years and directed the department's research efforts. He was involved with several research projects, funded with corporate grants.

Dr. Boone has an extensive record of service throughout the state and elsewhere for his continuing education presentations, table clinics, and participation on other professional programs. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Prosthodontics, a fellow of the American College of Dentists and the International College of Dentists, and a member of OKU. He has been a national president of the Psi Omega dental fraternity and of the IUSD Alumni Association, and is a former editor of the American Equilibration Society's Compendium. He currently serves as president-elect of the American Prosthodontic Society.



DR. ROBERT H. DERRY, professor emeritus of prosthodontics and longtime director of continuing education and chairman of the complete denture department, has served the University and dental school for 45 years. He is a native of New London, Connecticut, and a dental graduate of the Medical College of Virginia.

Dr. Derry joined the IU faculty as an assistant professor in 1943 and established a part-time dental practice in 1947. He was named the School's first director of dental continuing education in 1968, a position he held

for nearly 20 years. Under Dr. Derry's direction IUSD presented award-winning continuing education exhibits at the ADA annual session for several years. Dr. Derry also coordinated a number of highly successful continuing education programs presented abroad.

In 1970 Dr. Derry was promoted to professor of complete denture and three years later he was appointed chairman of the department.

Dr. Derry was made a Sagamore of the Wabash by then Governor Otis R. Bowen. Dr. Derry is a fellow of the American College of Dentists and the International College of Dentists, and a member of the Pierre Fauchard Academy. He has received the Indiana Public Health Association's President's Recognition Award; the Alpha Omega Award for Excellence in Continuing Education; the Faithful Service Award from the Indianapolis District Dental Society; and a certificate of appreciation from the IUSD Alumni Association. He retired from his full-time position with the School in 1984.



DR. ROLAND W. DYKEMA, professor of prosthodontics, stayed on with the IU dental school after graduating from here in 1947. Except for a two-year tour of duty with the U.S. Air Force in the early '50s, Dr. Dykema has spent the past 40 years in service at the dental school. He was promoted to professor in 1962 and chaired the department of crown and bridge for almost 20 years.

Dr. Dykema was born in Willmar, Minnesota. He attended Wheaton College in Wheaton, Illinois, and Tufts

University in Medford, Massachusetts, before enrolling in dental school at Indiana. He holds an MSD degree ('61) in addition to the DDS.

Dr. Dykema is a diplomate of the American Board of Prosthodontics. A worldwide lecturer, he is also the co-author of three textbooks, including Modern Practice in Crown and Bridge Prosthodontics, which he wrote with Dr. John F. Johnston. Dr. Dykema is a member of OKU and a fellow of the American College of Dentists. He has served as president of the American Academy of Crown and Bridge Prosthodontics and of the American Board of Prosthodontics. Last year the John F. Johnston Society and the IU dental school honored Dr. Dykema by dedicating the newly remodeled graduate prosthodontics laboratory in his name.



DR. TIMOTHY J. O'LEARY, professor of periodontics and chairman of the department for 16 years, joined the IU faculty after more than 20 years of service in the Dental Corps of the U.S. Air Force. Dr. O'Leary was born in Ann Arbor, Michigan. He attended Syracuse University before entering the dental program at Tufts University. He graduated cum laude in 1946, and completed postgraduate training in periodontics at New York University in 1955.

Dr. O'Leary became professor and chairman of the department of periodontics in 1973, after serving as chairman of graduate periodontics for several years. He was made an honorary alumnus of the IUSD Alumni Association in 1973.

The author of numerous scientific articles, Dr. O'Leary was editor of the Journal of Periodontology for 18 years. He has made hundreds of scientific and clinical presentations at local, state, national and international meetings. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Periodontology; a fellow of the American College of Dentists and the American Academy of Periodontology; and a past president of Theta Theta Chapter of OKU. Among his many honors are the William A. Gies Award for Periodontology, and the Gold Medal Award from the American Academy of Periodontology. He served as president of the Academy in 1976 and as chairman of the American Board of Periodontology from 1974-76.

After retirement from the full-time faculty this summer Dr. O'Leary will remain with the dental school as a consultant on a part-time basis. He will also continue to be engaged in writing and research projects, and in his periodontic practice.



DR. RALPH G. SCHIMMELE, professor of dental auxiliary education and associate dean for program development and extramural programs, has served IUSD in various capacities for most of the years since he graduated from the dental school in 1952.

Dr. Schimmele is a native of Fort Wayne. A U.S. Army veteran of World War II, he maintained a private practice in Fort Wayne from 1952-65.

In the early years of his career at IU Dr. Schimmele

lectured in practice management and oral anatomy. In 1963 he was named first director of dental hygiene/dental assisting at the Fort Wayne campus. Two years later he became director of dental auxiliary education on all regional campuses and in 1972 he was appointed assistant dean for program development and extramural programs. The title of associate dean was given in 1980. During his tenure the extramural program expanded to include hundreds of practitioners who help students of dentistry and dental hygiene gain valuable "in the field" experience by permitting them to observe and assist in dental offices throughout the state. Also, Dr. Schimmele's contributions to the associateship program have assisted many young graduates in their search for associateship opportunities in Indiana.

Dr. Schimmele is a member of OKU and the Pierre Fauchard Academy and a fellow of the International College of Dentists. He has received distinguished teaching awards from IU at Fort Wayne and from the Isaac Knapp District Dental Society; Distinguished Eagle Scout and Silver Antelope awards from the Boy Scouts of America; and a distinguished alumnus award from the IUSD Alumni Association.



DR. JAMES C. SHANKS, JR., professor of speech pathology and clinical director of speech service in the department of otolaryngology—head and neck surgery (School of Medicine), and professor of orthodontics (School of Dentistry), plans to remain on as a part-time consultant to the dental school after his retirement this summer.

Dr. Shanks was born in Detroit, Michigan, and earned degrees from Michigan State (B.A.), University of Denver (M.A.) and Northwestern University (Ph.D.). He held teaching positions at the Iowa State Teachers

He held teaching positions at the Iowa State Teachers College and at Syracuse University before coming to the IU School of Medicine in 1955. He received his dental school appointment in 1970 and was promoted to professor in 1977. He worked closely with graduate dental students who chose speech pathology as their minor for the master's degree.

Dr. Shanks played a key role on the University's cleft palate and craniofacial anomalies teams. In the past two decades he has traveled worldwide to participate in more than 150 seminars and workshops on laryngectomee rehabilitation. He is a fellow of the American Speech and Hearing Association and was on the Indiana Board of Examiners in Speech Pathology and Audiology from 1974-77. He has received a distinguished service award from the Governor's Commission for the Handicapped, and several awards from the International Association of Laryngectomees and the Indiana Speech and Hearing Association.



DR. S. MILES STANDISH, professor of oral pathology, chairman of the oral dignosis/oral medicine division of dental diagnostic sciences, and associate dean of graduate and postgraduate education, retired this summer after more than 40 years of service to the University.

Dr. Standish was born in Campbellsburg and graduated from Salem High School. His dental degrees from IU were earned in 1945 (DDS) and 1956 (MS). He served in the U.S. Navy Dental Corps.

At Indiana University Dr. Standish originally taught in oral diagnosis and periodontics and then in oral pathology; he joined the faculty full-time in 1958. Dr. Standish held key administrative positions during his career at the dental school in the areas of graduate education, oral pathology and oral diagnosis/oral medicine. He achieved the rank of professor in 1967 and became chairman of OD/OM in 1976 (that department has since become a division of dental diagnostic sciences).

Dr. Standish is highly regarded in the nation for his work as a forensic odontologist. During the trial of an accused murderer in the 1970s, Dr. Standish participated as an expert witness, giving testimony as an authority on bite marks. The suspect was convicted, largely on the basis of Dr. Standish's testimony regarding bite mark analysis. That trial established a precedent in Indiana for admission of bite mark evidence into a court of law and is cited as a landmark case in this state.

Dr. Standish is a diplomate of the American Board of Pathology and the American Board of Forensic Odontology; a fellow of the American Academy of Oral Pathology and the American Academy of Forensic Sciences. He has served as a president of the American Academy of Oral Pathology, the American Board of Oral Pathology, and Theta Chapter of OKU.

Dr. Standish has written many articles, co-written several textbooks and contributed chapters to several others. He has presented many courses around the country. He was appointed an Honorary Lieutenant Colonel by the Indiana State Police for his work in forensic dentistry.

Shortly before his retirement Dr. Standish received the Glenn R. Irwin, Jr., MD, Experience Excellence Award on the IUPUI campus.
