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Reminder to secure sensitive electronic data

Vince Sheehan, chief information officer for the IU School of Medicine, would like to remind all faculty, staff, residents and students that taking the time to ensure they have properly secured any and all sensitive electronic information is of the utmost importance to the reputation and safety of the medical school, themselves and their patients.

All IU data (including IU Health, Wishard, VA, etc.) must be securely protected regardless of where those data are stored, including personally-owned devices. Whether it's a laptop, iPad, Smartphone, CD, or thumbdrive, if IU data resides there, it must be properly protected. These steps should be taken for all devices:

- 1. Hard drives on laptops must be encrypted. IU licenses ensure that Symantec PGP Full-Disk Encryption software is available to all faculty, staff, residents and students at no additional charge. To download this software, visit <u>iuware.iu.edu</u>.
- 2. All mobile devices must have local encryption enabled if it is a configuration option.
- 3. All devices must be password protected for access.
- 4. Sensitive data should not be sent via the university's email system. Provisions are being made to better secure those transmissions, but for the time being, email should not be used to communicate any sensitive or confidential information.

Information Services and Technology Management and will gladly help identify and implement these security precautions on any device used to store IU data.

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Kenya students participate in research ethics program

The IU-Moi University Academic Research Partnership (IU-Moi AREP) and IU Center for Bioethics will welcome seven students from Moi University to Indianapolis during this fall semester.

The students will be in Indianapolis from Sept. 8 through Oct. 22 to complete their practicum experience as part of Moi's MSc in International Health Research Ethics program. They are the first group of students to come to Indianapolis as part of our partnership.

The practicum consists of two parts: core experiences and research activities. The core experiences section introduces students to research ethics and international relationships at IU. Six practicum environments have been identified for these experiences: "Human Subjects and Institutional Review Boards," "Conflict of Interest," "Research Compliance," "Research Ethics," "Education, and Policy (REEP)," "AMPATH Program" and "International Affairs."

The research activities section provides students with opportunities to develop their master's thesis. As part of this section, students will participate in a short course on qualitative research methods. They will also conduct formal interviews with IU IRB members and staff about IU's research ethics policy and procedures, as well as with PIs about the construction of a research protocol. Individual topics include informed consent, participant selection and risk analysis. Mentors have been assigned to each student to guide them in their projects.

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Schneider receives breast cancer research award

Bryan Schneider, MD, associate professor of medicine and medical and molecular genetics and Shawn Hanson Investigator in Breast Cancer Research, is the recipient of the 2011 Advanced Clinical Research Award in Breast Cancer from the Conquer Cancer Foundation of the American Society of Clinical Oncology (formerly the ASCO Cancer Foundation).

Dr. Schneider will receive a three-year, \$450,000 grant supported by the Breast Cancer Research Foundation to do additional research on the relationship between taxane-induced neuropathy and clinical outcomes after adjuvant chemotherapy in patients with breast cancer.

About one-third of patients who receive chemotherapy with a taxane develop neuropathy, which can hinder a patient from receiving a full dose of chemotherapy. ACRA recipients are selected based on their unique patient-oriented approaches to research. Additional selection criteria include the significance and originality of the project, appropriateness and feasibility of the proposed research methods, potential impact of the research, and prior research experience, and accomplishments of the applicants.

Dr. Schneider will be recognized at the 2011 Breast Cancer Symposium in San Francisco this weekend.
