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Foreword



This is the ninth volume of "Kiwanis Activities" summarizing the officially reported activities of all the Kiwanis clubs in the United States and Canada during the year 1930. The compilation was made possible by utilizing the Official Monthly Reports recording activities as reported by the club secretaries.

At the close of 1930 there were 1,873 clubs, according to the membership records of January 1, 1931, and nearly all, with the exception of the newly built clubs, were carrying on civic and welfare programs.

The Objects of Kiwanis International have made possible these numerous achievements recorded in this present book. These Objects are:

To give primacy to the human and spiritual rather than to the material values of life.

To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.

To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business, and professional standards.

To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship.

To provide through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build better communities.

To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism, and good will.

Clubs in the United States observed "Constitution Week," September 14 to 20, and this occasion had for its purpose the stressing of better citizenship. In Canada, "Canadian Citizenship Week," June 29 to July 5, was a similar occasion for the promotion of good citizenship. The clubs also took part in "United States-Canada Week," April 27 to May 3, in celebration of the peace and friendship that has existed between the two countries for over a century. All clubs participated in "All Kiwanis Night," June 30, 1930, during the 14th annual convention in Atlantic City. This was a simultaneous meeting of clubs from the Atlantic to the Pacific in commemoration of the unselfish service and accomplishments of Kiwanians.

The 16th anniversary of Kiwanis was observed during the week of January 21, 1931. The organization's birth-date is January 21, 1915, at Detroit, Michigan.

Suggestions for Your Own Club

Kiwanis Activities is a summary of the community betterment and service activities of Kiwanis clubs in the United States and Canada. The book is compiled annually from the Official Monthly Reports submitted by clubs.

The activities indicate the many varied and practical applications of the ideals, and objectives of Kiwanis International, and suggest opportunities of similar service for other communities, institutions, groups, and individuals.

The book is not an honor-roll of clubs. It has been compiled as a descriptive presentation of diversified service endeavors.

How to Use the Book

Kiwanis Activities is suggestive of what can be done in all communities by active clubs. Every club, large or small, seeking suggestions for community service can find in this volume sources of information on every conceivable kind of activity.

The key which unlocks the treasure of this book for clubs is the index on the final pages. There appear over forty general divisions of activities, which direct the reader to pages of thousands of records of actual club work.

Clubs which have made surveys of their own communities and are planning new or additional service activities, can review the results of clubs in towns of somewhat the same type and population. Clubs seeking suggestions may be located in either agricultural or industrial areas, or in vicinities of both farming and manufacturing.

For a club in an agricultural region, the index will indicate hundreds of valuable activities in better town and country relations work, in city beautiful planning, health campaigns, conservation and general education. If a club functions in a community where all forms of general economic enterprise are in operation, a vast store-house of material is suggested by such index topics as health and sanitation, boys' and girls' work, improvement of civic conditions, aid to business and industry, and many others.

A careful study of *Kiwanis Activities* by members will reveal to them many clubs of about the same size, in localities having similar opportunities and problems, engaged in active and varied service programs.

Every Kiwanian is urged to make a thorough inspection of *Kiwanis Activities* to familiarize himself with the summary of service work of all the clubs in Kiwanis International.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD

The service rendered by all the Kiwanis clubs in the United States and Canada, on behalf of under-privileged children, consists in removing those physical, mental, moral and economic handicaps, which bar them from the full measure of citizenship.

The following under "General Assistance" shows the various kinds of activities accomplished during 1930 to aid the children under this major Kiwanis objective:

General Assistance

- Akron, Ohio.** Purchased land at the value of \$2,500.00 to build a new Florence Crittenton Home.
- Albany, Ind.** Secured a permanent home for an under-privileged child, and make a survey of the entire city to find children needing assistance and medical attention.
- Albuquerque, N. M.** Kiwanians are caring for five destitute children and keep three in the Rio Grande Industrial School.
- Altadena, Calif.** Two entertainments are held each month for the Pre-ventorium and the Boys' and Girls' Aid society. General help is given all under-privileged and needy children.
- Ann Arbor, Mich.** Two full-time directors are employed to conduct the activities for 5,000 under-privileged children. Sixty Kiwanians at the annual newspaper sale secured \$1,200.00 for our recreational program for the children at the University Hospital. Several merchandise sales netted over \$3,000.00 for our under-privileged child work.
- Arlington, Mass.** All crippled children are transported to and from school, necessitating several thousand trips in a year. Sent one girl to a health camp and purchased lunches for a child from a poor family.
- Bangor, Me.** A pledge of over \$500.00 was given the Good Samaritan Home, and Kiwanians helped furnish clothing for six poor children.
- Baxter Springs, Kan.** After two performances of our home talent play members went to a nearby town, Quapaw, Oklahoma, and repeated the show so that under-privileged child work could be continued in that community. All general welfare work with children was carried on by the club.
- Belmont, N. C.** All necessary school books were supplied under-privileged children in our schools.
- Bend, Ore.** Rev. George H. Redden, Pastor of the Pines, who visits over 1,200 children in the logging camps of the northwest, is in need of a house-on-wheels, so that he may take his entire family with him and carry the necessary clothing, books, etc., for children he visits. The securing of this automobile is the present objective of the club.
- Bowling Green, Ky.** Club plans to build a municipal gymnasium. City and county judges state that since Kiwanis began its welfare work juvenile delinquency has been cut more than 50 per cent. Sixty-five children were sent to a summer camp.
- Brooklyn, Cleveland, Ohio.** Over 2,800 children were entertained at an annual theatre party and assistance was given the Associated Charities.
- Burbank, Calif.** Purchased orthopedic appliances and milk, and gave clothing to 52 needy children.
- Calgary, Alta.** Kiwanians secured \$11,500.00 in the annual tag day for an orphans' home. This was the largest amount ever collected in Western Canada in a single day. Entertainments were given throughout the year for children in hospitals, orphanages and homes.
- Camden, N. J.** A survey was made by the welfare committee to give relief for the unemployed. Milk and clothing were given to all children whose parents had no work. Children at a county detention home were supplied with necessities.
- Carbondale, Pa.** Purchased clothing for 26 boys.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

- Casper, Wyo. A delegate was sent to the State Conference on Child Welfare at Cheyenne, where he was re-elected as a vice-president of the council. Clothing and medical attention are secured for poor children in the schools.
- Cedartown, Ga. The club has recommended to members the adopt-a-boy plan. Several have signified their intention of giving personal service to unfortunate children.
- Charleroi, Pa. Season baseball tickets were purchased for all under-privileged boys of the community.
- Charleston, S. C. The club has adopted an orphan and will give the boy every opportunity. Several youths were sent to a camp so there would be a change from a bad to a good environment.
- Chicago, Ill. Contributions were made to five organizations doing child welfare work.
- Clermont, Fla. Sent nearly a car-load of clothing and vegetables to the Orphans' Home of Jacksonville. The Needle Clubs of our town assisted in clothes-making and the churches also gave splendid co-operation. A blind youth of 12 is sent twice each week to Orlando, where there is a teacher of the Braille system.
- Colorado Springs, Colo. Furnished clothing and medical attention to school children during the winter season. A bread and milk table has been created at our club meetings for those members who wish to donate part of their luncheon money to the welfare fund.
- Columbus, Ind. Procured a violin and a teacher for a crippled lad. The club has also created a milk fund.
- Concord, N. H. A plan has been devised so that more children would be adopted by club members and their friends. Nine children have secured homes. Furnished the labor and \$800.00 for a dining hall and kitchen at a summer camp. Clothing, shoes, and glasses were distributed to needy children. Five orphanages were supplied with ice cream.
- Dallas, Tex. The club is placing babies from Hope Cottage in permanent homes.
- Dover, N. H. Assumed one-half of the expense of a ten-year old boy receiving special training at the Golden Rule Home, and took all children to a circus.
- Duluth, Minn. Birthday letters and presents are sent to all the children in the local orphanages. Kiwanians have agreed to take a foster-father interest in these children. Presented a minstrel show so that the Kiwanis clubs in Virginia, Hibbing, and Chisholm could secure funds for sending children to summer camps. Duluth sent 62 boys and ten girls to camps and gave 100 Easter baskets to local institutes.
- Duncan, Okla. Books and supplies are furnished all worthy children. This cost about \$400.00 during 1930. All ward schools in the town are supplied with milk for under-nourished children.
- East Cleveland, Ohio. All needy children are given fruit and milk and those needing medical attention are given treatment free. Our musical comedy "Show Boat Days" gave us \$900.00 for welfare activities.
- Eastlake, Oakland, Calif. Our outstanding bit of work was to give financial aid to a day school nursery. This saved the institution from having to close its doors.
- East Los Angeles, Calif. The children of mothers who are either illiterate or learning the English language are cared for by a matron. She served 104 hours caring for 412 babies.
- Eatonton, Ga. All public school expenses are paid for poor children.
- Edmonton, Alta. Personal service has been started for the inmates at the Children's Aid Home. Some 50 children are at this Kiwanis home, where members plant the garden, care for the grounds and the surroundings, and supervise the out-door games. Apple day brought sales of over \$2,000.00 for our welfare endeavors.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

Englewood, Chicago. Secured a typewriter for a youth. Organized a milk fund. Made contributions to several children's homes. Purchased clothing and supplies for poor children, and took several hundred crippled kiddies to a circus.

Eustis, Fla. We are paying for the education of a boy at an industrial school.

Fayette, Mo. In many cases, unless the club had given financial aid, furnished food, books and clothing, children could not have continued their school work.

Florence, S. C. Thirty-two under-privileged children are being sponsored by as many individual members in personal service work.

Fond du Lac, Wis. A truck-load of provisions was sent to a children's home. Throughout the year programs and entertainments were furnished for the children.

Fort Dodge, Iowa. Gathered up 1,000 discarded toys, which were repaired by city firemen, and distributed them among poor children. A special children's matinee was held, with the admission price being a toy. Later these were given as gifts to needy children.

Fort Worth, Tex. Playground equipment was purchased for the County Orphans' Home.

Fredericksburg, Va. Kiwanians engaged a full-time supervisor and with the closing of the schools the club did recreational and welfare work among all the children of the town.

Fresno, Calif. Through our efforts the state child guidance clinic was brought here to study all problem children. The expense of the survey was paid by the club. Thirty-five boys and girls were sent to a summer camp.

Greenville, S. C. Installed fire escapes and made other improvements at a juvenile home, and purchased 268 sweaters for needy children.

Halifax, N. S. During 1930 the Under-Privileged Child Committee purchased 466 pairs of shoes, 408 pairs of rubbers, 549 pairs of stockings, clothing for 100 children, 21 tons of coal, and other supplies, totaling a cost of \$2,881.81. The club conducts a fair for one week to raise a budget for this work.

Harrisburg, Pa. All expenses are paid for Miss Ruth Keller, crippled since birth, who is taking a four years' economics course. Over 4,000 children attended our annual party at the movie houses. The admission was three potatoes and over 50 bushels were secured and distributed among two children's homes. Orthopedic appliances and medical aid were secured for our crippled children.

Hartford, Conn. Our major objective is working with the North Street Settlement House, where children receive welfare attention.

Harvey, Ill. Placed two children in good homes. Brought one child from Washington so it could join its parents here. Furnishing clothing and medical aid for a number of children.

Hermosa Beach, Calif. Keep one boy in the McKinley Home, and made an appropriation for a milk fund for the public schools.

Hillsboro, Ohio. Clothing, shoes and lunches are given all needy children.

Hobart, Okla. Furnished school books to 50 children.

Holdenville, Okla. The club has a chart on which each Kiwanian registers every week personal service rendered to under-privileged children. A survey was made in the city to find children needing clothing and school books.

Hollywood, Calif. An appropriation was made for the Los Angeles Orphans' Home so that children who attend the junior high school might have pocket-money. Dental supplies are purchased for this home, and clothing is furnished to boys at another local institution. The club hopes under its own auspices to conduct a day nursery.

Houston, Tex. In 1930 there were 137 children cared for by our clothing and school supply fund. Kiwanians are doing personal service work and there has been a total of over 600 contact visits.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

Huntington Park, Calif. A summer under-privileged child school, lasting 11 weeks, had 30 pupils registered for the period.

Huntsville, Ala. A \$1,000.00 appropriation is being used by our Under-Privileged Child Committee. Treatment is being given to all children recommended to the club.

Hyde Park, Chicago. A fund is made available to those institutions devoted to child care and all children up to 14 years of age are kept off the streets.

Indianapolis, Ind. Secured jobs for worthy boys. Sent children and mothers to a summer camp. Conducted a survey to determine what aid the club could give to the various social agencies. Took 116 orphans on a visit to a museum, and paid the expenses of one boy sent to Bloomington, Indiana, where he could secure treatment for his throat.

Jacksonville, Fla. The club has adopted the foster-parent plan of personal service. Orphans and crippled children from all the homes and institutions were given entertainments and outings during the year.

Jersey City, N. J. Over 175 families were investigated during 1930 to find children who needed aid. Besides the many major and minor operations the club purchased fuel, shoes, medical supplies, clothing, food, and orthopedic appliances. Positions were secured for men and boys and there was considerable relief work. One boy was sent to Washington, D. C., to represent Jersey City in a spelling contest. One hundred boys were sent to summer camp, and our camp activities for the year cost \$2,802.00. Between three and four thousand dollars were realized from the annual follies show. A donation was made to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children.

Kelso, Wash. Several children have been placed in homes where they can enjoy a good environment and will have the opportunity of attending school.

Kewanee, Ill. Our club is interested in helping to establish and support an open-air school.

Kingston, Ont. The club has agreed to give financial assistance to a social service board, which will provide a home under trained management for delinquents.

Kitchener-Waterloo, Ont. Two performances of "Kiwanis Jollies" gave us \$3,000.00 for our general welfare work.

Lake Charles, La. Pledged a monthly donation for a day nursery and the club gives an annual contribution for a clinic and a salvation home.

Los Gatos, Calif. Kiwanians assisted in raising \$5,000.00 for the building of an under-privileged child home. Milk is supplied all poor children.

Louisville, Ky. Sponsored a membership drive for the Kentucky Children's Home Society, in which several of our members are officials.

Lynchburg, Va. Funds were contributed to the Children's Home Society of Virginia and appropriations were made for a sanitarium and a boys' home.

Manitowoc, Wis. Thirty-five members have assumed special personal service on behalf of some child who is under-privileged.

Marion, Ky. With an auction secured sufficient funds to buy school books for needy children.

Medicine Hat, Alta. Visited 24 rural schools and supplied children with magazines, chocolate bars, baseballs and bats. Purchased school books and glasses for children from poor families.

Memphis, Tenn. The club is interested in developing a new school for mentally deficient children. Members have organized a "Little Kiwanis Club" for ten-year old under-privileged boys, and have given personal service and assistance.

Miami, Fla. The Miami Day Nursery is given help. Forty under-privileged and delinquent boys were given physical examinations. Later clothing was supplied to them and employment provided for those needing work. A benefit fund was created for the Florida Children's Home Society.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

- Midland, Ont. Provide milk for all under-nourished children. Forty boys are organized in a group and are under the direction of a vocational committee. Several children were given hospital treatment.
- Modesto, Calif. One crippled child is being furnished transportation and our physicians are offering their services free of charge in our under-privileged child work. Over 800 children were entertained at one of our outings.
- Monroe, La. The club has adopted seven children and clothing, food and milk are purchased for all needy children.
- Montrose-LaCrescenta, Calif. Two orphans were placed in homes. Clinical and surgical equipment were purchased for our welfare endeavors. Clothing was distributed to 30 children many of whom were not equipped to start school.
- Muscatine, Iowa. Engaged a director for the Lutheran Orphans' Home for one year, and appropriated \$100.00 for a hospital bed.
- New Albany, Miss. Thirty children have been provided with food and school books and the club is working for the proper legislation for the Crippled Children's Society.
- Newark, N. J. Sent children to summer camps. Secured physical examinations for others and sent gifts, prizes and novelties to children's homes and institutions on Valentine's Day, St. Patrick's Day, Easter, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Hallowe'en, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.
- Newnan, Ga. Assistance is given all worthy children so they can continue their school work.
- Norfolk, Va. Our main objective for 1930 was to build an addition and make improvements in equipment for the home of the Norfolk Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. This cost about \$2,000.00 and made it possible to accommodate 50 more young people.
- Ocala, Fla. Assisted in the establishment of a night school for under-privileged boys and girls.
- Olympia, Wash. Donated lumber and supplies to erect a play shed at a children's home and purchased playground equipment. Hot lunches are supplied to all needy children during the entire year.
- Orange-West Orange, N. J. Each Wednesday afternoon during the summer months automobile rides are given to the kiddies at an orphanage. Sent one little boy to a hospital for treatment.
- Oswego, N. Y. Repainted our summer health camp which accommodates 60 children. Doctors, who are Kiwanians, performed three operations for unfortunate children.
- Philadelphia, Pa. In 1930 the Kiwanis happiness car started its seventh season of bringing entertainment and education to the recreational centers and charitable institutions of the city. Celebrated New Year's Day by entertaining all the inmates at a crippled children's home.
- Pontiac, Mich. A clothe-a-child campaign commenced at the beginning of the winter season. All needy children were given shoes and 55 children were sent to a summer camp.
- Port Angeles, Wash. Eleven boys are being given personal service and guidance by individual members.
- Port Arthur-Fort William, Ont. A welfare fund of \$1,950.00 was spent for food, clothing, school supplies, a clinic and a summer camp. The club is caring for several child welfare and cripple cases.
- Portland, Me. For general charity work the club has a \$3,400.00 budget for 1931. A probation officer has a \$300.00 fund for making small loans, and over \$1,000.00 was donated for a day nursery and other hospitals and institutions. At Christmas time \$1,000.00 was spent for clothing, food, toys and fruit for 100 families. A \$1,000.00 emergency fund is in reserve in case of any disaster in the city. Children were sent to a summer camp.
- Prescott, Ariz. Two children were sent to San Francisco for treatment. Furnished books, clothing and milk for children from families of the poor.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

- Ridgefield Park, N. J. Vocational training is being secured for a colored lad. A typewriter was purchased for a blind youth, and the club has given a contribution to support an orphan boy in school. All members give their assistance for our baby and dental clinics.
- Riverdale, Toronto, Ont. Provide food, clothing, medical care, and entertainments for needy children and those in institutions. Our annual midnight frolic gave us \$1,125.00 for our boys' work committee.
- Rochester, N. H. Found homes for several unfortunate children and financed a service of giving hospital treatment and food to school children.
- Rome, Ga. The Under-Privileged Child Committee urged a plan to have the county take care of all orphans, as provided by an inactive state law.
- Rutherford, N. J. Because of the business depression, 109 children were given constant attention. Fifteen crippled children are also aided. Following an interview with the judge of the orphans' court, a promise was received to get a widow's pension for two children.
- St. Marys, Pa. Twenty-two youngsters were given examinations, diagnosis and treatments. One child was admitted to the Children's State Aid Hospital at Elizabethtown, Pennsylvania.
- St. Thomas, Ont. All mentally deficient children are having special treatment following a county-wide survey to locate the sub-normal cases. Kiwanis provides for a dental clinic in the schools, and 21 crippled children were under the observation of a prominent surgeon.
- San Antonio, Tex. Secured work for four orphan boys sent from local institutions, and entertained 475 orphans at a picnic.
- Sanford, Fla. Purchased manual training equipment for an orphans' institution and secure employment for youths old enough to work.
- San Jose, Calif. Maintained a teacher at the county hospital in the summer months for instruction and entertainment for children.
- San Luis Obispo, Calif. Paid a tuition for orphan boys at the California Polytechnic School and purchased milk for children of destitute families.
- Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. Our seventh annual drive for funds for a children's home made it possible to raise \$4,400.00. Had a large Halloween night party for children and also a lake shore picnic dinner.
- Scranton, Pa. In June officers and directors of the Scranton Day Nursery were our guests. The program included the burning of a note, the final payment on the \$6,000.00 addition to the day nursery building sponsored by the Kiwanis club four years ago. The nursery officials presented the club with a plaque in consideration of its services. A large electric refrigerator was also purchased for the nursery. Camp Kiwanis for children was opened for the summer period.
- Shelton, Wash. The sum of \$414.12 was secured by our first merchants' exposition, held in the school gymnasium. The money was used for our welfare work.
- Sioux Falls, S. D. The Under-Privileged Child Committee worked with legislators for the passage of a bill to increase appropriations for welfare work. Entertained 20 children from a school for the deaf.
- Somerville, Mass. Sent 20 children to a fresh air camp. Furnished shoes to needy school children and sent a school boy into the country for the entire summer.
- Springfield, Mo. Collected, repaired and distributed complete outfits of clothing for 483 school children. A children's playground pageant was a delightful occasion.
- Staten Island, N. Y. Several children have been placed in good homes, and a run-away boy from Greenville, S. C., was sent back to his home.
- Tipton, Ind. Each member has selected one child to whom he will be a pal and give personal service.
- Trenton, N. J. At one of our meetings had a crippled children's orchestra from the home at Newark, N. J. The entire membership was informed about the rehabilitation work of many crippled individuals.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

Tryon, N. C. School children in isolated districts have been supplied food and a family with seven children afflicted with pellagra were given special aid. A boy who was dying left \$5.00 to the club for under-privileged child work. A local minister, who told the story to his church congregation, received \$250.00 for the fund which went to feed unfortunate kiddies.

Virginia, Minn. The local firemen repaired and repainted all toys and articles, which the club later distributed to all needy boys and girls in the vicinity.

Wausau, Wis. Personal service is given to youths brought to our attention by charity agencies.

West Allis, Wis. Promoted a crippled children's class-room in the public school and purchased equipment and bus and secured teachers and a nurse for the 35 children in this room. Supplied needy children with underwear, stockings, mittens and shoes.

West Cleveland, Ohio. Employed a recreational director, who has charge of 60 children. Furnished equipment for a gymnasium at an industrial home and provided transportation for taking youths to a summer camp.

Winfield, Ala. Our main objective is to keep all under-privileged children in school.

Winnipeg, Man. Eight hundred books were sent to a fresh air camp. Purchased equipment for a children's aid shelter. Sent over 60 boys to a summer camp and employed a deaconess to work among the orphans of World War soldiers.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)

Physical

- Aberdeen, Wash.** The club pays \$35.00 a month to support a youth who is crippled and will continue to do so until his school days are over. Contributions have been made for the last four or five years for this boy.
- Adams, Mass.** Organized an infantile paralysis clinic, purchased milk for under-nourished children, paid for tonsil and adenoid operations and did other welfare work for under-privileged children.
- Aiken, S. C.** In co-operation with the county health unit transported children to an orthopedic clinic at Columbia. Twenty-eight cases are under observation.
- Alameda, Calif.** Several hundred dollars were paid for x-ray treatments for tubercular children.
- Albany, Ga.** Our Kiwanis clinic has been in operation for seven years, with more children being admitted during 1930 than any year since 1923. In 1930 there were 198 new cases admitted, with 417 treatments and 103 operations.
- Alexandria, Va.** Over 2,000 babies were given attention at the clinic during 1930. There were also more than 1,200 visits to the homes of these children, with mothers being instructed in the preparation of foods. Over 1,000 pamphlets on child welfare were also distributed.
- Algona, Iowa.** All children whose parents were unable to pay for the necessary operations were admitted to the local hospital free. The club contributed money to pay the necessary cost of facilities.
- Aliquippa, Pa.** Under-privileged children and babies are freely admitted to our ultra-violet ray clinic where they are given attention until discharged by medical attendants.
- Alva, Okla.** During the cold months members visited all schools to search for children in need of proper clothing, shoes and mittens. Milk is bought for all under-nourished children. For two years the club has contributed the spending money for a boy in the local hospital who has a broken back.
- Anaconda, Mont.** During the 1930 school year there were 1,385 dental examinations made at our clinic.
- Appleton, Wis.** For five years Kiwanians have been financing a free dental clinic. The city has recognized this excellent piece of work and in 1930 gave \$500.00 to relieve the club of some of its financial obligation.
- Auburn, Ala.** Made a study of the physical needs of a group of children who were under weight. Fresh milk was furnished for these children.
- Auburn, Lewiston, Me.** Over \$8,000.00 was placed in a permanent fund to conduct clinics at the general hospital.
- Baltimore, Md.** Kiwanians have appropriated over \$1,000.00 for necessary work and equipment at a nursery and children's hospital.
- Baxter Springs, Kan.** Over 250 children have been given attention in our clinic since its organization. Local doctors donate their services and all other expenses are paid by the club.
- Belleville, Ont.** The eyesight of a 12-year old orphan girl, who was totally blind, has been restored. The best surgical attention was given her at a Toronto general hospital.
- Bemidji, Minn.** Orthopedic appliances and glasses have been furnished for six crippled children. General transportation is also available for these children.
- Bloomsburg, Pa.** With the assistance of doctors, who are Kiwanians, our clinic was very successful. Orthopedic cases are being given attention immediately to have the young children secure the necessary corrections.
- Bowbells, N. D.** Through the efforts of the Under-privileged Child Committee it was made possible to secure a Red Cross county nurse for eight months each year to do child welfare work.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical).—Cont.

- Bradenton, Fla.** All children sent to the offices of the dentists in the county are treated free, if so advised by the county health nurse. The club is furnishing each dentist with the necessary materials. All under-nourished school children are being supplied milk and 45 were given a three-weeks camp vacation.
- Brandon, Man.** All proceeds from a miniature golf course are used for under-privileged child work. A net profit of \$773.25 from a minstrel show is being used for the same purpose. The club provides milk for all under-nourished children and personal service attention is being given one crippled lad.
- Burlingame-San Mateo, Calif.** Over \$1,000.00 was raised for our milk fund. We have 14 under-privileged boys at a preventorium.
- Burlington, Iowa.** Profits of \$972.00 from a home talent performance was used for our child welfare work and for the Kiwanis milk fund.
- Butte, Mont.** Over two-thousand home visits were made by the full-time child welfare nurse to the homes of children of pre-school age. Several hundred cases were referred to physicians and the nurse herself gave necessary educational welfare lectures and demonstrations to groups of mothers. Kiwanians helped to raise over \$13,000.00 for rehabilitation of crippled children. All indigent families were given immediate attention.
- Canton, Ohio.** One thousand dollars has been set aside to buy shoes and clothing for the poor children in our school and another \$1,000.00 was for the facilities of our fresh air camp where 30 children spent an eight weeks vacation. There was an average gain of weight of 8½ pounds among these under-nourished children, who have been in contact with tuberculosis. Our health camp has been in existence for over seven years. There were 5,000 paid admissions to our 11th annual Hallowe'en party from which the club realized \$1,400.00. Seventy dozen colored Easter eggs and baskets of candy eggs were distributed among 260 children at an Easter party. Each month \$150.00 is spent to supply milk to children in schools.
- Champaign, Ill.** Laboratory examination for diagnosis and medical attention is provided for crippled children and those recovering from infantile paralysis. A young boy, who lost his leg in a railway accident, is securing two years business training due to help from the club and the U. S. Government. Children at the Opportunity School are supplied with all necessities and fresh milk.
- Charleston, Mo.** There were 46 tonsil operations at our child clinic, with doctors and nurses giving their services free, otherwise the cost would have been over \$3,500.00.
- Charlottesville, Va.** Kiwanis furnished an automobile for the county nurse, who assists in our crippled children's work, and we maintain a bed in the Blue Ridge sanatorium. Over 4,000 patients, both children and adults, were given attention during the year at the clinic of the University of Virginia, due to the use of an automobile furnished by Kiwanis. The club is constantly giving support to local children's homes.
- Chicago Heights, Ill.** During the school term 9,277 bottles of milk were given to under-privileged children.
- Chicopee, Mass.** Sent a child to Boston where treatment was given for defective vision. Purchased a wheel chair for a crippled student and sent children to a hospital at Springfield for treatment. A donation was also made to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children.
- Clarksburg, W. Va.** Organized a crippled children's clinic with an examination of over 300 by the best surgeons available. This is the largest clinic of its kind ever conducted in West Virginia. Assisted in a state campaign for 100,000 members at \$1.00 each for the Crippled Children's Society. At the time of graduation a crippled girl, for whom the club had provided transportation throughout her entire four years in high school, was given a gift. Entertainment was provided for orphans and children in homes and institutions.

- Cleveland, Ohio. A Kiwanis nursery school at a local hospital cares for crippled children.
- Clifton Forge, Va. Our clinic made it possible to examine 28 children and give them aid.
- Cobalt, Ont. Glasses have been provided for 200 children. An optician has been engaged, and a small profit is secured from the sales of glasses to children whose parents can afford to pay for them. In this way the activity is financed. Several crippled children are being given aid.
- Commerce, Ga. A girl is being sent to a business college and the club raised funds to buy diphtheria serum which was furnished to a physician for the school children. Sent a boy to a summer camp.
- Conway, S. C. Helped pay the expenses of a county nutritional camp.
- Coral Gables, Fla. The club has a permanent dental clinic for children of the schools.
- Corbin, Ky. A clinic has been established for service to three surrounding counties. Over 105 children have been given examinations.
- Cordell, Okla. Sponsored a crippled children's clinic for 51 boys and girls and purchased milk for all under-nourished school children.
- Coshocton, Ohio. Eye examinations and glasses were furnished all under-privileged children in our schools.
- Covington, Va. Budget for the year was \$650.00. Examinations were made of all the eye, ear, nose and throat defects among school children.
- Cumberland, Md. Orthopedic appliances were secured for one boy, who was in a railroad accident, and a donation was made to a day nursery.
- Danville, Va. The club has over \$6,000.00 for its work at the preventorium erected three years ago. This amount was secured through a bazaar.
- Davis, Okla. Purchased invalid chairs for crippled children.
- Dawson, Ga. A county crippled children's clinic was very successful. Doctors from all the neighboring hospitals contributed their services for the operations which followed the clinic.
- Daytona Beach, Fla. All pre-school children were examined and given medical attention. The club has employed a full-time instead of a part-time nurse for its dental and medical work. Some personal service attention is being given to children whose responsibilities are great and need supervision. A theater performance gave over \$2,300.00 for our welfare work.
- Douglas, Ariz. All children brought to our attention are provided with medical treatment.
- Du Bois, Pa. Spent \$800.00 for eye, throat, and dental aid for all under-privileged children in the city. Two children were sent to Philadelphia for cataract operations. The club purchased milk for all under-nourished children in the public schools.
- Dubuque, Iowa. An appropriation cares for the purchase of milk for the fresh air camp, fresh air school-room, and two babyfolds in a neighborhood house. Clothing, food, medical and dental attention are given all needy children.
- East Orange, N. J. An endowment was made for the New Jersey Orthopedic Hospital and the club pays \$5.00 a week for defraying the expenses for a little fellow who is in need of hospital care.
- Eaton Rapids, Mich. The eyes of all indigent school children were examined and glasses furnished to those needing them.
- Eau Claire, Wis. An annual fund of \$1,200.00 is available for under-privileged children's surgical and optical work. With physicians, surgeons and eye specialists charging half rates our budget accomplishes as much as \$8,000.00 would under ordinary conditions.
- El Centro, Calif. Thirty-five crippled children are being placed in hospitals where they can get necessary surgical attention.

- Ellwood City, Pa. Purchased all necessary equipment for a dental clinic which was given to the public school authorities.
- Emporia, Kas. A survey of the city brought 187 pre-school children to our clinic for physical examinations.
- Emporia, Va. Holding regular monthly clinics for crippled children.
- Escanaba, Mich. Funds were made available for the Parent Teachers' Association so that more meals might be supplied under-nourished children in the schools and in the homes where there is unemployment.
- Fayetteville, N. C. The club has built and dedicated a Kiwanis health center to be used for various clinics.
- Ferndale, Mich. Public school authorities furnished information on children needing medical attention, glasses and proper diet.
- Fort Collins, Colo. A girl was placed in a Denver hospital for observation and treatment. Local firemen repaired and reconditioned toys later distributed among the poor. Hospitalization was scheduled for crippled children and necessities were purchased for others so that they could attend school.
- Framingham, Mass. A Kiwanis radio revue gave us funds with which to finance our children's work. One child was sent to a Boston clinic and the milk fund, which has been carried on by this club for several years, has now been taken over by the town.
- Frankfort, N. Y. Furnished glasses and milk to all poor children.
- Frederick, Md. Established a hospital bed for crippled colored children in Baltimore. Prominent surgeons have become interested in our clinics.
- Fremont, Ohio. The club will establish a permanent dental clinic in the public schools. A truck-load of shoes, clothing and groceries was sent to the King's Daughters' Home for under-privileged children.
- Gainesville, Fla. Financed five tonsil and adenoid operations, purchased glasses and paid for the lunches served to poor children. A loan was made to a blind graduate student.
- Glenside, Pa. Several hundred children have taken advantage of our dental clinic.
- Greenville, Pa. A donation was made to a hospital to assist in tonsil and adenoid operations for worthy and needy children. A children's clinic was given \$125.00 and a donation was made so the nurses could purchase milk for the under-nourished.
- Grove City, Pa. Sponsored a better baby and health clinic for the city.
- Hammonton, N. J. Provided entertainment in the hospitals for those children being given treatment.
- Harlan, Ky. Sixty-three children were examined at our clinic and \$189.00 was appropriated for our milk fund. The Kentucky Children's Home Society was also given an appropriation.
- Hattiesburg, Miss. An infantile paralysis case was sent to a children's hospital in Memphis, and there has been a great improvement. Two other similar children's cases have been sent on to Memphis.
- Haverhill, Mass. Kiwanians worked for an automobile show to secure funds for our welfare work and 208 children were given an entertainment at a nearby lake. Medical service and milk are supplied all needy cases.
- Helena, Mont. Major activities of the club deal with the sponsoring of a children's hospital. The club continues its dental clinic with all orphans and poor children being given free attention by physicians and dentists.
- Hillsdale, Mich. Four years ago Kiwanians established a dental clinic in the public schools and over \$700.00 is being spent in caring for the teeth of children whose parents cannot afford to pay for this treatment.
- Homestead, Pa. After cases have been investigated by local charities the club offers medical relief, free milk, clothing and other aid. The well baby clinic, no longer under direct Kiwanis supervision, has its rent paid by the club.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Hopewell, Va.** A child coming to our clinic in 1928 with a diagnosis of paralysis is now able to walk without the aid of even braces. Another young girl seeking aid in 1927 for tuberculosis of the hip now is able to walk without the aid of any apparatus. Monthly clinics are held for all crippled children and several hundred others take advantage of the weekly physio-therapy clinics.
- Hubbard, Ohio.** Purchased gymnasium equipment, furnished free milk daily and our dental clinic gave aid to 395 children.
- Huntington, W. Va.** The club is to establish a day nursery for the infants of mothers who are compelled to work away from home.
- Independence, Kas.** All children between the ages of five and fifteen were examined and given hospital care and surgical treatment. Glasses were supplied to poor children.
- Jamestown, N. Y.** An investigation was conducted in all the public schools to find children with eye defects and troubles. Doctors who are Kiwanians cared for all the boys and girls needing attention.
- Janesville, Wis.** The Kiwanis Alcove, a suite of six rooms at the Mercy Hospital, was given over \$2,600.00 for welfare assistance. All medical and dental work is done free of charge by local doctors.
- Jasper, Ala.** All organizations assisted Kiwanians in their clinic to find children needing eye, ear, nose and throat operations. Twenty-six crippled children were also examined and treatment advised. Food and lunches were supplied to poor families.
- Jefferson City, Mo.** At our free children's clinic over 1,200 have been helped since 1928. A rural clinic has now been opened in various parts of the surrounding county.
- Johnstown, Pa.** Total receipts from our Tiny Tim drive for orthopedic work were over \$5,475.00. An appropriation of over \$1,000.00 was made for our orthopedic hospital ward. Funds in this work have totalled \$26,000.00 with over 80 cases treated. During 1930 the club spent \$3,500.00 for this work and over 15 cases were given attention. There is an endowment fund of \$4,600.00.
- Joplin, Mo.** A youth has been kept in a hospital for over a year and one-half. Ninety children were entertained at our annual orphans' picnic. The club supplied school children with clothing and books and made an appropriation to the Missouri Society for Crippled Children.
- Kahoka, Mo.** Thirteen crippled children were brought to the clinic and some of them were later sent to a Columbia, Mo., hospital.
- Kansas City, Mo.** Over 800 children were given attention at the well children's station during 1930. Cases examined were later referred to physicians and surgeons. The health nurse made over 4,300 visits to homes. The station was constantly engaged with over 150 cases each month of the year.
- Kingston, N. Y.** A fully equipped dental clinic at a cost of over \$1,200.00 has been established for indigent school children. Milk was distributed to all under-nourished children and a profit of \$1,500.00 was secured from our theatrical performance.
- Kirkland Lake, Ont.** Gave financial assistance to a child threatened with loss of sight and constructed sun bath parlors for children showing tubercular tendencies. Two crippled children were sent to a hospital for treatment.
- Kissimmee, Fla.** Ten gallons of milk were supplied to the city school lunch room. Local dentists have agreed to take one child each week until all poor children have received treatment. Physicians also offered their services for poor children.
- Kittanning, Pa.** All children whose parents cannot pay for tonsil operations were cared for by the Kiwanis clinic.
- Kokomo, Ind.** Kiwanians erected playground equipment, built cement walks and arranged grounds at our nutritional camp. Each week pennies are collected for our under-privileged child fund.

- Las Cruces, N. M. Dentists of the city made a survey of schools to find children in need, and eye specialists, with the aid of teachers, examined the eyes of all children.
- Las Vegas, N. M. During an epidemic of tonsilitis all poor children were given immediate attention and first aid.
- Lawrence, Kan. Our baby and orthopedic clinics were held each month with a capacity attendance at all of them.
- Manassas, Va. Sponsored an adenoid and tonsil clinic with a survey bringing in 574 children of whom 172 were unable to pay for the medical service.
- Marion, Va. For several years the club has had one girl engaged at the Foster Falls School for Crippled Children.
- Maryville-Alcoa, Tenn. Agreed to raise \$5,000.00 for the Mountain View Sanitarium which cares for tubercular children of the county.
- Milwaukee, Wis. Sixteen under-privileged students received financial assistance each month during 1930. Over \$2,100.00 was expended to aid under-privileged children and, in addition to this amount, pledges amounting to \$1,500.00 have been made for continued work. Twenty-one crippled children were provided with orthopedic appliances so that they could attend school. The club continues to furnish clothing to school children.
- Moberly, Mo. Raised \$550.00 by popular subscription to send a young man, suffering with results of infantile paralysis to a specialist for treatment.
- Mobile, Ala. Dedicated a children's unit for the tuberculosis sanitarium which was erected from proceeds received from our annual plays.
- Monmouth, Ill. All under-privileged children have free examinations and treatment at our dental clinic.
- Montezuma, Ga. Established a milk depot at a public school. Our minstrel show was taken to Oglethorpe for a benefit performance for that city's Kiwanis Club.
- Morrilton, Ark. A crippled child was sent to Memphis for treatment and another operated on for an eye defect. Milk is furnished to all under-nourished children.
- Mt. Airy, N. C. Sponsored a 12-months' crippled children's clinic. At the first one 34 children were examined and 20 treated.
- Mt. Clemens, Mich. Sponsored physical examinations for all school children, seeking those with tuberculosis. Milk was provided for all under-nourished children in the public and parochial schools. Forty-eight children were given attention because of poor tonsils and teeth, and in need of glasses. Took 1,800 children to a circus.
- Muskogee, Okla. More than 175 children in the public schools are being supplied proper food because poverty was prevalent in their homes.
- Nanticoke, Pa. After a careful survey 125 crippled children were placed on an active list as needing immediate attention. About 110 others are also receiving treatment.
- Newark, Ohio. Secured \$3,500.00 for the children's tubercular summer camp which was conducted for ten weeks for 50 youngsters.
- New Haven, Conn. Eight hundred orphans were taken to a circus and boys and girls were sent to summer camps.
- New Kensington, Pa. About 150 children were given treatment and hospital service during 1930.
- New Liskeard, Ont. An eye clinic gave aid to 300 children of the town and rural schools. A budget of \$1,000.00 was set aside for a milk fund and general children's entertainment. More than 5,000 people attended our annual carnival which placed \$2,000.00 at the disposal of the club for welfare activities.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Newport News, Va. A monthly crippled children's clinic administers assistance to all children in the lower Virginia peninsula. No case is turned away although they may range from minor treatments to serious operations. One helpless cripple who reported to the clinic was able to get gainful employment after a few months' treatment. The club has sponsored a milk fund.
- North Adams, Mass. Our infantile paralysis clinic costs about \$1,000.00 a year. The club continues to give financial aid to the Boy Scouts for their camp grounds and buildings at Camp Kiwanis, which is a \$7,000 project.
- Oklahoma City, Okla. Medical members attended to 100 under-privileged children's treatments and operations and the club furnishes free lunches each school day. Five hundred orphans attended our picnic.
- Ocean City, N. J. One child, unable to walk, was aided by an operation so that now he is a normal happy boy. Poor children in the schools are supplied with milk.
- Oceanside, Calif. Members took children to a clinic at San Diego. Milk is furnished throughout the year to the children in the grammar schools.
- Okolona, Miss. A child badly burned was sent to Memphis for treatment and skin grafting. The operation was successful and the child has normal use of her hands.
- Ontario, Calif. Saved the life of one child after doctors pronounced his condition serious, due to malnutrition. Furnished two quarts of milk daily for babies in a destitute family.
- Ottawa, Kan. Sponsored a pre-school clinic.
- Ottawa, Ohio. Our clinic is open to all under-privileged children and to the general public in times of emergency.
- Paw Paw, Mich. Conducted a free clinic for crippled children in Van Buren county. A county nurse was re-engaged after the club promoted a meeting to explain the value of her services and to secure the co-operation of citizens.
- Penetanguishene, Ont. A specialist from Toronto examined nine children left crippled from infantile paralysis. Other child cases needing treatment are also being given attention.
- Perry, Fla. The club has organized a county public health unit which furnishes clothing to all needy children.
- Petersburg, Va. Held regular monthly clinics. Our health nurse made over 350 visits each month to homes where children needed aid. The clinic supplied orthopedic appliances, gave treatments, performed operations and furnished medicine. New patients entered the clinic at an average of about 25 each month and at the beginning of 1930 about 128 old cases were held over.
- Phoenix, Ariz. An under-privileged child committee has six cases under its supervision and these are very serious cases, needing hospital care.
- Pineville, Ky. After a clinic ten crippled children were sent to Louisville for treatment.
- Pittsburg, Kan. Purchased school books, furnished noon-day lunches and paid the expenses of 11 operations, for under-privileged school children.
- Pullman, Wash. Mentally defective children have been given examinations and some were taken from the schools and placed where they can receive proper training. Some of the children had improper home training and their parents were given instruction in child welfare.
- Redlands, Calif. Approximately \$30.00 a month was spent for milk for under-privileged children. Some 300 vaccinations were given free to prevent an epidemic of smallpox.
- Regina, Sask. Gave a radio for a children's hospital ward. Donated \$50.00 for a milk fund. Conducted a six weeks' camp and club members have taken an interest in a boy and girl who lost their parents.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Richmond, Va.** After years of patient treatment one eleven-year-old lad is now able to walk, though formerly he had to be carried to and from school. The sum of \$1,800.00 was set aside for crippled children's work in 1930. The orthopedic clinic showed 2,250 visits by patients during the first ten months of the year. The club pays the salary of a physio-therapist. Children from the various orphanages are given a motion picture show every Saturday morning. The Under-Privileged Child Committee also seeks employment for all youths needing work.
- Ridgewood, Brooklyn, N. Y.** The club supplied over 2,000 bottles of milk each month to school children, sponsored a summer camp, furnished shoes and clothing, and made donations to an orphan's home.
- Roanoke Rapids-Rosemary, N. C.** Kiwanians gave support for a crippled children's clinic at Goldsboro and purchased school supplies for 51 children.
- Rocky Mount, N. C.** Each Tuesday afternoon the club operates a tuberculosis clinic at two hospitals, and approximately \$1,000.00 is budgeted for this work.
- St. Augustine, Fla.** Adopted a policy of working 12 months a year with under-privileged children instead of during the school terms. A registered nurse was employed to visit the homes of the under-privileged.
- St. Joseph, Mo.** Five children all afflicted with paralysis or deformity are being aided.
- St. Lawrence, Montreal, P. Q.** At the annual hockey carnival night secured \$16,000.00 for welfare work. Some \$13,000.00 was distributed among hospitals. There were 527 boys and girls at our camp.
- Salt Lake City, Utah.** An appropriation of \$2,000.00 was used for under-privileged child and clinic work. There were over 180 youths in our boys' club, and Kiwanians engaged a lady social worker to visit and assist in the homes of these boys.
- Sanford, N. C.** Sponsored a tuberculosis clinic and 1861 children were given tests, and x-ray treatments. Books and milk were purchased for destitute children.
- Seattle, Wash.** During one school year the dental clinic cared for 749 children. Boys and girls were sent to a summer camp. Clothing was purchased for the children of one needy family. A free parental clinic conducted by an advisory group for parents of problem children, is giving an excellent service.
- Sedalia, Mo.** Fifty-seven children were examined at our crippled children's clinic. Clothing, fuel and milk were furnished poor families and a picnic was given the children and mothers of a day nursery.
- Selma, N. C.** Doctors cared for 153 charity cases at our clinic.
- South Boston, Va.** The club was responsible for the state legislature making an appropriation of \$10,000.00 for under-privileged child clinics. During each month of the year more than 55 patients were receiving Kiwanis treatment and aid. Hospitalization, x-ray, surgery, consultation, physio-therapy and appliances were included in the service.
- South Oklahoma City, Okla.** More than 1,000 children, whose parents were unable to provide proper food, were given sustenance during 1930. A "cuss box" was placed in a local barber shop, into which every man who cursed placed a dime. The money was used as a welfare contribution.
- Stockton, Calif.** Maintained a sunshine and health school for under-nourished children. Our work with this school has been responsible for the establishment of similar rooms in other schools. Made several payments to day nursery and furnished clothing for the poor.
- Strathmoor, Detroit, Mich.** Opened headquarters for receiving used clothing and to secure information regarding under-privileged children. Sent 42 under-nourished children and one mother to fresh air camp. Purchased shoes and clothing and provided entertainment.
- Sylvester, Ga.** A physical examination was given to every child in the city.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

Tacoma, Wash. A Kiwanis clinic was held at a hospital and the club has employed an experienced orthopedic nurse to investigate each case. The first 50 cases called for an expenditure of nearly \$1,000.00. All cases of malnutrition are given a special diet. Two hundred children were taken to a fall fair.

Terre Haute, Ind. The club's minstrel show secured \$2,500.00 for the equipping and furnishing of one hospital floor for crippled and underprivileged children. About 1,000 children were given a day's outing at the annual poor kids' picnic. Provided facilities at a supervised playground and summer camp.

Waltham, Mass. One hundred children are provided with milk each day. Sent children with tuberculosis to a camp.

Washington, D. C. Over 100 active orthopedic cases were constantly given attention during 1930. The nurse engaged made a large number of home visits to give crippled children attention and help. Hot lunches were purchased, and shoes and invalid chairs were supplied the crippled children's school.

Wachula, Fla. The Under-Privileged Child Committee has established medical, dental, and eye, ear, nose and throat clinics. Services of a state nurse were secured to examine all children in the surrounding vicinity.

Westbrook, Me. Established a free bed at the Maine General Hospital for children. The club continues its dental clinic and our circus made \$649.68 for the under-privileged child fund.

West Palm Beach, Fla. The club conducts constant eye, ear, nose and throat clinics, and a medical and surgical clinic. The dental clinic has two doctors and two nurses engaged full time. A county nurse and two other follow-up nurses are working full time, too. The fifth annual benefit show exceeded \$20,000.00 in receipts. The production was managed by Miss Billie Burke, Joseph Leblang and Sam Harris. The artists included Irene Bordoni, Louise Hunter, McIntyre and Heath, Jerome Kern, Anatole Friedland, George Gershwin and many others. Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Dillman donated \$2,500.00 for underprivileged child work. Seventy-six Kiwanians are giving personal service to children. Over 2,554 hours of contact visits and help were given by these Kiwanian Big Brothers.

Willows, Calif. Kiwanians paid the expenses to take a child to San Francisco for medical attention. Milk is supplied to the under-nourished and children were sent to a health camp.

Winchester, Ky. The club sponsored a style show with four performances at a motion picture theatre. The proceeds of this event went to a charity kitchen where meals are served to under-nourished boys and girls.

Woodbury, N. J. Doctors performed over 150 tonsil operations and the club purchased orthopedic appliances for crippled children. Specialists were secured to give a girl eye treatments.

Wyandotte, Mich. Maintained a free hospital bed and dental clinic.

The following clubs were engaged in securing surgical treatment and hospital care for children, organizing dental, eye, and orthopedic clinics, and purchasing equipment for hospitals and schools for crippled and sub-normal children:

Health Centers, Children's Hospitals, Day Nurseries and Camps

Alexandria Bay, N. Y. An entire quota of funds was raised to purchase land for a children's ward at the county tuberculosis hospital. Served milk throughout the winter months to all under-nourished children in the public schools.

Altoona, Pa. Placed under-developed boys on our health farm. A net profit of \$2,500.00 from a theater party was used in our general welfare work.

Ambler Pa. Considered purchasing ground for a campsite and had 30 children from Philadelphia brought to the College Settlement Farm. The annual business show gave us \$1,100.00 in profits for our welfare budget.

Atlanta, Ga. At a cost of \$35,000.00 the club has built, equipped and furnished a cottage which was presented to the Home of the Friendless institution. Four beautiful cottages are complete on the eight acres of woodland and 86 children are having the advantages of this new site.

Bayonne, N. J. Sent 12 boys and girls, selected by the local chapter of the tuberculosis league to a health camp.

Billings, Mont. Kiwanians built an additional unit for the sunshine health camp, which is being used for a dining hall and kitchen. All children recommended by the city school nurse were sent to the camp which is in charge of a trained nurse, a playground supervisor and a cook. Twenty-two children received attention at our tonsil and adenoid clinic.

Binghamton, N. Y. Kiwanis pays the salary of an instructor at the Castle, a home for under-nourished children. Our health camp is a haven for all children needing help.

Brantford, Ont. Property adjoining our camp was purchased during 1930 and complete playground equipment was installed. One hundred and seventy-five girls attended a camp at Port Dover. A theatrical performance gave us \$3,000.00 for our endeavors.

Canajoharie, N. Y. Fifty children from New York City, sent by the New York Herald-Tribune, were given two weeks' vacation.

Columbus, Ga. A day nursery has been established in the textile district. Babies may be placed while parents are at work in the mills. An appropriation was made for sending children to a fresh air camp and \$185.00 was spent to purchase glasses. An orphan is being sent to school.

Concord, N. C. A water car was operated during the summer months and 9,000 children took advantage of the shower bath equipment.

Detroit, Mich. At Camp Comfort 217 little girls had two to four weeks of vacation.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Flint, Mich.** Fifty children with symptoms of tuberculosis were kept at our health camp. This camp, completed in the early spring, has three permanent buildings, two are used for dormitory purposes and one for a mess hall and kitchen. The camp is very modern and has the latest of equipment and sanitary facilities. The club has a \$2,000.00 budget.
- Fort Wayne, Ind.** The board of directors submitted a resolution for the erection of a summer camp for the inmates of the Indiana School for the Feeble Minded.
- Gettysburg, S. D.** The club is purchasing a private estate in the Black Hills which is to be donated to the South Dakota Public Health Association and used as a health camp.
- Greenville, Ohio.** Raised \$4,700.00 to erect permanent buildings at our camp which cares for 58 boys and girls.
- Hamilton, Ont.** The fresh air camp accommodates 124 girls. Our class of Kiwanis boys are given periodical medical examinations and children at a local sanitarium are offered entertainments.
- Harrisonburg, Va.** The charity bed endowed at one hospital has made it possible, according to medical records, to have saved the lives of at least ten children.
- Kalamazoo, Mich.** A staff of 17 persons helped to entertain 345 boys and girls, between the ages of six and twelve, at our vacation camp. Thirty children who were in ill health received ten full weeks at the camp, which is appraised at \$15,000.00. This camp was originally built by Mr. Edward B. Desenberg, a member of Kiwanis, who, because of ill health, desired to be relieved of the management of the camp, so the club has taken the responsibility.
- Kansas City, Kan.** Ninety children received the benefits of our tuberculosis summer camp. Sold \$3,000.00 worth of health bonds to provide maintenance for the campaign.
- Kent, Ohio.** Provided a preventorium for 55 children, with nurses, dietitians and physicians in charge.
- Little Rock, Ark.** A boys' camp on 80 acres of ground purchased in 1929 entertained 100 youths. Spent \$1,000.00 at the camp in 1930. Two swimming holes are to be constructed.
- Manchester, Conn.** A camp fund of \$1,100.00 gave over 50 children a summer vacation.
- Minneapolis, Minn.** Another cottage has been erected at the Salvation Army Silver Lake camp for children and mothers. Each group of children remains two weeks and Kiwanian doctors make all the medical examinations and furnish treatment when necessary. In July 270 children were taken on vacations.
- Montreal, P. Q.** A fund of \$3,000.00 was donated to erecting a dormitory at Camp Chapleau. The third Kiwanis industrial exposition in October netted over \$7,500.00 for our welfare budget. Donations were made to children's hospitals in the city. Special entertainments were also arranged for all of the little inmates in these institutions.
- Morristown, N. J.** Kiwanians are raising \$1,200.00 to build an infirmary at a nearby camp.
- Norwood, Ohio.** Furnished a room and purchased equipment for a day nursery.
- Owen Sound, Ont.** Our camp staff consists of a nurse, supervisor, caretaker, two cooks and kitchen assistants. The camp accommodates 50 people for ten-day periods.
- Peterborough, Ont.** Voted \$1,200.00 for children's camp where the club installed playground equipment. A Produced-in-Canada exhibition secured us \$2,700.00. Three crippled children are being aided.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

Portsmouth, Va. After conducting a health camp for five years on leased property, the club's major objective is to find a permanent site on which to erect suitable buildings. Ten acres of woodland have been found and the proposed camp, including buildings and ground, now represents an expenditure of approximately \$7,000.00, all of which has been paid. At least 100 children are cared for each summer and are given medical and dental treatment.

Rochester, Minn. The club is the principal sponsor for a day nursery, and furnishes milk to all under-nourished children. An appropriation is made for a dental clinic and our annual children's picnic attracts over 400 each year.

Rockford, Ill. An addition has been built to the Illinois Cottage, a home for physically defective children, at an expense of \$1,615.00. The club has spent \$6,115.00 for this home.

Sacramento, Calif. Gave \$900.00 to construct a recreation building at a preventorium.

St. John, N. B. In September some 500 children were cared for at the day nursery which the club is financing. A radio auction night increased our funds by \$2,500.00.

St. Paul, Minn. At an operating cost of \$2,340.00 conducted Camp Kiwanis for 444 under-privileged children. The land for the camp is leased at \$150.00 a year and a camp assistant is engaged. Medical examinations are given all children by the staff doctors of the city health department. There were 14,389 meals served in 1930 and the average gains in weight for a ten-day vacation period were, for boys 3.5 pounds, and girls 2.5.

Santa Monica, Calif. Made the final payment on a \$2,700.00 lot that the club presented for the erection of a day nursery. This was the chief objective for 1930.

Spokane, Wash. A fund of \$1,669.00 has been raised for our new health center.

Sydney, N. S. A budget of \$1,500.00 was needed to open a health camp for 90 under-nourished boys and girls. The camp was under the supervision of a medical officer and three nurses.

University City, Mo. Besides immediate relief work, the club has voted to give \$3,000.00 to building a gymnasium and a home for mothers and children.

DEVELOPMENT OF BETTER TOWN AND COUNTRY RELATIONS

Kiwanis strives "To bring about a better understanding and a closer relationship between the farmer and the city man." The accomplishments in furthering the development of better town and country relations show that progress has been made. Kiwanis International has published a book, "Urban-Rural Relations," which fully outlines ways in which to bring the town and country groups in closer contact to discuss each other's problems. The results for the past year were as follows:

General

- Aberdeen, N. C.** Presented medals, diplomas, and \$450.00 in gold to winning farmers in our master farmer's contest. One general meeting was held with all the farmers of Moore County and the leaders of the 4-H clubs were entertained.
- Alamosa, Colo.** As an experiment, a car-load of baby beef was put on full feed in the valley. This was done to arrive at feeding figures in a community which has produced a large number of cattle for outside feed areas. An urban-rural relations meeting was held a distance of 55 miles from our city.
- Albany, Ga.** Our efforts made it possible to employ a negro county agricultural agent.
- Albert Lea, Minn.** The club furnished weekly programs for farmer organizations throughout the county. Prizes were awarded all the annual 4-H club winners.
- Algona, Iowa.** Assisted at the county fair by selling tickets, arranging for automobile parking and other general work. Each Kiwanian was on a two-hour shift.
- Americus, Ga.** With our help the county commissioners were willing to secure a county demonstration agent for 1931. Our main objective is the improving of general farm conditions in this territory.
- Anderson, Ind.** Special guests at our meeting were the champions in egg production, dairying, corn growing, sheep production, hog raising and the winners in the potato club and county corn husking contests.
- Assiniboia, Sask.** At the general fair our duty was to look after the grand-stands.
- Auburndale, Fla.** A committee was appointed to re-organize the vegetable and berry growers. Assisted the farmers before the county board so roads would get prepared immediately and farmers get produce to market.
- Augusta, Ga.** Twenty-five prizes valued at \$1,000.00 were distributed at our annual meeting when reports were heard on the five-acre cotton and corn contests. Our interest is to develop scientific agriculture and a better-balanced farming program under a more diversified system. Some 80 farmers are interested in our program.
- Austin, Tex.** Sent five rural boys and girls to the Texas A. & M. College for an agricultural short course.
- Baraboo, Wis.** Our farmer's institute accommodated 600 people.
- Bartlesville, Okla.** The Committee on Agriculture took a government film around the country and conducted meetings at various school houses.
- Beattyville, Ky.** The tobacco project and contest has been organized with 4-H members of Lee County. The club has purchased an award cup for this endeavor.
- Bend, Ore.** Helped to secure water for domestic use and irrigation.
- Blackwell, Okla.** Originated a plan so that the various members of women's rural clubs could be entertained. Several rural acquaintance meetings were delightful occasions.
- Bluefield, W. Va.** The Committee on Agriculture has arranged for the establishment of a normal rural extension school at Concord College.

- Boonville, Mo. More and better poultry is our main project. Members are sponsoring some calf and pig clubs.
- Bowling Green, Ky. Conducted a farm school and entertained 60 farmers from this vicinity.
- Brooksville, Fla. Kiwanians worked with the citrus growers to secure the spraying of all fruit groves. Sent a 4-H club girl to a summer camp and called a meeting for the organization of a poultry-men's association. A banquet was held in honor of Miss Florence Smock and Mr. Harold Deatline, healthiest boy and girl in the U. S.
- Cairo, Ill. Sent out 100 letters to farmers urging them to attend a state dairy meeting. A poultry show was held in November with the club getting out an excellent premium list.
- Caldwell, Okla. Assisted in the entertainment of 1,000 visitors at the agricultural substation of the University of Idaho. Assisted in a poultry show and aided people attending the state grain convention. Our co-operation was also given to the dairy men for an annual picnic.
- Calgary, Alta. Two-hundred Kiwanians invited the farm families of this district to a picnic at a nearby lake. At the annual luncheon of the board of trade the Kiwanis cup was awarded to Mr. Ben Thomas of Indus, Alberta, winner of the best field of wheat. Entertained 30 boys and girls exhibiting cattle at the spring stock show.
- Camden, N. J. Awarded prizes during a recipe contest for national egg week. In three days 281 recipes were submitted.
- Canon City, Colo. Promoted the first annual farmers' and merchants' day.
- Carrington, N. D. Organized a poultry school, assisted in a corn and potato show, sponsored a meeting of the local wool growers, and brought together 150 farmers to encourage land sales.
- Cedartown, Ga. Offered two prizes, one for winter gardens and another for canned vegetables.
- Chanute, Kan. In order to maintain interest in the agricultural class of the trade school, the club leased a five-acre tract of land for experimental purposes in soil fertilization. The profits from the sale of crops were placed in the treasury for future expenses. Held group meetings with farmers in the rural areas.
- Chapel Hill, N. C. Agreed to pay the charter fee for the local unit of the National Grange.
- Chattanooga, Tenn. A committee was appointed to draft proper legislative acts to certify and grade all farm products and work to develop four distribution centers for the state. Our annual farm meeting in August was attended by approximately 2,500 farmers. Two good-will meetings in farming sections were successful and an institute program was sponsored with specialists in charge.
- Chester Pike, Pa. A visitation was made to a modern dairy plant to offset rumors that inferior milk was being distributed in this community.
- Chippewa Falls, Wis. Made a project tour to over a dozen farms and inspected the gardens, stock, buildings and land.
- Clatskanie, Ore. A meeting was held to help farmers organize a dairy association. Worked to secure an agricultural course in the public schools. Sponsored a dairy train. Developed an exhibit for the county fair. Sent 4-H students to summer school. Held several rural good-will meetings and aided the Grange in securing a car-load of lime.
- Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Over 2,500 farmers were entertained at the annual chamber of commerce meeting.
- Columbia, Mo. At the close of some land judging contests held a mutton barbecue for the farmers of the county.
- Comanche, Okla. Rural entertainments were held each Thursday evening at some country school house.

- Commerce, Ga. Sponsored the hiring of an expert agriculturist to work with farmers and merchants in a co-operative way. Purchased 6,500 pounds of vetch and Austrian peas and sold them to farmers at cost. A Jersey cattle show was held for a cattle club group.
- Conway, Ark. Exhibited a car-load of dairy cattle at the state fair, and sponsored a dairy roundup.
- Cooperstown, N. D. Assisted in a county feed and poultry show and entertained three rural community picnics.
- Cornelia, Ga. The club had the Department of Entomology to put on an experiment for controlling the oriental fruit moth. Secured a permanent camp for boys and girls and plans are under way for permanent buildings.
- Corpus Christi, Tex. The Committee on Agriculture distributed 200 bushels of different brands of pure cotton seed to 30 farmers. About 105 farmers were present at a community meeting.
- Covington, Ga. Financial support was given the county agent to send prize winning calves to a fair in Atlanta. All farmers of the surrounding vicinity were invited to hear a discussion on co-operative marketing. Sent a 4-H club girl to camp.
- Dade City, Fla. Secured increased acreage for strawberry planting so growers could get a better platform market. Organized citrus growers for the purpose of spraying groves as a step in the raising of the citrus fruit quarantine.
- Danville, Ky. Sponsored a raspberry growing project to create increased interest in diversified farming. The club gave prizes for the best patches of berries.
- Darlington, S. C. Sixteen farm women, leaders of women's clubs, were guests at our meeting. The Committee on Agriculture secured 30 pigs for farmers. Some 5,000 canned products were distributed in the rural district and later were offered for sale on the local market.
- Dayton, Wash. Co-operated with a national farm organization in establishing branches in Dayton and Pomeroy. Held a Kiwanis-Farmer banquet and later a picnic.
- Deer Lodge, Mont. All the poultry men of our county were our guests and Kiwanians assisted in a successful rodeo. There was a good-will tour over the county and also a barbecue. An industrial picnic was held in mid-summer.
- Dothan, Ala. Members visited the rural schools and discussed topics such as trucking, tobacco culture, better schools and homes, health and hygiene, safety, church development and American ideals.
- Douglas, Ga. The club arranged for independent grading of tobacco offered on the local markets. This made it possible for farmers to determine the prices paid them for the different grades.
- Douglas, Wyo. Two meetings were held with the State Board of Agriculture to plan for a state fair. There was a use beet sugar campaign and we had a successful demonstration of a tea-growing project in the mountains outside of Douglas.
- Edina, Mo. Secured a farm agent for the county. Sponsored a better beef production meeting and conducted rural get-together parties.
- Elberton, Ga. A series of meetings in the rural schools, presented a program in motion pictures including methods of farm diversification and marketing facilities. Kiwanians gave talks at these rural meetings and later held a minstrel show. Boys were sent to Athens to spend a day at an agricultural college.
- El Dorado, Ark. The Kiwanis orchard, which contains 1,200 trees, is a 15-acre experimental peach tract. The work is under the supervision of the county agent and Kiwanians are trying to stimulate diversified farming and fruit growing in this country. Entertained farmers at a community dinner, donated a county fair prize, sponsored a minstrel show and selected a young girl as the fair queen for the Union County fair in October.

- Elgin, Tex.** Over 140 farmers were present at a meeting in the interests of promoting the raising of cantaloupes. As a result over 400 acres were pledged for planting. Later a representative explained to the farmers the handling and marketing of this crop.
- El Reno, Okla.** The club is trying to get the government to furnish the land at Fort Reno for a county and Indian fair. The 4-H club boys were entertained at one of our meetings.
- Elwood, Ind.** Endorsed the state cornhusking contest and had 3,412 people visit an agricultural exhibit. Held rural home meetings.
- Eustis, Fla.** Finances were made available for the agricultural classes of the public schools to carry out melon raising. A county picnic was a big success and there was a parade and melon feast.
- Fairbury, Neb.** The club made a trip to the agricultural college at Manhattan and took about 500 farmers as guests. There were several urban-rural group meetings.
- Fayetteville, N. C.** Paid the salary for a county agent, purchased a registered bull and aided in securing pure-bred stock which was sold to nearby farmers.
- Frederick, Md.** A dairy improvement contest made it possible for farmers to eliminate cows giving less than 4,000 pounds of milk per year. Two silver cups were awarded the champions in the 4-H calf and pig clubs.
- Gainesville, Tex.** Working for the improvement of the dairy industry and assisted boys and girls in county projects. Sent a 4-H club girl to college for a short course and held a rural meeting with a barbecue. Kiwanians were interested in promoting a county fair.
- Galt, Ont.** Sponsored the Ontario farm products window display competition. Entertained 400 farmers and their families.
- Gettysburg, S. D.** Co-operated with the fair association to put on a horse-racing program. Members are interested in the promotion of a calf club and the committee arranged for a general market day at which time all business houses had special bargains. Invitations were sent out within a radius of 50 miles of the city to take advantage of this special business day.
- Greenville, S. C.** About 25 citizens left in December for Moultrie, Ga., to study a plan of diversified farming. The club hopes to establish a creamery and canning factory in this city.
- Harrisburg, Ill.** Entertained 80 exhibitors who were here for the state poultry show.
- Harrison, Ohio.** An audience of 500 attended a farmers' institute and were entertained by the special program. The club is engaging in an educational campaign for co-operation between urban and rural groups.
- Hartwell, Ga.** Our main work was to keep engaged all the agricultural vocational teachers and the county agent. Assisted with a three-day farm meeting held here.
- Hattiesburg, Miss.** The Committee on Agriculture has taken an active part in developing the dairying industry. There is an arrangement so that merchants give away a registered Jersey cow each month. A community event is known as potato day and on this day, during each week of the potato season, the local farmer can bring his crop to a marketing association and receive the highest market value in cash for his products. Kiwanians are organizing a curb market for farmers within a trade radius of this town to enable them to come to a central point to sell produce. Permanent buildings are being erected for this market.
- Hebron, Neb.** A special trip was made to the State College of Agriculture at Manhattan with 175 farmers as guests.

- Hogansville, Ga.** A farmers' club was organized and, in the interest of diversified agriculture, 150 bushels of seed potatoes and 100 pounds of melon seeds were distributed. There is to be co-operative buying of fertilizer. A warehouse costing \$24,400.00 was secured to store the fertilizer and this saved the farmers approximately \$8,000.00. Application was made for lower rates on new farm produce sent in car-lot shipments. As a result of diversification, 13 cars of melons were sent to market as a first shipment. The club assisted in plans for a county fair and aided in developing calf, pig and cotton clubs.
- Hope, Ark.** Made weekly good-will tours into the country sections and aided in relieving the drought situation.
- Huntington, Ind.** A seed corn tester, constructed and owned by the club, has been loaned to the county farm bureau, which made tests for farmers of the county at a low co-operative price. Sent farmers out to the annual agricultural conference at Purdue University, and entertained 150 people at an urban-rural meeting.
- Jesup, Ga.** The Committee on Agriculture is working to establish a tobacco market and warehouses. A scholarship award was made to the Wayne county boy or girl doing outstanding 4-H club work. The county agent is being helped in the program of aiding farmers.
- Kalispell, Mont.** A representative was sent to attend the state agricultural and industrial congress in Helena. Entertained 4-H members and also farmers of this vicinity.
- Kansas City, Mo.** Over 2,000 vocational students from 30 states attended the American Royal Live Stock Show and the Fifth Annual National Congress of Vocational Agriculture. During this time the club sponsored live-stock judging activities for vocational agricultural high school students. For the vocational banquet Kiwanians purchased prizes. Fifty farmers attended one of our banquets.
- Kingston, Ont.** Held a joint farmers' and industrial meeting. The club has two active farmer members. Urban-rural meetings were held in surrounding villages.
- Kirksville, Mo.** Helped to sponsor the second annual clover and prosperity meeting. The farmers' night meeting was given over to a banquet and entertainment.
- Kissimmee, Fla.** Instrumental in forming an organization to increase the acreage planted in winter vegetables. Farmers were also aided in securing plants and advice on how to handle spring crops.
- Knightstown, Ind.** Sponsored a farmers' short course and had a two-day corn and potato program. Our live-stock show is now a regular community day and the club sponsors a state champion judging team.
- Kitchener-Waterloo, Ont.** Kiwanians made possible the organization of a three months' course in agriculture and household science at Breslau for an enrollment of 80 farm boys and girls.
- Klamath Falls, Ore.** Raised several hundred dollars for the organization of a cow testing association and put on a cowboy breakfast at 6 a. m. for 250 persons attending a meeting of cattle raisers.
- Largo, Fla.** Our main work has been a clean-up campaign in the citrus groves.
- Latrobe, Pa.** Established a curb market and entertained the farm folks at several meetings.
- Lebanon, Ind.** Joined with the farm people in an evening dinner and program, and sponsored a soy bean test and demonstration.
- Lewiston, Idaho.** Our farm meeting entertained 60 guests and the club participated in the annual cherry blossom festival and parade. The blossom princess was presented with a wrist watch.

- Little Rock, Ark.** The agricultural committee brought to the attention of the state tax committee the situation which now compels farmers to wait too long a time for refunds on gasoline used for agricultural purposes. Assistance is being given county agents and commissions for the aid and improvement of agriculture.
- Logansport, Ind.** Worked for a farmer-business men's party. Awarded prizes to calf club winners at the county fair, the prizes being trips to the International Stock Show at Chicago. Sponsored a farmers' short course and held a farm meeting and later a picnic.
- London, Ont.** Two hundred Kiwanians and their wives attended a successful meeting at which prizes were presented to winners in a home ploughing contest.
- Louisburg, N. C.** Through the efforts of Kiwanians, a county farm board was organized. Promoted a live at home program.
- Louisville, Ga.** At an agricultural meeting had a display of power equipment and later lectures by specialists on these devices. Went before county authorities to prevent the discontinuance of a county agent. We are interesting farmers in clubs for cattle, poultry and hog raising.
- Macon, Ga.** In gathering information for a stock market, sent a committee to visit the markets at Knoxville, Atlanta and Memphis. Sixty farmers attended one of our meetings and a large delegation went to Moultrie to attend the harvest festival.
- Manhattan, Kan.** Provided a pet and poultry show for the school children. The committee had distributed over 1,200 baby chicks to boys and girls of the town. The club was guest of 450 farmers throughout the state who were visiting the Nebraska College of Agriculture. Rural community meetings with farmers as invited guests were delightful occasions.
- Marion, S. C.** Assisted the farm agent in getting men to join the co-operative tobacco marketing association.
- Marshall, Tex.** Two boys were given financial aid so they could enroll for a short course. Sponsored a corn club and established a division of the cotton marketing bureau. Assisted in securing a meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation and made a trip to the rural communities.
- Maryville-Alcoa, Tenn.** Leading farmers made soil inspection tours and later discussed live stock, dairying and diversified crops. Lectures were given by agricultural specialists.
- Mebane, N. C.** Three hundred farmers took advantage of a farm school at which time over 40,000 pounds of seeds were distributed, sufficient to plant 2,000 acres. Evening programs were presented in various rural sections.
- Melfort, Sask.** Distributed 60 bushels of registered seed oats to 30 boys who were later entertained after a grain contest. A minstrel show secured us funds for this work.
- Memphis, Tenn.** Paid all the expenses for a 4-H club boy who was sent to Washington, D. C., to attend a conference of the National 4-H organization. This boy had repaid a loan to the club, made the year before so that he could buy seed and fertilizer for one acre of cotton. A separate division of the tri-state fair was open for Kiwanis 4-H club boys' livestock displays. The boys won \$159.00 in prizes. Ten Jersey calves were given to farm boys who were selected by the farm agent, the boys taking these calves have a plan of repayment to the club.
- Metter, Ga.** Started a cream station. Invited farmers to learn of the growing and marketing of sweet potatoes, and worked to bring about better farming conditions.
- Miami, Fla.** Assisted in organizing a poultry growers' association and financed a class of boys at the high school so that they could practice farming. The boys made \$105.00 above the expenses which were originally paid by the club.

Scholarships were awarded each of the eight winners in the county agricultural and home economics contest for 4-H club work. Kiwanians entertained 135 county farmers at a get-together luncheon. The 4-H county champion was given a trip to the national stock show in Chicago.
- Moberly, Mo. Aided the farm bureau in getting memberships and developing an agricultural program.
- Modesto, Calif. A \$100.00 scholarship was established for the boy or girl who stands highest in agricultural work each year. The 4-H club work was our main objective during 1930.
- Monett, Mo. Organized farm clubs to educate rural people in improved methods in soil building, use of lime, inoculation, and legume planting. Favored the employment of a demonstration agent for the county and entertained 250 farmers at a banquet.
- Monroe, Wis. Conducted a successful farmers' institute and entertained 20 of the leading farmers of the county.
- Montezuma, Ga. Our chief work was towards securing an agricultural agent.
- Montpelier, Ind. Organized a county board of agriculture. Completed a 4-H club camp location. Held a community picnic. Developed interest in hog raising and held a combined city-farm meeting.
- Morgantown, W. Va. Assisted 4-H members in purchasing tools, planned a fall fair and industrial exhibition, held a 4-H camp picnic and sent members into the country for speaking engagements at community meetings.
- Mt. Airy, N. C. The club is doing work among farm boys and girls. One meeting was given over to a program showing the cost of production of farm products.
- Mt. Gilead, Ohio. Over 2,000 people attended a two-day farmers' institute. The club sponsored a farm and town meeting.
- Nephi, Utah. Secured necessary funds for building an egg grading plant, and had 16 representative farmers at one of our meetings.
- New Liskeard, Ont. We were hosts to the American Association of Agricultural Journal Editors; organized boys' potato and sheep clubs, and planned to commence a project for supplying western cattle to our farmers. Twenty-eight farmer friends were present at a rural meeting.

Paid the expenses of eight county 4-H boys and girls to a meeting at Lincoln and furnished leadership pins for these young people. Our guests at one meeting were members of the county farm bureau. The Kiwanis clubs of Omaha, Shenandoah, and Clarinda entertained the winning 4-H clubs of Page county with a tour of inspection of Omaha's industrial and commercial concerns. Later in the evening there was a theater party.
- Orlando, Fla.** Every member participated in a house to house canvass asking the owners to remove their fruit and covered every piece of territory over an area of six square miles in a clean-up campaign against the Mediterranean fruit fly. This was in an effort to lift the embargo. Entertained a group of farmers at our luncheon.
- Orleans, Ind.** The rural mail route was extended to accommodate about 24 more families. Sponsored calf and pig clubs with exhibits at the state fair, and held a rural meeting for farm families.
- Ottawa, Ill.** The club conducted an oratorical contest during the La Salle county farmers' institute. Good-will and extension meetings were held in the rural sections.

- St. Lawrence, Montreal, P. Q. A party of Kiwanians journeyed 54 miles from Montreal to St. Calixte and presented a thoroughbred bull to the farmers. This is the second animal that has been given to this community.
- Salem, W. Va. Arranged for a 4-H club fair with members providing prizes. The 4-H potato club was a successful venture. Held a farmers' day and numerous rural meetings.

- Talladega, Ala. Organized a county calf club for boys and purchased 12 pure-bred calves in Florida for this organization. Our program is to stimulate county-wide interest in agriculture and dairying. One youth was sent to Chicago for being the best judge of livestock.
- The Dalles, Ore. Attended the annual county farmers' picnic and organized a campaign to protect the dairy industry against the destructive use of butter substitutes. Awarded 4-H scholarships, sent a delegation to a county fair and developed a calf club for 4-H boys.
- Tillamook, Ore. Promoted a county agricultural survey, awarded two scholarships to 4-H girls at a summer school and offered Grange and other farm programs.

- Albany, Ore.** The Albany Club has been active in promoting 4-H club work for the past three years, 30 boys and girls competing for the prizes.
- Alexandria, Minn.** Made a contribution toward a new 4-H club building at the county fair grounds.
- Athens, Tex.** Our 4-H club now has a membership of 300. Fourteen boys raised over 1,500 pounds of cotton per acre. Arrangements were made with the county agent for his visit twice each month to the farms where these boys are carrying on the cotton experiment.
- Antigo, Wis.** Over 400 members of the 4-H clubs were our guests. Our annual alfalfa meeting was attended by 40 farmers.
- Attica, Ind.** Four hundred boys and girls were in attendance at our 4-H club meeting. In the past four years the calf club has made a record success. Held several farmer meetings.

VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE AND PLACEMENT

Vocational guidance and placement was added during the convention year of 1925-26 by Kiwanis as an International Objective. Listed here are a few of the undertakings:

- Alamosa, Colo.** Kiwanians got in touch with boys returned on parole from state industrial schools. The club hopes to give these youths personal attention.
- Amory, Miss.** A special committee was appointed for boys needing work during vacation.
- Astoria, Ore.** Purchased 11 books on vocational guidance and placed them in the public library. They were reserved for the first three months for Kiwanians and were then available for the general public.
- Austin, Minn.** Forty members have become interested in the work of vocational guidance and placement.
- Bellefonte, Pa.** An effort was made to locate permanent positions for all high school seniors and to also help those planning further education.
- Berkeley, Calif.** The Committee on Vocational Guidance took several young men and found advanced positions for them.
- Bloomsburg, Pa.** Kiwanians sponsored a mechanical club in the high school.
- Burlington, N. J.** All 8th grade students were informed about various high school courses and the value of advanced education. Organized a Big Brother and Sister club, used vocational questionnaires, and accumulated information about all surrounding colleges and universities.
- Cameron, W. Va.** Information on educational and vocational careers were distributed among all parents and many schools.
- Champaign, Ill.** Helped to secure work for high school boys and sponsored talks on advertising and art.
- Charleston, S. D.** After a survey organized students in groups so that Kiwanians could discuss their businesses and professions.
- Charlotte, N. C.** Twenty-five under-privileged boys were given the opportunity of hearing professional men discuss a career in medicine, industry and civic life.

- Concord, N. H.** Several boys and girls were given training in the offices of members.
- Crawfordsville, Ind.** A three-day program of conferences and lectures on vocational guidance was sponsored and financed by the club.
- Darlington, S. C.** Offered prizes for the best essays on "What Am I Going to Do?" The club has arranged for all high school students to secure personal interviews.
- Durham, N. C.** The Vocational Guidance and Placement Committee arranged for talks at the various city schools; distributed folders on vocational interests; organized groups interested in a particular business or profession and arranged for special tests for graduating students so that they might have definite guidance.
- East Aurora, N. Y.** A book was printed to be distributed among the youth of our city. Joseph T. Barber, who has spent several years in a vocational guidance study, compiled the book.
- East Cleveland, Ohio.** In a find yourself campaign group conferences with special speakers were arranged on the following subjects: law, business, engineering, medicine, dentistry, manufacturing, advertising, journalism, salesmanship, banking, art, finance and securities.

VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE—Cont.

- East St. Louis, Ill. There were over 1400 who took advantage of our vocational program in law, education, medicine and engineering. Personal interviews followed large group meetings.
- Everett, Wash. The club is attempting to secure vocational aid for those released from the Monroe Reformatory.
- Gastonia, N. C. Furnished jobs for boys home from college during the summer months.
- Geneva, N. Y. Several boys have been aided in securing a college education. Vocational adjustment work is also a part of our program.
- Great Falls, Mont. Due to the efforts of the Committee on Vocational Guidance the school board has decided to add a vocational department.
- Hillsboro, Ohio. Fifty high school boys were interviewed by our leading business and professional men. A program of vocational guidance is being developed for all junior and senior high school boys.
- Hillsdale, Mich. Seventy seniors of the high school were given a vocational lecture and all who desired it were given assistance.
- Jacksonville, Fla. Over 3,000 boys heard addresses on vocational guidance. One hundred were given personal interviews to assist them in selecting a business or profession.
- Joliet, Ill. The club completed over 1,700 interviews and secured more than 300 permanent and temporary positions for boys and girls. There were talks on vocational guidance and special visits where there were demonstrations in typing, stenotyping and mimeographing. Over 1,500 boys were interested in aeronautics.
- Joplin, Mo. Two hundred boys were given the opportunity of receiving personal interviews. Fourteen business and professional men spoke on their work to large high school groups.
- Kalamazoo, Mich. All graduating students were given information, personal interviews and advice on mechanical, electrical, and chemical engineering, business law and salesmanship, chemistry, insurance, architecture and banking.
- Kalispell, Mont. All high school boys being given training in local concerns were guests of our club along with their employers.
- Lake View, Chicago. Fifty young men were given interviews and conferences and there were conducted tours through large institutions and industrial plants in Chicago. Conducted a find yourself campaign.
- Latrobe, Pa. Arranged for 100 students to receive personal interviews.
- Little Rock, Ark. There were lectures, group conferences and personal interviews for those interested in law, medicine, engineering, insurance, banking, advertising and nursing.
- Long Beach, Calif. Thirty-two Kiwanians and twenty-two other business and professional men conducted interviews for approximately 200 high school students.
- Los Angeles, Calif. The Vocational Guidance Committee prepared a comprehensive vocational plan in one of the high schools during the summer session. The committee later brought its proposed plan before the board of education for study, adoption and execution. A 500 word essay contest on "What Kind of a Man I Hope to Become" or "What I Most Admire in a Man" was held at the McKinley Home where vocational guidance is part of the club's program.
- Lumberton, N. C. The 4-H clubs are a means of getting a vocational guidance program to rural boys and girls.
- Madison, Wis. Sixty people are acting as counselors to high school boys and girls.
- Mangum, Okla. The club works with the warden of the state reformatory. Letters are written to Kiwanis clubs in the home cities of those boys released from the institution. In this way the youths may find work and again secure their rightful places in society.
- Marion, Ohio. Vocational guidance is available to all youths in our city.

VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE—Cont.

- Milwaukee, Wis.** Thirteen speakers were assigned to various schools to speak on their particular vocations.
- Mt. Vernon, N. Y.** The Y. M. C. A. and the Y. M. H. A. and the city boys' club are co-operating in our vocational program. A pamphlet of particular local interest is being distributed to all boys in the local schools. Vocational questionnaires are used in our work.
- New York, N. Y.** After a radio talk requests for our vocational guidance bulletin were received from clubs and individuals from Massachusetts to as far west as Seattle, Washington. A bulletin on "Aviation as a Career" was issued early in 1930.
- North Side, Cincinnati, Ohio.** Furnished all worthy boys and girls with employment through co-operation and help of local industrial plants and business houses.
- Ocala, Fla.** An attempt was made to have a vocational course in the curricula of all city and rural high schools of the county.
- Oceanside, Calif.** Conducted a free employment bureau and began aptitude tests for vocational training among young people.
- Orland, Calif.** The student receiving each year the highest record in vocational training is to have his name engraved upon a permanent scholarship cup. Members made vocational talks at the high school.
- Palmdale, Calif.** A group of boys was taken on a vocational trade school visit.
- Parsons, Kan.** Kiwanians gave talks on their businesses and professions, and later we entertained all senior boys at a dinner and had a vocational guidance conference.
- Prescott, Ariz.** Arranged for a series of 12 talks for senior high school pupils.
- Reading, Pa.** The club has started a course in vocational guidance for all senior high school boys and girls.
- Rock Island, Ill.** Some 2,500 persons heard a vocational expert. The Committee on Vocational Guidance invited youths to the noonday meetings where they could hear addresses that might help them choose their life professions.
- San Diego, Calif.** Information on all the occupations represented in our club has been placed on file in the various schools. This helps in arranging personal interviews among the boys and girls of our city.
- Sheffield, Ala.** Questionnaires for vocational likes and dislikes and personal interviews assisted many young people in selecting vocations.
- Washington, D. C.** Radio talks on vocational guidance, personal interviews and individual assistance, and high school lectures was the work of our club in 1930.
- Wisconsin Rapids, Wis.** Organized a junior placement bureau, spoke on vocational guidance in the rural district schools, and gave general vocational help to students.

EDUCATIONAL WORK

Many activities were undertaken by Kiwanis clubs during the past twelve months. Educational assistance was given students as well as the schools, faculties and authorities.

Aberdeen, N. C. Directors of our educational foundation have made loans to boys and girls who desire college training.

Alton, Ill. One thousand youths were taken on an historical pilgrimage to Springfield, Ill. Gave a motion picture film of Alton which cost \$3,600.00 to the public schools.

Ambler, Pa. Entertained 38 graduates and the high school faculty. Each graduate was given a gift.

Americus, Ga. The club co-operates with all other agencies in the state to fight illiteracy. Three boys are being given financial aid to continue their college work and assisted the home demonstration council, which aids college girls.

Amory, Miss. Sponsored a Hi-Y convention of the North Mississippi district.

Anderson, Ind. Awarded honor medals to high school graduates and inspected the buildings and plans for enlarging the university campus at a cost of \$300,000.00.

Antigo, Wis. The club had a special program during book week with a librarian as speaker.

Arkansas City, Kan. Sponsored an open air school and held a special meeting to enlist everyone's assistance in a back to school movement in September.

Assiniboia, Sask. Entertained the district school trustees and donated a trophy cup in a competitive contest.

Atlantic City, N. J. As an annual custom, the graduating class of the Atlantic City high school was entertained at a special luncheon. In a Kiwanis essay contest three students were awarded prizes. One boy was helped financially to continue his work at Harvard.

Bainbridge, Ga. Over 1,000 people are attending night schools. This is part of our campaign against illiteracy.

Battle Creek, Mich. Our eleventh annual teachers' party was held in October. We sponsored a Chautauqua and gave a party to all sophomores of the high school during which time we attempted to show them the value of continued education.

- Belmont, N. C. Established an educational fund for all under-privileged high school boys and girls.
- Benton Harbor, Mich. Our educational fund is over \$1,600.00. Six Kiwanis keys were presented to high school honor students.
- Big Stone Gap, Va. Kiwanians are asking for the establishment of industrial schools in Virginia in place of increased appropriation for institutions of higher learning. The teaching staff of the public school was entertained and prizes were awarded for musical endeavors.
- Blairsville, Pa. To acquaint ourselves with the affairs of the school board, one meeting was attended by all the officials and principals of the schools.
- Bloomington, Ind. A special school for backward children receives financial support from the club.
- Bremerton, Wash. An arrangement was made for a physician to speak to the mothers on the necessity of mental hygiene for boys and girls.
- Burlington, Iowa. An art exhibit was sponsored by the club.
- Carbon Hill, Ala. An opportunity school was opened in a rural district and prizes were given those having perfect attendance records.
- Charleston, W. Va. A permanent art exhibit has been started with the hope that this will eventually lead to the opening of an art museum. Prizes were awarded all honor students.
- Chattanooga, Tenn. We assisted in working out plans for night schools for adult illiterates.
- Cheyenne, Wyo. A woman's club was assisted in organizing a little theater group. An endowment fund is being used to assist students through college.
- Claremont, Calif. Brought citizens to the polls during a school board election and a cup was purchased to be used in a combined contest for scholarship, sportsmanship and proficiency in athletics.
- Clermont, Fla. A forum for one night each week during the winter months with speakers from various colleges was the plan of our club.
- Cocoa, Fla. Assisted in high school vocational work, entertained the faculty and graduating class of the high school and aided the Parent-Teachers' Association in their school plans.
- Columbia, Miss. A special appropriation was asked by a committee that went before the state legislature. This was for our industrial school.

- St. Johns, P. Q. Kiwanis gives \$500.00 annually to the school board and awards prizes for the best pupils in French and English.
- St. Lawrence, Montreal, P. Q. A manual training room has been established and the club purchased 12 complete sets of tools and benches for the young people.
- St. Louis, Mo. Assisted in an educational tour for 800 boys and girls from two counties who made a trip to this city.
- St. Petersburg, Fla. A committee was appointed to co-operate with the school board in investigating all school finances. An attempt is being made to secure a new high school and all teachers of the city were entertained.
- Salem, Va. The club is working to secure a new high school. Entertained all local school teachers.
- Salem, W. Va. A crippled youth is having educational advantages due to club help. The Salem College faculty was present at one of our meetings.
- San Fernando, Calif. Due to some prevailing problems in our schools a special committee of three was appointed to consider these conditions and later present to the school board community methods to correct them. All members contributed to a memorial fund for the education of a deceased policeman's family.
- Sanger, Calif. Sponsored oratorical and spelling contests and an educational fund is being established for Sally Ann, two and one-half years old, whose father was killed.

- Sioux City, Iowa.** The annual teachers' party was attended by 1,200. Awarded \$25.00 in prizes to high school pupils and had a commencement program meeting for the graduating classes of the public schools and colleges.
- Southeast Cleveland, Ohio.** The main objective for 1930 was to relieve the over-crowded conditions in the south senior high school.
- Spokane, Wash.** Our educational endowment fund of \$1,220.55 has been of tremendous value to our young people. Arrangements were made with a business college to secure one-half tuition rates for sons and daughters of our pensioned mothers. Several children are now at school and are to receive financial and other help from the club.
- Strathmoor, Detroit, Mich.** Established a fund to furnish bus transportation for children living a long way from a school.
- Temple, Tex.** The club is sponsoring a junior college and gave a watch to the student with the best scholastic record. A trophy cup has been purchased for the junior college as a permanent record for the student achieving the best results during each college year.
- Trenton, N. J.** A contribution of \$200.00 was given to a group of boys and girls from Caney Creek community center of Kentucky. A scholarship was also established in the name of our club for this educational enterprise.
- Vidalia, Ga.** A night school was started and Kiwanians brought farmers and others to the evening classes. A separate school was conducted for negroes. This work was done by the club in the interest of the illiteracy eradication campaign. Entertained the graduating high school class and the faculty.
- Warrenton, N. C.** A physical director for the high school was secured and all teachers were entertained.
- Waycross, Ga.** The chamber of commerce was given assistance in planning the entertainment for a state educational convention. A contribution was made to an illiteracy school for adults. Assistance was given for a Chautauqua and school authorities were entertained at one of our meetings.
- West Point, Va.** One young man is being given help so he can continue his work at Randolph Macon College. Faculty members and educational authorities were guests at our meeting.
- Winder, Ga.** With the help of the Rosenwald Foundation the land is being procured and funds subscribed for a new school building for colored people. Kiwanians visited the consolidated county schools and later entertained members of the senior high school class.
- Winnipeg, Man.** Secured a grant from the dominion government that enabled one boy and two girls to attend the University of Manitoba. Fees were advanced to four girls for business college courses.
- Winston-Salem, N. C.** A young lady, helped through grammar school and high school, has now been sent to a woman's college. Helped to form the South-Eastern Art Association and assisted the art department of the public schools, giving prizes for poster contest work.
- Wisconsin Rapids, Wis.** At a nominal cost 1,600 rural school teachers and normal school graduates were able to visit in Washington, D. C.
- Woodlake, Calif.** A new lighting system for the entire high school grounds was the work of the club.
- Woodlawn, Chicago.** A loan fund of \$1,500.00 is in operation at the University of Chicago. Fourteen students are now taking advantage of this fund. Twenty members visited all the schools during Boys' Week.

AID TO BUSINESS AND INDUSTRY

Many civic improvements, aimed to better the general conditions in business and industry, were accomplished during 1930. They are classified here as improvements of a general nature, fairs, and expositions, new markets, new industries and new hotels.

Improvements of a General Nature

- Albany, Ore.** Assisted the United States government in taking the 1930 census.
- Alva, Okla.** Co-operated with the W. C. T. U. for their annual state convention.
- Asheville, N. C.** At the request of government officials a committee on publicity held a special display of 20 manufactured articles and agricultural products grown within a short radius of Asheville. The club assisted in establishing a tobacco market and warehouse which should increase the income of the county from \$1,000,000.00 to \$3,000,000.00 a year.
- Atlanta, Ga.** A concerted effort was made to encourage further use of Georgia products.
- Ballard, Seattle, Wash.** Our club assisted in a city-wide drive for funds for the good-will industries building program.
- Barrie, Ont.** With \$1,000.00 received from a street carnival started a fund for the erection of new buildings to house the exhibits for the fall county fair.
- Bassett, Va.** The club invited all the merchants to a meeting to discuss the business depression and ways and means of combatting the community slump.
- Bellingham, Wash.** Some 30,000 descriptive pamphlets were distributed in the interest of our city. A survey was made to encourage smaller industries to settle here.
- Boonville, N. Y.** Raised \$500.00 so that the main highway, which is a trade artery, could be kept open during the winter months.
- Boscobel, Wis.** Planned for the establishment of a credit bureau.
- Braman, Okla.** Promoted a sales association to help business conditions.
- Burlington, N. J.** After five years of securing franchises and permits from the War Department, a bridge is being constructed across the Delaware River, connecting this city and Bristol. The bridge will be open for traffic by May, 1931.
- Cairo, Ill.** The club continues its plan of visiting all the industries in the city.
- Cambridge City, Ind.** Fought for lower power rates and hope to establish satisfactory results before a hearing of the public service commission.
- Chattanooga, Tenn.** Assisted in public work for the Tennessee river division of the Mississippi Valley River Improvement Association. Held Kiwanis Day at the inter-state fair.
- Chippewa Falls, Wis.** In the interest of our business and industries one man was sent on a good will tour throughout the United States.
- Cincinnati, Ohio.** Distributed 12,000 prosperity seals to revive confidence and increase employment.
- Clarion, Pa.** An industrial survey was made of the city and an advertising and publicity program was conducted over a local radio station.
- Clatskanie, Ore.** The entire club worked to secure a new bridge, a factory site, an irrigation project for new settlers, and placed a community development story in a state business magazine.
- Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.** With the chamber of commerce promoted advertising and educational campaigns to have more use made of locally manufactured goods and grown products.
- Colorado Springs, Colo.** Sent a good-will tour party to the Kansas oil fields.
- Covington, Ky.** Endorsed the formation of a citizen's free employment bureau.

- Darlington, S. C. The club served at its luncheons only South Carolina grown foods and suggested a resolution that other clubs in the state do the same thing.

- Douglas, Wyo. Took an active part in the Wyoming state fair. Organized 120 beet growers for a visit to a sugar factory and raised the necessary funds for advertising the county in a stockman's magazine.
- Eagle Rock, Calif. The committee on Public Affairs has interested all of the organizations in town in launching a five to ten-year development program.
- East Suburbs, Kansas City, Mo. The club endorsed the movement of President Hoover, who ordered a thorough investigation of the existing bankruptcy law.
- Elgin, Tex. Held monthly trade days during which time we had street dances, old fiddlers' contests, and cash prizes for visitors.
- Filer, Idaho. A committee was appointed to inspect all the public market roads leading to the city.
- Forest City, Pa. Called a general meeting to discuss the labor situation and to attempt to prevent an untimely strike. Through the influence of the club, a local mine agreed to keep open for three days a week. Mine owners co-operated with merchants in warning miners not to strike.
- Fort Collins, Colo. Sent out 2,000 folders advertising the city in the west and middle west. Secured an agreement from contractors to use local men and trucks.
- Franklin, Tenn. Contracts were received so that a crushed limestone plant could commence operation. Kiwanians encouraged the development of a new subdivision.
- Galt, Ont. The club holds one meeting a month with the board of trade for the purpose of discussing projects that will build up general business in the community.
- Gettysburg, S. D. The Committee on Publicity developed a pamphlet describing industries and places of interest in this territory.
- Girard, Ohio. Sent two members to the St. Louis Waterways convention and to a waterways conference in Washington, D. C. Investigated prospective industries and tried to secure the general offices of a steel company for this district.

- Gresham, Ore. The Committee on Business Standards sponsored and handled a buy-at-home week.
- Hartwell, Ga. Helped to establish a building and loan association and invited new industries and settlers to the county.
- Henderson, N. C. Organized a live-at-home program. Placed on display 35 articles manufactured in our county.
- Hogansville, Ga. As a result of the work of the Committee on Public Affairs a citizen's bank was opened. Obtained better mail facilities. Interested individuals in a peach preserving plant and other industries.
- Horton, Kan. Arranged for a meeting of officials and local business men to discuss the shut-down of the railroad shops.
- Jesup, Ga. Assisted in securing members for a state commission to work on a canal project which would greatly improve shipping facilities. A special committee was appointed to collect data for compiling a history of Wayne county.
- Kissimmee, Fla. Secured suitable wheat for a mill which was in need of the grain for its special products and assisted in a Know-Florida-Oranges week.
- Lake Wales, Fla. Circulated 100 certified \$10.00 checks in an effort to clear citizens of old debts. Roger W. Babson presented the Babson cup to the organization accomplishing the most under the rules for this campaign.

- Las Vegas, N. M.** Our 1930 objective was a better window display campaign.
- Louisburg, N. C.** Paid \$500.00 for an industrial survey of two counties and pledged support to promoters of new enterprises.
- Lowville, N. Y.** Plans were made to form a merchant's credit association and held Saturday matinee horse races to bring people to town.
- Manitou Springs, Colo.** Plans for 1930 were to advertise the Pike's Peak region.
- Marion, Kan.** A committee was appointed to pass on all advertising submitted to local merchants and to determine its value or reject it. A survey was made of the industries, employees, and payrolls so that an extension program would be developed.
- Marion, Ky.** Conducted a butter survey in local stores to determine the amounts of butter and substitutes being consumed.
- Marysville, Ohio.** As a direct result of our work the state highway commission will construct a \$60,000.00 concrete bridge.
- Miami, Fla.** A movement is under way to establish a permanent Pan-American exposition. The club assists in developing the summer tourist business and advertising Miami throughout the world.
- Monett, Mo.** In the interest of stimulating business conducted a treasure hunt with all merchants giving prizes and the public was invited free. Each merchant had a window display with his prize being centered as the main attraction. The club secured several conventions for the city.
- Mt. Gilead, Ohio.** A buy it in Mt. Gilead campaign was under way for three months.
- Muskegon, Mich.** This city had the distinction of starting the bust the buyers strike movement, which later found favor in a great many cities in the United States and Canada.
- New Orleans, La.** An exhibition of New Orleans manufactured products was made possible by the co-operation of our entire membership.
- Norfolk, Va.** The club was concerned with giving colored people greater opportunity in vocational industry and made a good-will trip, sending 75 members to the eastern shore of Virginia.
- Northern Cambria County, Pa.** Worked for an adjustment of freight rates on coal sent from this district.
- Norwalk, Ohio.** Celebrated the 100th anniversary of the Norwalk Reflector-Herald. One feature was the displaying of antiques in all store windows. One of the city's oldest residences was furnished with furniture of many years ago. Visitors came from all parts of the United States and the Kiwanis club rooms were opened to all guests during the three-day celebration.
- Oakland City, Ind.** Sponsored a monthly auction sale.
- Orleans, Ind.** Made it possible for a motion picture show to be reopened.
- Perry, Fla.** Urged the county commissioners to pave the road leading to one of our beaches and the club brought the sponge industry to this county. Considering the possibility of deepening of a river as soon as the war department has been given general information.
- Pikeville, Ky.** A government order was effective to have a survey made of Big Sandy river, for establishing locks and dams, which would mean the saving of several millions of dollars to our coal operators. During the business depression conducted an opportunity program.
- Pine Bluff, Ark.** Appointed a committee to help reorganize two closed banks.
- Portland, Ore.** Working for a public market on the waterfront. Assisted with the unemployment problem. Co-operated in a made-in-Oregon program and had over 2,000 present to hear plans of advertising Oregon throughout the United States. The club president attended a business confidence meeting at Salem. Endorsed the Columbia Valley Association.

- Tarentum, Pa.** Brought business men together to hear an expert economist talk on retailing and advertising.

- Alameda, Calif.** Over 2,000 children and 5,000 spectators enjoyed our Hallowe'en parade. We observed Boys' Week, taking 75 youths to an airport and tractor company.
- Albany Park, Chicago.** Visited every school in the neighborhood during Boys' Week.
- Aledo, Ill.** Sponsored a physical development contest among all the boys of our community.
- Altoona, Pa.** A summer camp was conducted for eight weeks for 40 boys. Made a complete survey for under-developed and under-nourished boys of the community.
- Amsterdam, N. Y.** Our annual Hallowe'en parade and party means a great deal of work for Kiwanians and the police, but over 4,000 children and 12,000 spectators had a great time. Over 130 prizes were awarded.
- Astoria, Ore.** Held a hobby show, with 50 exhibits, in a vacant store building. Paid the expenses of four boys to a summer camp, and had 175 at a "Little Brothers'" picnic.
- Atchison, Kan.** Contributed prizes for a boys' aviation club and a manual training exhibit.
- Barberton, Ohio.** Several boys needing assistance and personal supervision were given special attention.
- Batavia, Ill.** Disturbances were practically eliminated on Hallowe'en when over 200 children in costume took part in our parade. There was an immense bonfire, and the Legion drum corps and high school band furnished the music.
- Beaumont, Tex.** Sent the president of our Boys' Friendship Club to a state meeting, and took 125 boys to a camp 100 miles away. A Father and Sons' Day was a great success, and 250 children participated in our Hallowe'en party.
- Belleville, Ont.** A hockey league was organized for boys of the teen age. Our annual Kiwanis carnival was attended by over 10,000 people, and the club received \$2,100.00 for boys' work. Cabins, costing \$400.00, which accommodate 60 boys, were built at a nearby lake. A luncheon and a theatre party were given 60 newsboys.

- Bisbee, Ariz. The club sponsors a school paper. Purchased 500 baby chicks for an industrial school.
- Bloomfield, N. J. Installed a hot water boiler in the community house.
- Brawley, Calif. A program of athletic sports was developed to keep idle boys off the streets at night.
- Brookline, Mass. A juvenile delinquent was sent to a specially supervised camp and other under-privileged youths were also sent to camp. The club has a proposed \$2,000.00 budget for 1931 work.
- Brownsville, Pa. The club sponsored a boys' hobby and achievement fair, which is an annual event.
- Chattanooga, Tenn. A boys' council, which is made up of members of civic clubs, organizes meetings and events for the youths of the city. One county institution, for children without homes, was given help and the youths had special attention by Kiwanians and their wives.
- Cincinnati, Ohio. Observed Boys' Week and purchased furniture, machinery and tools for the St. Edmunds Home for Boys. A contribution of \$100.00 was also made toward paying board for boys, whose parents were unemployed.
- Clarksburg, W. Va. Organized a model airplane club, and held a meeting so that boys could try out their new planes.
- Covington, Ga. Seventeen boys, whose homes were in foreign countries, were guests of the club, and one boy was sent to a summer camp.
- Dallas, Tex. Built a camp for newsboys, and had the 13th annual Thanksgiving dinner for about 200 of these boys.
- Dover, N. J. The seventh annual father and son community dinner was attended by 350. Four boys were sent to a Y.M.C.A. camp, and 115 were taken to New York to see a baseball game.
- Doylestown, Pa. Assisted one youth to enter a trade school, and sponsored the annual county hobby show.
- East Orange, N. J. Over 1,000 exhibits were displayed at the boys' hobby show, and 25 boys were sent to a camp.
- El Paso, Tex. Forty-five boys were sent to Mountain Park summer camp.
- Escanaba, Mich. Sent two boys and an adult leader to an older boys' conference.
- Fort Smith, Ark. Over 500 boys are in our boys' club, which was organized three years ago.
- Gary, Ind. Sponsored the second annual model airplane meet and sent two winners to a national contest in Detroit.
- Hackensack, N. J. A financial contribution was made to a boys' club, and a pet show was held for children under 16 years of age. Youths were also sent to summer camps.
- Hamilton, Ont. Our eighth annual boys' camp was opened in July, and three members visit Ki-Y boys each week.
- Houston, Tex. The Boys' Work Committee has been divided into sub-committees on health, Knot-Hole Gang, North-Side club, vocational guidance, case work, and employment and recreation. It is the aim of these committees to do personal service among all the boys in the city. The Knot-Hole Gang, which is composed of boys who attend baseball games, has a membership of over 12,000. The club organized baseball and basketball leagues, took vocational students on industrial tours, had leadership programs for the boys' club, and special father and son, Armistice Day and Thanksgiving Day programs. Babe Ruth was present at our Knot-Hole Gang party.
- Jacksonville, Fla. The juvenile court funds are not available for welfare appropriations, so the club turned over a fund for work among under-privileged boys.
- Kitchener-Waterloo, Ont. Four new cottages were built at Paradise Lake, and all other buildings were repainted, rescreened, and improved. The Knights of Columbus donated a flag and a flag-pole for this camp, which entertained 200 boys during July.

- Lake View, Chicago.** Eight schools, the Boy Scout troops, and the Y.M.C.A. entered 287 exhibits in our handicraft show. Forty prizes were awarded and 3,500 people attended the event. The club had a Hallowe'en party with 1,500 children in attendance, and held an ice carnival. Fourteen teams of three men each visited schools during Boys' Week.
- Lindsay, Ont.** The club has several boys in the Bowmanville school, where one won the superintendent medal for being the best all-around youth, and another won first place in an oratorical contest.
- Madison, N. J.** A settlement home is being utilized for our boys' club. The chief objective for 1931 is to find all the boys in the community not affiliated with any organization and to give them personal service.
- Manhattan, Kan.** The boy under the greatest handicap but making the best school grades is selected to receive all the privileges of the Kiwanis club. He attends every meeting, gains the benefit of an association with business men, and secures personal service.
- Montgomery, Ala.** Gave 110 newsboys a week-end outing.
- Montreal, P. Q.** Donated \$1,100.00 to a boys' farm and training school. Four Scotch lads and their master were met at the boat and taken to the homes of four Kiwanians, who gave the lads a glimpse of Canadian home-life and hospitality. A picnic and field day was enjoyed by a group of boys, to whom 24 sweaters were presented.
- Nashville, Tenn.** Sent five boys to a Hi-Y conference, and dedicated a Kiwanis boys' lodge, which accommodates 50 and cost about \$900.00. The club has secured a boys' secretary, who conducts Scout meetings and vocational training courses.
- Norristown, Pa.** One hundred boys have memberships in the Y. M. C. A., and they were later sent to a summer camp. The club took part in Boys' Week.
- Orange-West Orange, N. J.** A boys' and girls' hobby show attracted 1,000 exhibits, and 25 children were given vacations at a camp.
- Oshawa, Ont.** All citizens attended an inspection meeting of our new boys' camp, which is located on seven acres, five miles north of the city. A sea cadet corps, under the Navy League of Canada, has an enrollment of 50 boys during the winter.
- Ottawa, Ont.** The club has a \$2,000.00 budget for its boys' work. Camp vacations, airplane classes, and general welfare work are in the program for service to boys.
- Paterson, N. J.** All the newsboys have Saturday night group meetings and dinners each week. One-hundred boys took advantage of our boys' work program at the Market Street Church. Over \$1,000.00 was spent on this activity.
- Petoskey, Mich.** Over \$3,000.00 has been spent on camp improvements, and the club now has the most modern boys' camp in this section of the United States.
- Ravenswood, Chicago.** Our fourth annual handicraft exhibit and Hallowe'en party attracted all the school children in this metropolitan area.
- Rome, N. Y.** A 54-acre plot of ground, nine miles from the city, was purchased for a boys' recreation camp. Over 1,000 youths were entertained at the camp during the summer.
- San Fernando, Calif.** Provided scholarships for the McKinley home, where the club also secured entrance for a nine-year-old boy.
- Scranton, Pa.** The boys from the seventh and eighth grades and the high schools were given examinations during Boys' Week, to judge their scholarship, character, and general fitness. The 15 boys receiving the highest ratings were selected to fill all the city offices for one hour on May 1. Two hundred boys were accommodated at our camp, which was conducted for three weeks. Only boys are taken who are unable to attend any other camp.
- Springfield, Mo.** After the club intervened, a competent teacher was engaged for the County Industrial Home for boys. Our annual Lads' and Dads' Day was attended by 155 men and boys.

Sydney, N. S. Twelve members attended a ten-day course for the study of present-day youth and his needs.

Toronto, Ont. The boys' club had an attendance of 2,346, and 65 classes were organized in boxing, hockey, gymnasium, harmonica band, swimming, basketry, leather work, printing, and woodwork. Held a hobby show, a picnic, and 186 went to a summer camp. A delegation was successful in having the city spend \$6,200.00 for improvements on the boys' club building. A campaign for honorary membership in the boys' club netted approximately \$8,000.00. The club held its annual frolic night at a theater, and His Worship the Mayor drew 53 lucky numbers for prizes donated by individual members, and these included an automobile, a radio and a diamond ring.

Van Nuys, Calif. One member donated 24 volumes of boys' books to the McKinley Home.

Winnipeg, Man. Appropriated \$1,200.00 for our work among the foreign-born under-privileged boys.

- Amory, Miss. Directed a district conference for the Hi-Y.
- Ann Arbor, Mich. A number of boys, some from the probate court, are being given personal attention and help, and the club is making Big Brother work its major objective for 1931.
- Auburn, N. Y. Eighteen boys are being given personal service through our Big Brother work.
- Bellingham, Wash. The club has become interested in the Big Brother movement and a key club has been organized in the high school. One boy attends our weekly meetings.
- Big Stone Gap, Va. Forty-three boys from the county attended our older boys' conference. The club furnished meals and lodging for the group.
- Birmingham, Ala. A group of boys got together two years ago are now showing improvement in their school work, jobs, dress, deportment, and ideas of life.
- Boise, Idaho. A contact has been built up so that all boys from the juvenile court are given particular help, advice and assistance. More than 40 boys had Kiwanis contacts during 1930.
- Braman, Okla. The buddy plan is available for all school boys.
- Brooklyn, Cleveland, Ohio. Fifty wayward boys are being given help in our Big Brother work.
- Burbank, Calif. Sponsored a key club at the high school. Assisted all boys in the McKinley Home and we give financial aid to this institution.
- Burlington, Iowa. Paid the expenses for one boy as a delegate to a Y. M. C. A. conference.
- Chester, Pa. The Big Brother committee purchased part of an airplane for a group of worthy boys interested in aeronautics. Two thousand boys were taken to see a ball game in Philadelphia.
- Crescent City, Calif. A key club was organized in the high school.
- Durham, N. C. After a recommendation by the club, all members became active in Big Brother work, giving personal counsel and support to worthy boys in this vicinity.

- Hagerstown, Md. One responsible child has been assigned to each of our members who give personal service to these boys and girls.
- Harrisonville, Mo. Two boys were sent to a citizens' military training camp. Another in trouble was given personal help and members are Big Brothers to all other boys who need counsel.
- Hastings, Neb. A group of Hi-Y boys were gathered together for a discussion of the relationship between their Kiwanis dads and themselves.
- Hermosa Beach, Calif. One boy is supported at the McKinley Industrial Home.
- Hollywood, Calif. For four years the club has kept two boys in the McKinley Industrial Home. Nine were sent to a summer camp.

The club has devoted time to having the court establish an observation home in connection with its major work.
- Los Angeles, Calif. Inspirational talks are given to boys in the McKinley Home during our regular monthly visits. Entertainment programs, physical examinations, birthday parties, and other programs are available for the 250 boys in this institution.
- Lynn, Mass. Prizes were distributed to boys showing the best results in manual training, drawing, and other work at the boys' club. A cabin was constructed in 1930 at a local camp.
- Macomb, Ill. Fifty boys of the city whose families are not financially able to give their children the best advantages were brought to the club and each member was assigned to see that his boy was given attention, taken to amusements, earned money and had a savings account. All members and their Little Brothers attended a circus.
- Madisonville, Ky. A boys' junior club with 25 members, meeting weekly, has been organized.

- Mason City, Iowa.** Worked in co-operation with Y. M. C. A. for general juvenile activities. Sixty-five boys have been purchased memberships and personal supervision is given to all of them. The fourth annual hobby show, with 117 boys, displayed 478 exhibits and was a great success. The best articles were also exhibited at the Nebraska-Iowa District Convention in Waterloo. We observed father and son week.
- Memphis, Tenn.** There are 30 boys in our Little Kiwanis Club who have been given Y. M. C. A. memberships. These boys meet once each week for an evening meal and conduct their own meeting with a Kiwanian or some other speaker giving a talk. Twenty-seven under-privileged boys were taken on an educational tour of Tennessee and Kentucky. They traveled 1,500 miles and were entertained by 11 Kiwanis clubs. These children are given medical attention.
- New Kensington, Pa.** Our club is engaged in all phases of Tiny Tim activities.
- New Westminster, B. C.** A new group of boys, in addition to our Ki-Y organization, was formed in 1930. These groups meet each week under competent leaders at the Y. M. C. A.
- Northampton, Mass.** Members are taking part in our Big Brother movement and are giving personal service counsel and advice to needy boys in the community.
- North Hollywood, Calif.** The club participated in Hi-Y councils. Youths were sent to a summer camp.
- Oakland, Calif.** A key club is at work in the high school. Materials and manual training supplies were purchased for boys at an institutional home.
- Oil City, Pa.** A city survey was made to find new boys eligible as Little Brothers. Twenty were given personal service in 1930.
- Oshkosh, Wis.** All under-privileged boys were given jobs, such as cleaning up yards, taking off window screens, and working at other odd tasks.
- Portsmouth, N. H.** A buddy club was organized with each man adopting a buddy and giving him the necessary instruction.
- Prince Albert, Sask.** Kiwanians were appointed to give attention to all idle boys and to make sure that they attended school.
- Richmond, Va.** The 1930 annual father and son night was the most interesting and enthusiastic meeting the club has ever held. Over \$450.00 were spent in boys' work during the year.
- Riverdale, Toronto, Ont.** Regular meetings were held by the newly organized Senior Kiwanis Boys' Council. Kiwanians befriended 50 youths, who were given leadership training, which aids these boys in public speaking, appearance and conduct. Presented a three-year scholarship and entertained 33 boys at the Canadian National Exhibition.
- Roanoke Rapids-Rosemary, N. C.** Eight Kiwanians are doing Big Brother work for needy boys in the local schools.
- St. Louis, Mo.** Forty of our members continued to do Big Brother work which has now gone into its sixth year. A summer camp accommodated 135 under-privileged boys and \$450.00 was spent for baseball and athletic equipment for a neighborhood house. Financial help was also given to a boys' band so it could buy instruments.
- Salinas, Calif.** Twenty-six boys of the high school and junior college are organized into a key club.
- Savannah, Ga.** Memberships were secured for 25 boys in the Y. M. C. A.
- Seattle, Wash.** Twelve Kiwanians are giving personal service in a Big Brother program and 160 boys from the Salvation Army are provided with entertainment.
- Spokane, Wash.** Clothing, shoes camp vacations and help are given to our 45 Little Brothers who are under the direct supervision of individual Kiwanians.

Investigation is made of the families of these children and assistance is given, such as providing clothing and food, finding employment, financial aid for educational pursuits and summer camp vacations. A Big Brother conference was held and Kiwanians have organized a Little Brothers' club for all youths who are over 16 years of age and are at work. This group has its own officers and holds fortnightly meetings with a program for self-improvement. A musical comedy running for a week gave us gross receipts of over \$15,000.00.

Vandergrift, Pa. A Tiny Tim club has a social and welfare program that is attracting much interest.

West Palm Beach, Fla. About 98 per cent of our membership has been assigned for personal service work among the youths of the city. Over 200 contact visits have been made by members. A picnic for 75 boys was a great occasion.

Whittier, Calif. Two boys have been placed in the McKinley Home in Los Angeles.

Wilmington, N. C. Five hundred boys are taking advantage of our Boys' Brigade club. A thrift bank was sponsored and in a month there were 31 boys who had made deposits with a total of \$61.00 in the bank. A \$7,500.00 budget is in operation for our work. A pet and hobby fair for the boys' club had over 500 odd exhibits with approximately 2,000 visitors attending the three-day show.

Juvenile Work and Probate Court Cooperation

- Algona, Iowa. A boy was paroled from the reformatory and the club has pledged itself to provide him with work and care for his responsibility. The club has a varied child welfare program and we held a father and sons' meeting.
- Beatrice, Neb. Seven boys brought before the juvenile court have been paroled for a probationary period.
- Brandon, Man. One form of personal service is to attend the juvenile court sessions and investigate all cases of delinquents.
- Clarksville, Tenn. Kiwanians decided to organize a club composed of entirely delinquent boys for the purpose of bettering their moral and physical conditions and to get them back on the road to correct and useful living.
- Columbia, Tenn. The ward of our club was paroled to us by the judge of the federal court. He is making an excellent school record.
- Franklin, Pa. One boy paroled is under the care of a Kiwanian.
- Jamestown, N. Y. The club furnished the juvenile court several men to serve as probationary officers.
- Joliet, Ill. We have under our supervision a 15-year-old boy who was in an institution, who was later released and then sentenced for a second term.
- Leesburg, Fla. The club assisted two ministers in having several delinquent boys placed on probation.
- Lockland, Ohio. We have continued our work with a pre-delinquent gang of boys and excellent progress was reported by school and village authorities. A leader was engaged for this group and frequent donations are made to a boys' home.
- Miami, Fla. Organized a class of 40 boys to teach them ideas of good citizenship. These problem boys are also taken to the Y. M. C. A. and given other forms of entertainment.

- Aiken, S. C.** A total attendance of 5,961 boys and girls took advantage of our swimming pool. They were taught swimming, diving and life-saving.
- Anacortes, Wash.** A committee has been appointed to have government owned land on islands reserved for public parks, air-fields, and picnic groves.
- Anderson, Ind.** Our annual Easter egg hunt was attended by 2,000 children. One-hundred business men contributed the prizes and the boys of the school safety patrols served as guides and policed the reservations in which the eggs were hidden.
- Assiniboia, Sask.** Erected a wading pool at a cost of \$1,500.00.
- Beaver Dam, Wis.** Incorporated at \$2,500.00 a stock company with shares selling at \$10.00 each to develop a swimming beach and recreation project. A small lake was drained and a steam shovel engaged for dredging the bottom, and early in 1931 the Crystal Lake Recreation Co., will open its swimming beach. Installed flood lights for skating and hockey playing.
- Berea, Ohio.** A playground with a supervisor is provided for boys of the community during the summer vacation.
- Big Spring, Tex.** Built a concrete wading pool and purchased playground equipment.
- Casper, Wyo.** Held a meeting with the mayor and city council to get all vacant lots used for playgrounds.
- Cleveland Heights, Ohio.** The club sponsored a tax levy for recreational activities.
- Crawfordsville, Ind.** Opened a public golf course, developed a summer program for supervised playgrounds, directed a roller-skating carnival for school children and voted to pay the deficit incurred by playground activities.

- Clermont, Fla. Eight miles of highway were planted with palms and silk oaks. Boys in the community joined in the work.
- Cobalt, Ont. Provided a large number of maple and birch trees for citizens of our town.
- East Chicago, Ind. Arranged a clean-up week, a public tree planting campaign and a spring and fall flower show.
- Elkin, N. C. People purchased over \$100.00 worth of flower seeds for a program of highway beautification between this city and Roaring Gap.
- Frankfort, N. Y. Sponsored a competitive floral exhibit and made an appropriation for a Mohawk Valley floral parade.
- Fryeburg-Lovell, Me. Accepted 4,000 young trees for town forests of Fryeburg and Lovell.
- Fullerton, Calif. Our local objectives are to secure playgrounds and parkways along the streets. Committees are working with the city council to receive proper ordinances.

- Gallup, N. M.** Secured a 50-year lease on 100 acres of white pine timber. This will make a suitable camp and park site.
- Gastonia, N. C.** Offered prizes in a better gardens campaign and also awards for the best essays on gardening.
- Greensburg, Pa.** Promoted the use of waste lands for gardens, and have started a movement to beautify all highways entering Greensburg.
- Greenwood, Miss.** Contributed funds to purchase flowers and shrubs for all our streets and playgrounds.
- Gresham, Ore.** All Kiwanians and many citizens gave an entire day to developing a fine tract of land into a city park.
- Hinton, Okla.** A deep canyon was leased by the club and made into a picnic grounds. This is known as Kiwanis Canyon Park.
- Hollywood, Fla.** In Circle Park, which is located in the center of the city, a tree has been planted to represent every state in the Union. The special flower of each state is also being cultivated.
- Jackson, Ga.** Purchased 12 acres at Indian Springs for the forestry board and conducted a clean-up and paint-up week.
- Kilbourn, Wis.** Four-thousand pine trees have been planted along one of our highways.
- Lancaster, Pa.** Red roses have been planted along a 12-mile stretch of the Lincoln highway between this city and Columbia. From Columbia to York another 12 miles of white roses are to be planted. Both cities, named as English shire towns, will in the future be known as the Red Rose City of Lancaster and the White Rose City of York.
- Largo, Fla.** A special committee of members and citizens of the city engaged in a clean-up week.
- Las Vegas, N. M.** Three years of activities have made it possible to secure a road leading into the Santa Fe national forest reserve, which is a beautiful recreational spot now made easily accessible from this city.
- Manhattan, Kan.** The municipal rose garden of about three acres has been planted with 300 bushes, consisting of 12 plants of each of the 25 varieties.
- Mauston, Wis.** Awarded prizes to school children for posters created by them for a clean-up week campaign.
- McCook, Neb.** Over 226 contestants entered our yard and garden contest which offered 72 prizes. Our chief objectives were a new city park and the garden contests.
- Mexico, Mo.** The third consecutive year has been given over to making the Kiwanis lake, built in the new high school grounds, a worth-while community center.
- Mitchell, S. D.** After securing acreage near Lake Mitchell each Kiwanian planted a tree as a perpetual monument in memory of the local club members.
- Mobile, Ala.** Entered a Kiwanis float in the flower parade and won first prize.
- Muncie, Ind.** An ordinance was put into effect so that city tree trimming would be under municipal supervision, in order to keep trees from being mutilated by unexperienced tree trimmers.
- Northwest Town, Chicago.** Over 9,000 children of the public and private schools were enlisted in a clean-up, paint-up and planting campaign throughout the city.
- Ontario, Calif.** A community picnic was sponsored for the purpose of encouraging the use of the city's parks. A prize was given in a home beautiful contest.
- Ontario, Ore.** Our main objective for the past two years has been the improvement of the parks and the school grounds. Kiwanians and hired men gave many hours of their time in doing manual labor for town improvements.

- Owensmouth, Calif. Organized volunteer parties to remove weeds from the parkways on residential streets. Each member pledged to plant at least one tree during March.
- Painesville, Ohio. A committee was appointed to work with the park board to provide shelter houses at the city park, and over \$1,000.00 has been spent for equipment.
- Portage La Prairie, Man. Assisted in the organization of a horticultural society, with every Kiwanian as a member.
- Prestonsburg, Ky. Our club whitewashed all telephone and electric light posts throughout the city to the corporate limits. A yard and garden contest and street cleaning campaign was kept up for six months.
- Pullman, Wash. Park equipment has been purchased and installed and the Kiwanis garden committee worked for a fall flower show.
- Salem, W. Va. The club provides waste receptacles for all the city streets.
- Seminole, Okla. There was an original survey and later rechecking on all streets and sidewalks so that a report could be given to the city council during a clean-up campaign.
- Stanford, Mont. Planted trees along our boulevards and secured final approval for a Kiwanis park on Dry Wolf Creek.
- Tujunga, Calif. All our members purchased a quantity of flower seeds to be planted on the vacant lots around town.
- Tyler, Tex. Kiwanians helped to secure 200 benches for a park.
- Vancouver, B. C. The annual rose, tulip and spring flower show presented the largest display ever exhibited.
- Watonga, Okla. A country-wide better gardens club among the rural women was organized and cash prizes were awarded the winners.
- Westboro, Mass. One-half acre of land was plowed so that 35 school children could have summer gardens. A triangular plot of ground at the entrance of town is being made into a park.
- Ypsilanti, Mich. The club has spent over \$1,500.00 in building Riverside Park which is to have a large rock garden.

IMPROVEMENT OF CIVIC CONDITIONS

- Alamosa, Colo.** An organization was formed of sheriffs and chiefs of police in six counties to interchange criminal information. In the future a bureau of criminal identification will probably be organized.
- Albany Park, Chicago.** Sponsored a debate on a proposed traction ordinance, having prominent speakers to represent both sides and invited the public to attend.
- All-Chicago Clubs, Chicago.** The twenty-one clubs in the metropolitan area of Chicago have started a movement to consolidate and co-ordinate the 418 taxing bodies, which necessitates obtaining the passage of an enabling act of the general assembly for the creation of a new municipality of Chicago, divided into precincts of a standard area in size.
- Bayonne, N. J.** A committee met with the commissioners to discuss schoolyards and play streets for children, traffic regulations and night parking and a uniform system for house lettering.
- Baxley, Ga.** The club sponsored the development of a sanitary drainage district.
- Beacon, N. Y.** After study of plans and suggestions for city zoning and plotting the club submitted its findings to the city council for the drafting of a popular ordinance.
- Biloxi, Miss.** Through our efforts there was a 16 per cent reduction in city taxes.
- Binghamton, N. Y.** The club has 15 minute Sunday evening broadcasts and all talks are concerning various community subjects and problems.
- Brownsville, Pa.** A free parking space was secured which will be a great help to the business men of the town, our customers and visitors.
- Burlington, N. J.** The club pledged its support to the board of assessors for clearing up all disputes with property owners who were dissatisfied with their assessments.
- Cairo, Ill.** A campaign was started for the collection of all past due taxes, more equitable assessment of property, and a general revision of all tax matters.
- Dallas, Ore.** An examination was made of all the sidewalks in the city, and recommendations were sent to the city council for new concrete walks where they were needed.
- Eastlake, Oakland, Calif.** The committee on public affairs saved tax payers thousands of dollars in making it possible to have an 8 per cent reduction in the tax rate. The sum of \$10,000.00 was invested for the development of a harbor.
- Fort Myers, Fla.** The club is attempting to secure a federal court for this territory.
- Frankfort, Ind.** A new shelter house has been built at Woodside Park and it has been presented to the city.
- Frederick, Md.** Assistance is being given the municipality for building a white way and providing public parking space.
- Galveston, Tex.** The club has installed 45 benches along the boulevard and beach front. These were donated to the club by the Galveston Electric Company.
- Gary, Ind.** The council and county commissioners were invited to a meeting to discuss the operation of all county institutions under one management. The club is promoting work for a more efficient police department.
- Geneva, Ohio.** An adequate house renumbering system has been developed for the city.
- Harlowton, Mont.** A temporary organization has been formed for the purpose of securing a river dam so as to create a reservoir. A flood control program for the upper Mississippi valley is being given support by our club.
- Hyannis, Mass.** A bill was placed before the state legislature for changing the traffic laws of the entire state.

IMPROVEMENT OF CIVIC CONDITIONS—Cont.

- Hyde Park, Chicago.** The club is working on the inter-racial problem in Hyde Park and it is also very active in the movement to have all old and unsafe buildings condemned and wrecked. This program should be completed by the opening of the world's fair in 1933.
- Jacksonville, Fla.** A special committee has been appointed to make a study of the tax situation throughout the entire state. Our committee is co-operating with similar ones in Florida.
- Long Beach, Calif.** Entertained the new members of the city administration—the mayor, city manager, clerk, attorney, and members of the council.
- Miami, Fla.** Urged an anti-noise ordinance and sent a committee before the city commission for a \$150,000.00 publicity appropriation.
- Milwaukee, Wis.** At regular intervals an outstanding citizen is invited to our meetings and in a short talk by a Kiwanian this citizen is given public recognition for his valuable service to the community. This serves to express the appreciation of Kiwanis toward civic-minded people.
- North Town, Chicago.** Made a survey of our street-car facilities and later secured better service.
- Norwalk, Ohio.** A committee was able to meet with the mayor and inspected all reservoirs, recommending the necessary improvements in water facilities. The club also presented a new sewage disposal plan.
- Orlando, Fla.** Sponsored a mass meeting so that all tax payers could discuss their problems, and later had official representatives on the mayor's committee which analyzed city finances.
- Royal Oak, Mich.** Established a tourist information bureau.
- San Diego, Calif.** So that a local stock company would not disband financial support was given by the club.
- Selma, N. C.** A community center was started with the club paying 40 per cent of the expenses. A vacant residence is being used as the center.
- Sioux City, Iowa.** A new routing of an arterial highway was obtained so that truck traffic would stay off of our busiest streets.
- Sparta, Wis.** The club conducted Sunday evening community meetings at the court house park.
- Toronto, Ohio.** A total of \$1,200.00 was given the city by Kiwanians and public-spirited citizens to pay for street lighting and adequate police protection. The city finances were not sufficient to meet the problems, therefore, the club took over the problem.
- West Allis, Wis.** Organized civic alliance for all the service and business clubs which meets once a month with three representatives from each group to discuss community projects. This eliminates jealousies that might come up between clubs and brings about a better understanding of the town's problems. Bus service for surrounding residential sections was promoted in 1930.

Many other clubs were engaged in numerous activities of a civic nature, such as: securing federal buildings and community holdings, getting improved mail and train service, water and sewage systems, solved parking problems, worked for bond issues for bridges and highways, secured rest rooms, appropriations for dredging rivers and lakes, renaming streets and renumbering business offices and homes, removal of snow in business streets, improved telegraph and telephone service, entertained city council members, and opened employment bureaus.

The following show the ways in which Kiwanis clubs worked to improve health and sanitary conditions in their respective cities:

Americus, Ga. A county health officer was elected and this was part of the work of our club.

Anacortes, Wash. A vaccination campaign was started during an epidemic of small-pox.

Baxley, Ga. All houses were screened and large quantities of quinine were purchased for poor people in an effort to fight the mosquito and malaria.

Belmar, N. J. An appropriation was made for employing a county and community nurse.

Berwyn, Ill. All rag weed was destroyed in the community.

Blackwell, Okla. Secured the passage of a milk ordinance, hired an experienced inspector and established a laboratory.

Burlington, Iowa. Endorsed the establishment of a combined health unit for the city and county and favored the continuation of the work of a county nurse.

Chattanooga, Tenn. Sponsored a health program at the Y. M. C. A. for business men.

Clanton, Ala. The main objective of the club was the organization of a full-time county health unit.

Columbia, Mo. Worked with the city council for securing a milk and food inspector.

- Concord, N. H. Sponsored free medical lectures for the general public with the staff of Harvard Medical College as speakers.
- Cumberland, Md. Plans are under way so that individuals or families can secure the services of a trained nurse at a moderate cost.
- Durham, N. C. The club hopes to build a cabin at a county tuberculosis sanatorium.
- Eau Claire, Wis. Aroused sufficient public interest to make the real political issue to be one concerned with the securing of an up-to-date filtration plant.
- Emeryville, Calif. At a cost of \$1,448.00 built a community hygienic center.
- Erwin, Tenn. Assisted in the establishment of a county health unit.
- Galt, Ont. A skating carnival secured us \$1,000.00 for the Victorian Order of Nurses.
- Harrisonburg, Va. The club gave prizes in an annual food and health campaign.
- Havre, Mont. Assisted authorities in observing child health day.
- Jackson, Ga. Worked with the county school superintendent for a general health survey.
- Kenosha, Wis. Assisted in the development of the first orthopedic school in the state.
- Maquoketa, Iowa. Honor pins were awarded boys in the high school graduating class who had not used tobacco or alcohol during their four years in school. Nine out of fifteen boys were qualified for the pins.
- Marshfield, Ore. Presented a silver cup to the school room in which children showed the best care of their teeth.
- Maryville-Alcoa, Tenn. Observed national child health day and all children of elementary school age were given physical examinations. Out of 5,000 county children 537 passed the standard tests.
- Mexico, Mo. Purchased a new automobile for the social service nurse. The club has maintained a car for the nurse since 1922.
- Mobile, Ala. The club is building a \$12,000.00 children's unit at a tubercular sanatorium.
- Orlando, Fla. Promoted a health program in the high school for 1,000 children.
- Pittsfield, Mass. A health exposition and healthy baby week was a success and of educational value. Although not promoted for financial gain, yet the club made \$300.00 which was applied to its health campaign fund.
- Rocky Mount, N. C. To care for three tubercular children a free clinic was established.
- San Francisco, Calif. The club pays the salary of a nurse at a free health clinic.
- San Leandro, Calif. Kiwanians gave \$200.00 toward a fund for building a new health center.
- Victoria, B. C. Collected over \$6,000.00 in a tuberculosis seal sale campaign.
- Wellsville, Ohio. A 12 weeks health contest for grade school children and a pre-school tubercular clinic were our activities. All children in the public schools were examined to detect cases of trachoma.

Individual Cases of Assistance

- Algona, Iowa.** Birthday contributions received from members were used by our welfare worker to purchase food and clothing for the poor.
- Ambler, Pa.** A welfare council was organized for the purpose of raising funds to help the poor during the winter.
- Anderson, Ind.** A theater party was held for the boys and girls in the city. Admission was made by donations of potatoes, apples, canned fruit, vegetables and package foods. This material was later distributed among 500 needy families.
- Baxter Springs, Kan.** A hunt secured us 212 rabbits which were distributed among the city's poor.
- Blackwell, Okla.** A \$50,000.00 fund for a new library was released immediately to relieve unemployment.
- Centerville, Iowa.** After three years the club has secured a paid social welfare worker.
- East Orange, N. J.** Established a Kiwanis store-room for supplying the needy with clothing.
- Goldsboro, N. C.** At one meeting a bundle of old clothing was required from each member for admission and these were turned over to a welfare worker.

ASSISTANCE TO THE NEEDY—Cont.

- Hudson, N. Y.** The club opened a free employment bureau.
- Kankakee, Ill.** Realizing the need of united charity work organized all associations into one unit recognized as a community welfare group. A vacant store was secured as an employment bureau and a three-day registration found 700 people seeking employment.
- Kansas City, Mo.** A survey was made of all down-town business property in need of repair and with the chamber of commerce operated a plan to give this work to the unemployed.
- Lethbridge, Alta.** A camp for mothers was established at the Watertown National Park 90 miles away.
- Lompoc, Calif.** Our club presented the city with a fully equipped ambulance costing \$1,550.50. Shoes and food were given all our poor families.
- Loveland, Colo.** Twenty-five bushels of potatoes were collected at two motion picture shows for children where admissions were large potatoes.
- Memphis, Tenn.** Raised \$2,900.00 for the Good Fellows organization. Nine thousand families were given food.
- Minneapolis, Minn.** Sold \$600.00 worth of products for the Society of the Blind.
- Montreal, P. Q.** Over 50 automobiles were in service during every month of the year in our welfare work. We distributed old clothing, food, magazines and furniture to poor people, hospitals and other institutions. Financial help was given the family of a police officer who was killed while on duty.
- North Shore, Chicago.** We maintained a relief station for the unemployed and visited all neighborhood schools and churches and gave talks over the radio so that people who needed aid would come to our bureau.
- Peoria, Ill.** We maintained a free automobile service for all the blind people in our city.
- Philadelphia, Pa.** Over 1,000 under-nourished children and destitute families were supplied with food and coal.
- Ravenswood, Chicago.** A committee of twelve was appointed to do all forms of relief work with the Salvation Army. Food and clothing were distributed to the poor.
- Roseburg, Ore.** The club organized a central relief committee made up of all civic organizations. This was done to centralize effort, eliminate duplication of work and completely cover the welfare field.
- St. Lawrence, Montreal, P. Q.** About \$3,000.00 was used to assist families in need. We have a plan in effect whereby a family as soon as it becomes self-supporting is taken off of our welfare list.
- Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.** A Saturday morning matinee, with the admission being a toy or clothing, gave us 800 articles to be distributed among the unemployed and the poor.
- Spokane, Wash.** The club in January finished its fourteenth Pensioned Mother's Home which cost approximately \$2,000.00, though the labor for construction was given free by Kiwanians. The fifteenth home was purchased in September for \$1,000.00 and necessary improvements cost \$400.00 more. Repairs on the fifteen homes during the year made necessary an expenditure of over \$1,000.00. Kiwanians subscribed \$6,150.00 for the purchase of a 40-acre site nine miles north of the city on a paved highway, which is to be used as a summer camp for the under-nourished children of our pensioned mothers. The club's real estate holdings are now conservatively worth at least \$50,000.00. Clothing and equipment were also purchased for these families who were in need.
