After six years on the East Coast Indianapolis native Liese Hilgeman, left, has come home to direct the Herron Gallery, Indianapolis Center for Contemporary Art. William J. Voos, dean of Herron, said of her appointment, "We are certain that she will bring excellent creative vision and good management to the position and become another strong director in the traditions of Carol Adney, Martha Winans and the late Robert Roman." Hilgeman's broad expertise in museums is the result of varied experiences in the field that include curator of exhibitions at the Hudson River Museum. Also in New York City, she was assistant registrar at the New York Historical Society and was an exhibition assistant at the Whitney Museum of

American Art. She holds a master's degree in art history from Boston University. Hilgeman grew up in the arts community of Indianapolis as the daughter of Paul Hilgeman, a trumpet player in the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra for 30 years.——M. Hopper

Dr. Hine is undergoing physical therapy and reports that while he has responded well to treatment, progress so far has been "frustratingly slow." Dr. Hine was IUPUI's first chancellor (1969-1973) and for 23 years before that was dean of dentistry.

HEALTH PROFESSIONAL WHO OPPOSES WIDESPREAD AIDS TESTING BEGINS SECOND BOOK



TUPUI faculty member Jerry Durham, left, who is writing his second book on AIDS, thinks that health care professionals should not have to reveal their infection with AIDS, and he also opposes widespread testing for health care practitioners and patients. "Based on scientific evidence about the likelihood of transmitting the virus either from patient to health care worker or vice versa, I don't think that widespread testing is warranted," said Durham, who is executive associate dean for academic programs in the School of Nursing. His conclusion is contrary to a recent recommendation

by the American Medical Association and the American Dental Association that AIDS-infected doctors and dentists warn their patients about their disease or give up surgery. He points out that among the 150,000 reported cases of AIDS in the U.S., between 5,000 and 6,000 represent health care workers, only 37 of them became infected by accidental needle punctures through their work. He thinks this and other supporting data do not justify the disruption to people and the costs of widespread testing. "The risk of HTV transmission in the health care setting is extremely small if the guidelines are followed," he added. Durham recently presented a paper on AIDS policy planning for health-related professional schools at a conference in New Jersey. He is co-editor of a prize-winning book, "The Person with AIDS: Nursing Perspectives," a guide for nurses who work with AIDS patients. With a co-author he is completing a second edition of the book and is writing another about women and children and AIDS.—S. Matthys Roob

is Billye Brown, president of Sigma Theta Tau International. With them are other


