A new Center for American Studies has been established on this campus to encourage and support the development of scholarly activities in the study of American culture and institutions.

Dr. Joseph T. Taylor, dean of the School of Liberal Arts, has appointed an advisory committee to begin planning and organizing appropriate activities which may be carried out under the auspices of the Center. Dr. Bernard Friedman, professor of history, has been named acting director of the Center.

Among the tentative ideas so far proposed are the development of a scholarly publication on American studies and a series of American Bicentennial seminars and institutes.

The other members of the Center's advisory committee are Cyrus Behroozi, social service; Donna Dial, economics; Wilmer Fife, chemistry; Ralph Gray, history, and Jerome Kaplan, physics.

Also William Marsh, law; Paul Nagy, philosophy; Sidney Ochs, physiology; Samuel Roberson, art history; Roland Sherrill, English, and James Smurl, religious studies. Administrative responsibilities for the Center will rest in the School of Liberal Arts.
