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Steering the mission: Steve Bogdewic, PhD

As one of the largest medical schools in the nation, IU School of Medicine is a leader in medical education and [research](#). The driving force behind the school's continuum of medical advancement is a multidisciplinary team of student, faculty and staff leaders who make up the Strategic Planning Steering Committee (SPSC). At the forefront of this committee is Steve Bogdewic, PhD, executive vice dean for IU School of Medicine.

Dr. Bogdewic's professional experience in academic medicine spans more than 30 years. In his current role as executive vice dean, he is responsible for school-wide strategic planning, departmental reviews and the school's strategic alignment with the health care system. In addition, Dr. Bogdewic holds faculty appointments in the departments of family medicine and pediatrics, as well as the School of Public and Environmental Affairs at Indiana University Purdue University-Indianapolis (IUPUI).

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Scoring points for cancer research

Three years ago, Cassidy “Cass” Satterfield and Alana “Cookie” Cook were introduced to one another by their hometown hero, Ali Patberg, the 2015 Indiana Miss Basketball.

At the time Cass was a freshman at Columbus North High School and Alana was in sixth grade. They bonded over their shared love of basketball. Little did they know how much of a team they would become over the next few years.

Cass has a sensory disorder and developmental disability, and Alana has always made sure to look after her. In October 2015, Cass returned the favor. She stayed by Alana’s side when her friend was diagnosed with and underwent treatment for a rare brain tumor.

Alana was cared for by IU School of Medicine faculty member [Chie-Schin Shih, MD](#), and members of the Pediatric Neuro-Oncology Program at Riley Hospital for Children at IU Health. She endured a grueling regimen of surgery, radiation and chemotherapy. It worked. In July 2016, a scan showed that the cancer was gone.

IPEC to host TEACH! learning event Jan. 24

Indiana University's commitment to improve the health and health care of Indiana continues to build momentum as TEACH! (Team Education Advancing Collaboration in Healthcare), the university's cross-school curriculum, moves into 2018. Several interprofessional learning events are scheduled, and these represent opportunities for students, faculty, and staff to get involved.

The TEACH! Curriculum includes interprofessional learning events that progressively dive deeper into team science and address the **Interprofessional Education Collaborative (IPEC) competencies** of values and ethics, roles and responsibilities, interprofessional communication, and interprofessional teamwork.

The first TEACH! experience is "Introduction to Interprofessional Teamwork," Anchor #1 and will be held from 6-9 pm, Wednesday, Jan. 24. Learners from nursing, occupational therapy and public health will work in interprofessional teams to explore the roles and responsibilities of multiple professions involved in caring for someone suffering from multiple conditions, including diabetes, depression and isolation.

Training and development sessions are great ways to get information and share your input and feedback. These sessions are provided regularly for new and experienced facilitators with sessions available for each anchor, as well as virtual modules available in Canvas. Questions? 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Faculty, lab mentors, lecturers needed for summer oncology program

Laboratory mentors, lecturers and clinical faculty are invited to participate in a joint summer translational oncology program among IU School of Medicine, IU Simon Cancer Center and Johns Hopkins. Now in its third year at IU School of Medicine, the program--Cancer in the Under-Privileged Indigent or Disadvantaged (CUPID)--is designed to promote the field of oncology to medical students interested in addressing both rural and urban health care disparities. Fellows selected from IU will be assigned to laboratories and clinics in Indianapolis.

IU School of Medicine will host four to six students for the program, which will be held May 28 to Aug. 3. Faculty conducting cancer-related research are encouraged to consider hosting a student in their labs, giving a lecture related to oncology or providing a shadow experience in their clinics. Faculty mentors hosting a summer student in their labs will receive \$1,000 to cover lab-related expenses.

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IU Center for Diabetes and Metabolic Diseases offers research funding

The IU Center for Diabetes and Metabolic Diseases seeks applications for its pilot and feasibility program, which fosters the development of new diabetes-related investigators and provides seed support for innovative, high-risk projects. Investigators at Indiana University, IUPUI, Ball State, Notre Dame, IBRI and Purdue are eligible for this funding opportunity.

The program is particularly directed to new investigators and established investigators new to diabetes-related research. It also will consider established diabetes investigators pursuing high-impact/high-risk projects or projects that are a significant departure from their usual work.

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Grants available to use CTSI-designated core facilities

The Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute (CTSI) seeks proposals from postdoctoral researchers to develop translational research through the use of technologies and expertise at the Indiana CTSI-designated core facilities available at all partner institutions. Translational research refers to research in the lab that eventually translates into patient treatment to improve human health care. Translation involves applying discoveries made during research (in the lab, through animal studies, etc.) to the development of clinical trials and studies in humans.

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Apply for funds to support veteran-related health research

IIMR's mission is to promote and enhance research efforts that will ultimately result in improved quality of life for veterans and for the greater population. To support this mission, IIMR works to encourage investigators to develop their research careers by working with IIMR, the Veterans Administration and veterans to answer important questions. To this end, IIMR sponsors the annual Young Investigator Award Program, which provides a competitive experience for investigators to explore the possibilities of VA-related research.

Munshi joins Veterans Health Indiana as chief of staff

Imtiaz Munshi, MD, has been named the new chief of staff of Veterans Health Indiana. His appointment was effective Dec. 10. In his new role, Dr. Munshi has direct responsibility for the clinical operations for the veterans' health system in Indiana. As the liaison to the VA Medical Centers, Dr. Munshi will also hold the position of associate dean of veterans affairs for IU School of Medicine.

Dr. Munshi brings a determined vision and common-sense approach to raising the VA's clinical and academic expectations while being focused on elevating the quality, safety and value of health care to veterans. Dr. Munshi has been in clinical practice for 20 years, the last 10 at the Roudebush VAMC in Indianapolis as deputy chief of staff, director of general surgery and director of surgical intensive care unit.

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Eskenazi Health expands outpatient rehabilitation services

A new outpatient rehabilitation center for the treatment of orthopedic, musculoskeletal and neurological conditions will open Monday, Dec. 18, at the Sidney & Lois Eskenazi Hospital in Indianapolis. Additional rehabilitation services available at the new center include pelvic floor health, cognitive therapy, amputee rehab, specialized care for hand injuries and splinting needs. The clinic will also allow therapists to practice in a joint venture that integrates emergency and outpatient rehab. This will provide a seamless transition and continuity of care as patients move from the emergency department to outpatient care.

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
