IU School of Medicine fully reaccredited for eight years

Have you heard the latest about reaccreditation? IU School of Medicine learned earlier this month that it has earned full reaccreditation for eight years. The designation was granted by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME), the accrediting body for programs leading to the MD degree in the United States.

In a statement now available on MEDNet, IU School of Medicine Dean Jay L. Hess, MD, PhD, MHSA, vice president for university clinical affairs, Indiana University, wrote, "On behalf of President McRobbie, I want to thank each of you for your efforts in helping bring about this outcome. It was clearly the result of everyone working together

as one institution, committed to preparing the next generation of healers and transforming the health of those in our state and beyond."

IU School of Medicine's next full reaccreditation survey will occur in 2024-25.

Flu vaccine deadline is Nov. 9

As a reminder, all IU School of Medicine faculty, staff, house staff and students who provide clinical care to IU Health or Eskenazi Health patients, perform clinical research at IU Health or Eskenazi Hospital or whose primary office is in an IU Health or Eskenazi hospital are required to receive a flu vaccination. The deadline for receiving the vaccine is Thursday, Nov. 9. Flu shots are available at IUPUI Campus Health (Coleman Hall, Suite 100; no appointment required).

Research investigates how parent incarceration affects children

Indiana has the second highest state rate of incarceration in the country, largely due to the uptick in illegal opioid use, leaving more than 1 in 10 children with at least one parent behind bars. Research suggests having an incarcerated parent may negatively impact a child's behavioral, emotional and physical health, also putting the child at an increased risk to suffer from anxiety, learning disabilities and ADD/ADHD.

A community-led study based in Indianapolis hopes to better understand the correlation between parental incarceration and its effects on a child's overall health. IU School of Medicine researcher and professor of clinical pediatrics Angela Tomlin, PhD, has teamed up with other researchers and community partners to find potential solutions for children who are left behind.

"All too often, an incarcerated parent is a child's first strike against them," said Tomlin. "The early years of a child's life are the most important for their overall development, and we want to make sure these children are able to establish supportive relationships outside of the home as a means to help them thrive."

Bonetto receives two-year V Scholar Grant

Andrea Bonetto, PhD, assistant professor surgery, has earned a V Scholar Grant for "Mechanisms and Treatment of Chemotherapy-induced Cachexia and Muscle Weakness." The V Scholar Grant is a two-year grant of \$100,000 per year. It supports young tenure-track faculty early in their cancer research careers by funding projects that are either laboratory-based fundamental research or translational research.


