REFORMS IN CHINA DISCUSSED

Economic Reforms in China will be the subject of a lecture-discussion by Professor Shou-Eng Koo of the IUPUI Department of Economics from 12 noon to 1 p.m. Tuesday (Nov. 1) in the Porter Room of the Union Building. Professor Koo recently returned from the Peoples Republic of China where he spent several months as a visiting professor under the IU-Nankai University exchange. Professor Koo also visited China while on sabbatical leave in 1980. The Lecture is sponsored by the Office of International Programs at IUPUI.

M.A. ACCREDITED

The master's degree program in health administration in the I.U. School of Public and Environmental Affairs has been given full accreditation by the Accrediting Commission for Education in Health Services Administration. There are 44 such accredited programs in the country.

Begun in 1969, the IUPUI program was transferred to SPEA from the I.U. School of Medicine in July 1982. Directed by Gerald McHugh, D.B.A., associate professor of Public and Environmental Affairs, the program has two major concentrations: management of health institutions and health administration policy making and planning.

In February an accrediting team of four specialists in health services education observed the program in action, which has enrolled 72 students this fall. The initial accreditation is for four years, longer than the normal first assignment made by the commission, according to Professor McHugh.

MIRSKY HOSTS GEOLOGISTS

Dr. Arthur Mirsky, IUPUI geology chairman and chairman of the 96th annual meeting of the Geological Society of America, expects 4,500 guests from around the world at the meeting at the Indiana Convention-Exposition Center this week (Sunday through Thursday).

Dr. P.P. DeCaprariis, assistant professor of geology at IUPUI, will have an invited exhibit on his computer program for determining more accurately the effects of development on ground water. Up to now, planners have known that ground water is affected with building, paving, etc., but they didn't know in economic terms what it would cost if ground water is affected adversely. Dr. De-Caprariis thinks he has the answer. Some of the other speakers, papers, and exhibits will include issues such as nuclear waste control, finding coal, predicting the outcome of volcanic eruptions and predicting earthquakes.


