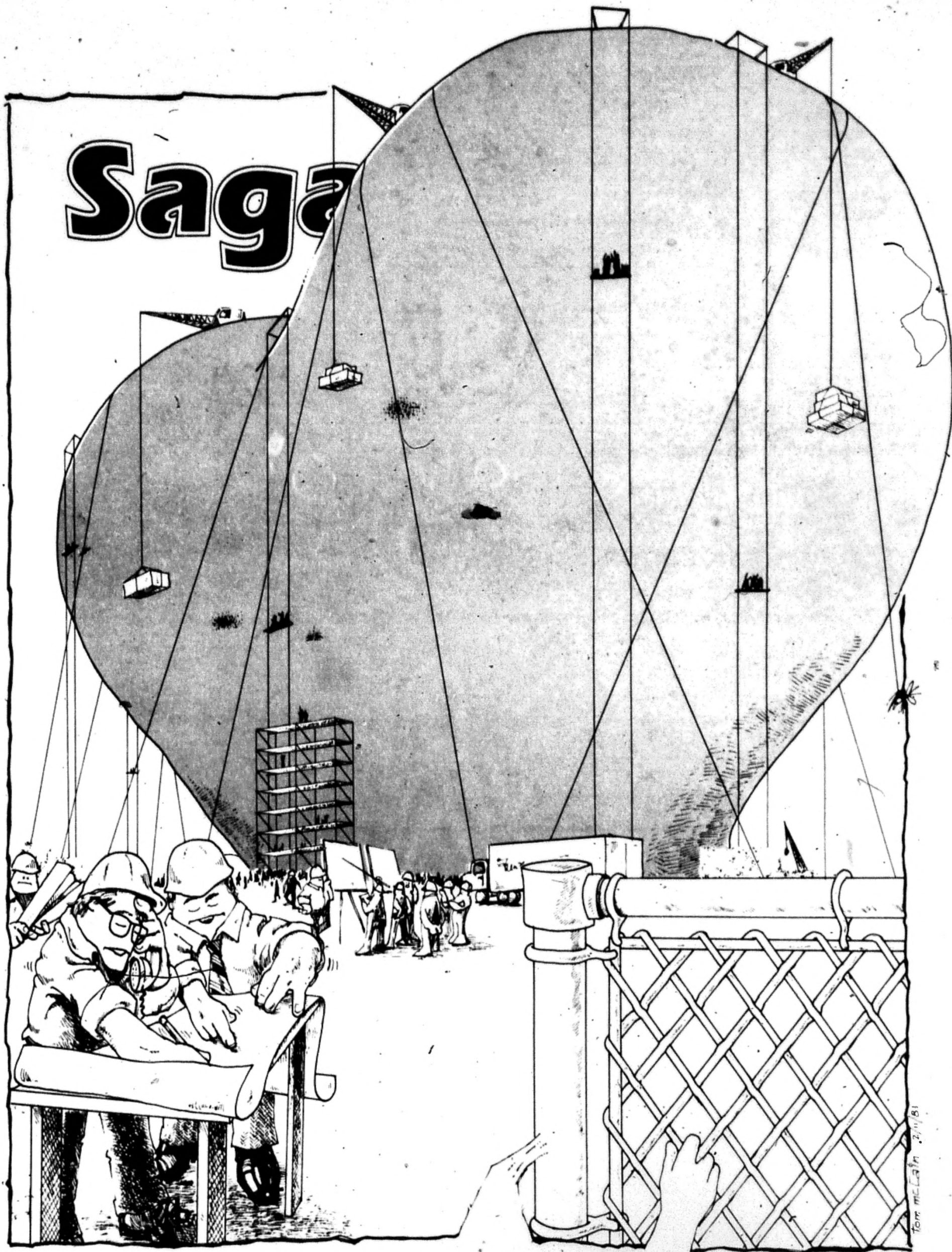

Where has all the money gone?

Over \$900,000 in work-study money will be earned by 562 students at IUPUI this semester. That is, if the funds don't run out.

After talking to Shirley Boardman, director of financial aids, I was made aware of the shortages of aid for this semester.

The financial aid situation, work-study in particular, is at the crisis stage. This problem has arisen because utilization rates (a per cent of actual use) did not take the unstable economy and high unemployment rate into account.

It was normal for most state colleges to overaward work-study to students by as much as 50 per cent, because the actual usage was only about 47 per cent.

This year, for the first time, 82 per cent of the offers made to the students for work-study are being earned. This campus has \$100,000 of demand for

work-study in excess of what can be provided.

There will be no work-study money allotted for the summer. It has also been said, by Shirley Boardman, that there may be some reduction of gross total amounts for people presently on work-study. This will take place in April.

Evidently, something needs to be done about the situation. The utilization rates will have to be changed to come closer to approximating actual usage.

The people responsible for setting these rates need to take an honest look at the economic situation and how it relates to the working student. Perhaps some long-range planning and strategy would be in order, with a yearly review to keep tabs on the changes and the programs up-to-date.

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Parking fines purchase library books

Every day, IUPUI Police Officers slither throughout campus parking lots candidly writing tickets to slap on student's windows. Last year those numerous police officers distributed 38,000 parking tickets at 3 dollars a shot. Surprisingly, the money collected from parking tickets does not go to the Police Department, but to IUPUI Parking Services. Mr. R.M.

Tirmenstein, head of Parking Services, heads the department which collects the fines from tickets, and then places the money in the accounts of Dr. Erwin and Dr. Moore, in order to purchase library books for the various campus libraries.

Police Chief John Mulvey guessed that of the 38,000 tickets distributed last year 20,000 were paid. According to Parking Services 1980 report this is a very precise guess.

When asked why IUPUI Parking Services failed to obtain a large percentage of money from tickets, Tirmenstein believes the reason so many parking violations go unpaid is because of the difficulties in tracking down visitors who come to campus for a short stay and received a ticket. He commented, "The purpose of giving parking tickets is to maintain an orderly parking system, not to hassle

students."

Although the IUPUI Police Department does not receive any money from parking fines, officers continue to write a large quantity of tickets. Their reasons may vary from just the amount of easily spotted offenders a day to an officer's particular mood a certain day, or as Officer Mary Gerard sums it up, "If we get a new sergeant who wants a lot of tickets

issued, then we give him more tickets."

Can students escape paying parking tickets? Tirmenstein stated that 55 percent of unpaid fines are from visitors to campus, in other words, cars without decals. If a student were to drive a friend's or parent's car to school which has no decal, and receives a ticket, technically he or she may "tear it up" without fear of a manhunt.

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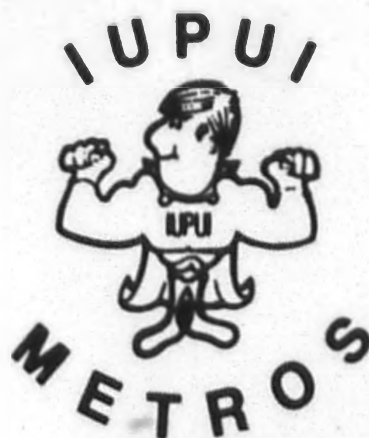

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Police seek good relationship with students

Beyond tagging cars for parking violations and occasionally lounging around the basement of Cavanaugh Hall with evidently nothing to do, the men and women of the IUPUI Police Department remain a mystery to the students. Inside that rather dull exterior of a police building, lies an extremely detailed organization, which has more power than most students realize.

The department is actually two in one: a police department consisting of 34 officers, and a security department with 22 officers. Although the officers of the security department are not actually police officers, the men in the police department itself

are qualified as State police and carry just as much authority.

The department's area of jurisdiction includes the campus and the streets running adjacent to the campus. The IUPUI Police department, contrary to popular belief, is not restricted to tagging cars in parking lots or correcting people for traffic violations.

In 1980, the department made 284 arrests, 46 drug related and 48 theft. The force investigated 176 property damage cases, 17 personal injury cases, 83 medical assists, and 143 fire drills. A surprising 10,221 personal escort cases were made by the department last year across campus to insure citizen safety if felt necessary. Chief of

University Police John Mulvey commented, "We will escort anyone, anywhere on campus at anytime."

Inside the department lies a variety of offices, including 2 investigative offices with electronic surveillance equipment. The department has a temporary lockup, an Armory, and an evidence room. This room is filled with everything from confiscated beer, handguns, hubcaps and unusual weapons. The department has a police cadet program which includes 2 years of on the spot training and attending the


Police Academy after which they become qualified law enforcement officers.

The heart of the IUPUI Police Department dwells in the dispatch office where an IBM computer terminal can print out any information on a suspect. The department is also in the process of connecting a video system enabling dispatchers to detect foul play in the new parking garages.

This force indeed has many more powers and capabilities than most students probably expect. Chief Mulvey, at the helm of this department as of six

months ago, says, "Since the concept of University Police is a new one, we are still defining as we go." Mulvey is concerned about student needs and would like to see a good relationship with students and the department.

As far as the police officer's typical day is concerned, the main agenda might include basic patrolling, issuing tickets, helping people enter their locked cars, and returning stolen purses. Each officer is to patrol one of four zones dividing the campus and occasionally each see Police...on page 12.



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Metros looking toward first winning season

Roundballers sittin' pretty for homecoming on 18th

Riding their longest winning streak of the year, the IUPUI Metros clinched back-to-back overtime triumphs this past week over Indiana Tech and Anderson College.

Now 13-10, the worst the Metros can do this season is 13-13. That would still be the best finish in the history of the program.

"But that's not going to be it," predicted the pleased and confident Coach Mel Garland.

With four straight wins in

their back pocket, the team's hopes for a postseason tournament bid have improved tremendously. Garland says the Metros' chances are now "about 50-50." "We still have to beat Marion," he notes, for the team to keep NAIA District 21 playoff aspirations alive.

The team will play Marion next Wednesday on Homecoming night at MSA.

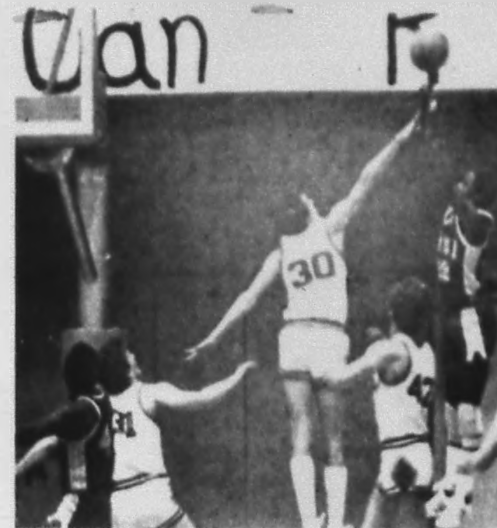
As for his squad's latest victories, Garland knew precisely why his club didn't wilt under duress in either pressure-packed

game. "It's the experience we've gained," reasoned Garland. "I can't really say that any one thing won those ballgames for us except that we didn't panic. We were able to hold together and win both of them." Kim King fired in a 6-foot jumper with 5 seconds of overtime remaining to spur the Metros past Indiana Tech on Feb. 4 at Market Square Arena.

The team had an unprecedented six men in double figures. Mike Herr topped the list with 15 points, followed by

King with 14, Ron Angevine with 13, and Reggie Butler and Keith Randy Wilkes scored 12 each. Haywood Garrett was the sixth man in double figures with 11. Herr and Butler led the Metro rebounding with 13 and 12 respectively.

At Anderson on the following Saturday, the IUPUI squad squeezed by the host Ravens, 73-71. Ron Angevine burned the nets for 31 points and captured game honors in that category. Butler contributed 12 and Herr 10. Garrett led the Metro rebounding with nine.



Ladies drop two

IUPUI's women's basketball team dropped to .500 last week with losses to Butler and Marion.

With 1:17 remaining in the Marion game, coach Kathy Tucker pulled her forces off the floor because of rough play and lack of calls by the officials.

IUPUI was losing 68-48 at the time and Coach Tucker said, "It wasn't worth taking the chance getting one of the girls hurt."

Judy Cummings, a 1979 Indiana High School All Star, led the Metros scoring with 26 points. Chyrell Saunders finished with eight points in the losing effort. Kim Galyan and Judy Pluckebaum scored four while Barb Spears and Marty Kalb added two.

Butler, who Coach Tucker said may be the best team in the state, defeated the Metros 76-60.

The Bulldogs led 39-28 at the

half and held a gap of 14 points in the first stanza.

IUPUI outscored Butler 12-3 in the first 5:14 of the second half and pulled within two at 42-40.

For the next 6:46 the Butler lead staggered from three to five points as the two teams traded baskets. A Cummings field goal at the eight minute mark brought the Metros to within three at 55-52 but that was to be the closest IUPUI was to come.

Butler scored the next seven points to open a 10 point lead. After a Masengale fielder at the 6:51 mark, the Bulldogs scored another nine straight points to open up a 71-54 lead with less than three minutes to go. IUPUI couldn't cut into the lead and lost 76-60.

Cummings led the Metros with 28 points, while Tina Masengale added 16. Spears hit six, Pluckebaum and Galyan four and Saunders two.

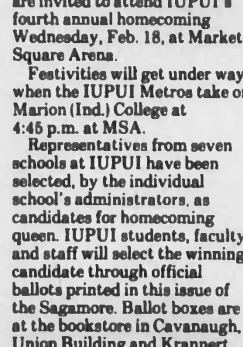

The Official Secrets Act
It's difficult to describe *The Official Secrets Act* (Sire SRK 6099) by a group simply called M, but Myterious New Wave seems about as good as anything.

Electronic effects, synthesizers and percussion are predominant, with saxophones, bass, strings, vocals and uilleann pipes (whatever they may be) used as well. Lyrics are vaguely political and leftist, and touch upon a variety of subjects without going too deeply into

any. Political Science types might enjoy picking out the reference M—a British group (I gather), incidentally—makes to joining a party ("I say left and you say right," "working for the corporation," espionage, official secrets ("fictional fact") and radio propaganda, both American and Soviet.

Liner notes are deliberately made difficult to read by spacing out the typewritten words and dispensing with punctuation entirely. For the record, though, personnel on the disc are Philip Gould, Mark King, Julian Scott, Robin Scott, David Vorhaus, Wally Badarou, Gary Barnacle, Paddy Keenan, Brigit Vinchon, Denise Blackhan, Mog Aherene, John Keogh, Billy Brown, Des Smith, Deidre

Costello and (inhale) either The Dublin Symphony Orchestra or, more likely, its leader Audrey Parkes. (Let me tell you, these notes are obscure!) One of these persons, apparently, is M.

Technically, this album is, um, sonically interesting and well-recorded. Hi-fi enthusiasts should enjoy it for that reason, if no other. Some of the things that flash through one's mind while listening to *The Official Secrets Act* are "wierd!", "what was that?", "how's that again?" and "huh?" At the same time, M

does turn out a few eerily beautiful melodies.

If you enjoy mysterious, quasi-political lyrics wrapped in unusual, largely electronic music and packaged in cryptic liner notes and cover, you should probably run right out and buy this one. (Some knowledge of French would be helpful, too.) Those of you who are merely curious might as well wait for it to show up on the cut-out racks, which shouldn't take too long.



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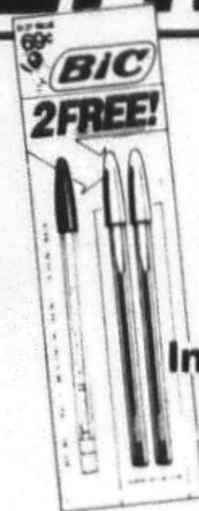

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IUPUI poll establishing national reputation: Vargus

While candidates were campaigning last November for Indiana offices, another man—Dr. Brian Vargus, not running for office—shared their limelight. Vargus gained media attention with his IUPUI Poll, by predicting the significant lead of Dan Quayle in the senatorial campaign.

Vargus, chairman of the sociology department at IUPUI, said, "I was teaching a polling class, and in the back of my mind, I knew we'd do another election poll."

Vargus, who assisted sociology professors David Ford

in 1976 and Dr. Linda Haas and Dr. Ain Haas in 1978 with the IUPUI polls, directed the 1980 poll. Since 1976, the IUPUI poll has been accurate.

"In 1978, we started to get attention," said Vargus. "We were the first ones to show Goldsmith winning as prosecutor and the Wells over Eads victory in the sheriff race. Now after the 1980 poll, we are establishing a national reputation."

Vargus continued, "We were confident of the 1980 state election. But at one point, it felt awfully lonely. Both senate candidates were disavowing us.

We checked our numbers several times and came up with the same figures. We knew we were right because we went by the books. We didn't take any shortcuts. All we could do was stand by our numbers."

Vargus and his polling staff used the panel method to select prospective participants 60 days prior to the election. Approximately 1000 registered voters were called, according to Vargus. From those calls, 810 were reported.

"Sometimes we get disconnected numbers, busy lines, or people who have moved or died. Occasionally someone

hangs up on us, but generally our refusal rate is very low," said Vargus. "Most voters are willing to answer our questions because we are from a university."

Since the 1980 poll, other research contracts have come in. Vargus said, "We don't do polls or surveys for commercial profit. Since these programs are used as student training projects, we do studies for redeeming research value."

Vargus continued, "I think the projects are good experiences for the students. Many of them were awed by the

amount of work involved. We did a lot of work, but we had fun, too. the poll also gave the 50 students involved, pride in the school and a sense of comradeship with their co-workers."

Prior to his employment at IUPUI in 1975, Vargus was director of the Urban Research Center at the University of Pittsburg. In 1973, Vargus received a Fulbright scholarship and taught survey research to graduate students in Tokyo. He received his doctoral degree from Indiana University in 1969.

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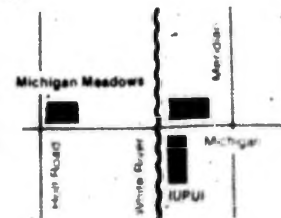

officer will patrol inside the buildings. The four zone system has only been in effect on campus for three to four months and officers are only occasionally limited to this pattern.

Officer Carl Woods feels most people have negative attitudes of police officers and believes this leads to police having harsh personalities. Besides patrolling his zone, Woods provides services such as speaking to the IUPUI Day Care class. Having a child of his own, Woods enjoys the visit with the class

especially when curious questions are asked such as, "Do you shoot bad people?"

"I feel here at IUPUI we have a good rapport with the students," two-year officer Mary Gerard believes. Mary is a graduate from the IU Police Cadet program, and feels this was a beneficial aid in her career.

Both officers, Woods and Gerard, would like to see more parking signs posted throughout campus to prevent students and visitors from

becoming confused. Mary also feels a paging system in Cavanaugh Hall would be helpful in locating students to keep their cars from being towed away.


Besides a few difficulties such as occasional faulty radios and sirens, the Police Department is basically a very organized and effective law enforcement unit. As Officer Carl Woods sums up, "I want to let the public know that we are trying to make things safe and comfortable."
