The Chancellor's Lectures and Convocations Committee is sponsoring the visits of two speakers to IUPUI this week.

Mladin Soic, director of the Yugoslavian Information Service in New York City and former Yugoslavian consul to the People's Republic of China, will give a seminar Monday in the Faculty Lounge in Cavanaugh Hall at 3 p.m. He will talk on "Yugoslavia: Changing Image."

On Tuesday, Soic will give a public lecture in Room 100 of the Lecture Hall at 10:30 a.m. on "Emerging China." Soic, who was in China during the "Red Guard years," also will be visiting some classes.

On Thursday, Dr. Harold Taylor, former president of Sarah Lawrence College and author of the book, The World as a Teacher, will present a public lecture on "Education for World Peace" at 10:30 a.m. in the Lecture Hall.

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MURPHY HEADS NEW DEPARTMENT

A Patient Registration Office, the result of combining the functions of the Admitting and Patient Accounts Departments, has been established for the Indiana University Hospitals. John E. Murphy, formerly manager of the Patient Accounts Office, is in charge of this new department, which has offices in each of the four hospitals.

This move, effective February 19, brings together the social and financial aspects of the admissions process and enables the patient-counseling staff to serve better both physicians and patients at the point of origin.

Murphy is chairman of a recently appointed Admissions Advisory Committee which will provide necessary input from other hospital departments. This group will help Murphy develop pre-registration procedures and implement a computerized admission system for inpatients as well as for selected outpatients to various hospital clinics. Such a system will provide for the collection and distribution of admissions data to many ancillary service departments for planning and staffing purposes. As the initial program for computerized admissions is refined, the needs of other hospital departments can be met through further program development.

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WINTER TRAVELLERS

Professor Edward McWhinney of the Indianapolis Law School was in Toronto Canada, earlier this month, first to address the International Law Association on "Contemporary International Law Attitudes of the Soviet Union," then to talk about "The Moscow and Peking Summit Meetings and International Law" at the Canadian Forces College.

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Also in Canada recently was Dr. M.H. Aprison, professor of biochemistry and chief of the Section of Neurobiology, Institute of Psychiatric Research. He was in Montreal to be one of five speakers at a five-day symposium on "Amino Acids as Neurotransmitters," sponsored by Merck-Frosst Laboratories. His topic was "The Metabolism of Glycine in the Central Nervous System." Professor Aprison also was in San Antonio, Texas, recently to present a seminar on "Glycine, a Neurotransmitter in the Spinal Cord" to the combined faculties of the pharmacology and anatomy departments at the University of Texas Medical School.

Dr. F.V. DeFeudis, assistant professor of pharmacology and psychiatry, recently served as co-chairman of two sessions on "Environmental Effects on Brain and Behavior" at the Sixth Annual Conference on Brain Research at Vail, Colorado.

Dean Benjamin de Brie Taylor of the Herron School of Art represented the school at last month's meeting of the College Art Association of America in New York City. Also attending from Herron were Mrs. Maudine Williams, librarian, and Mrs. Frances Friedman, circulation librarian.

Dr. V.K. Stoelting, professor and chairman of the Department of Anesthesiology, and his son, Dr. R.K. Stoelting, assistant professor of anesthesiology and pharmacology, attended the Academy of Anesthesiologists Meeting last month in Key Largo, Florida. Dr. Stoelting the Younger delivered a paper called "Serum Inorganic Fluoride Concentrations Following Methoxyflurane Anesthesia in Man." Before the Florida meeting, he visited Ohio State University as a visiting professor.

Michael Gemignani, professor and chairman of the Department of Mathematical Sciences, was in Dallas last month to present a short paper on "Another Topology Associated with a Decomposition Theory" at the annual meeting of the American Mathematical Society. Also attending the meeting were Associate Professor Joseph Kuczkowski and Assistant Professors Sherwood Samn and Poo-Sen Chu. Dr. Gemignani also talked about "Decomposition Theories" earlier at Indiana State University in Terre Haute.

Dr. Marvin L. Bittinger, associate professor of mathematics education, has been on the travel circuit. In November he addressed the meeting of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics in Knoxville, Tennessee. In December he was in Monterey, California, to talk to the California Mathematics Council Meeting. His topics were "Logic and Proof: What Should We Do With It?" and "Developmental Courses: A Comparison of Teaching Approaches." Last month he talked to the Central Indiana Council of Teachers of Mathematics about "Mathematics for the Unmotivated." Dr. Gemignani, along with M.L. Keedy, has a book out called Algebra: A Modern Introduction, published by Addison-Wesley.

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
