DENTAL SCHOOL RESEARCH GOING BACK INTO SPACE

Dental school researchers Eugene Roberts and Lawrence Garetto will have a special interest in the next NASA space shuttle flight, scheduled to lift off this week from Cape Canaveral. They will have two research projects aboard the shuttle flight as they continue to study the influence of gravity on the development and function of bone-forming cells called osteoblasts. This is the second space flight involving projects by the two dental school researchers, though this flight is not directly connected to their 1991 project. A follow-up to their first space-related study is scheduled to lift off later this summer.



NATIONAL FIGURES HEADLINE RELIGION CONFERENCE ON MEDIA




