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YOU MAY BE UNCOMFORTABLE, BUT YOU MAY SAVE A LIFE

Because of the strike in the bituminous coal industry, IUPUI has not been able to receive any coal since October 8. Reserve stocks, which were at a maximum at that time, have now dwindled to less than half. Coal burning is augmented with oil, but at a cost 60 per cent greater than for coal alone. Oil-fired steam capacity is not sufficient to supply the total steam needs of IUPUI.

Consequently, cutbacks in steam service for heating and air conditioning are mandatory. Highest priority for continuity of service is naturally given to the hospitals. Life support must not be endangered. Academic and ancillary functions will have to endure less than satisfactory comfort conditions.

A program has been started which reduces heating and air conditioning in all buildings on the IUPUI Campus served by the Central Power Plant. These reductions are scheduled, as much as possible, when the buildings are at minimum occupancy, such as evenings and weekends.

Normal operations will not be assumed until about two weeks after the miners go back to work. It will require this time for shipments to be delivered and unloaded at the plant.

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FLU SHOTS--PART II

Influenza immunization was made available to Medical Center personnel last week. A number of questions arose, and Dr. Jerry Royer, director of the Student-Employee Health Service, offers the following information:

The central issue: Is influenza immunization recommended? Yes - for certain persons. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Procedures of the U.S. Public Health Service recommends seasonal immunization for persons in the following categories:

1. Persons suffering from chronic health problems, e.g. rheumatic heart disease, chronic asthma, pulmonary tuberculosis, etc.
2. Patients residing in nursing homes, chronic disease hospitals or other such environments where spread of disease may be of greater risk due to living arrangements.
3. Older age groups, i.e. persons over 45 and particularly those over 65.

Seasonal vaccination may also be advisable, when epidemic influenza is forecast, for those groups providing essential community services, and who, through their occupations, are exposed to high-risk situations:

1. Hospital and other health service personnel
2. Public safety personnel
3. Industrial employee groups

Accordingly, the SEHS has provided influenza immunization as a service for the Medical Center personnel.

Because other persons have expressed desire for such immunization, the SEHS will offer influenza immunization again the following times. For non-Medical Center personnel, there will be a charge of \$2 for the immunization.

Persons having known sensitivity or allergy to eggs, chicken, chicken feathers, or chicken dander should not receive such immunization.
