DR. RALPH W. PHILLIPS, Assistant Dean for Research, was in Tokyo in October for meetings of the Japanese Association of Dental Science and the Japanese Association for Technology. He also lectured at three Japanese universities.

Here are some impressions which Doctor Phillips jotted down at the request of the Newsletter:


"Regarding the current rash of student rioting in Japan, one university official told me that this is the first generation of Japanese young people to repudiate their elders. He said that they lost respect for the older generation for two main reasons: (1) being so ill-advised as to get Japan into World War II, and (2) once they were in the war, losing it.

"It seems to be the general feeling there that this lack of confidence and respect for the current generation now in power parallels the basic rationale behind the student unrest in the United States. Several of the dental and medical schools in Japan have been closed for several months but they anticipate opening very shortly. Many of the faculty take turns staying in the building, on a 24 hour basis, in order to protect research and teaching equipment.

"I was quite impressed with the level of dental research at several institutions and of the quality of research and the control of product quality at the larger dental manufacturers -I visited four companies. All of the researchers are intently absorbed in their fields of endeavor and are extremely cognizant of the research activities and peoples throughout the world in general much more than their counterparts in the United States. Most researchers are anxious to come to the United States but have limited or no funds available for such visiting programs.

"The entire country is now geared to the around the world exposition to be held in Osaka starting in March. It is an immense project, which I visited, and gives every evidence of being a successful venture by the Japanese government."
