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Update on plans for the IUSM curriculum

During the March 27 Curriculum Council Steering Committee (CCSC) and the April 13 Executive Committee meetings, Dean Brater announced that it is time, if not past time, to redo the medical school curriculum. He noted that during the recent Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) site visit debrief, members of the LCME review team commented highly favorably on the competency aspects of the IUSM curriculum, but repeatedly mentioned that the rest of our two-plus-two curriculum had remained unchanged for several decades and is now "antiquated." They noted we are missing the opportunity to achieve curricular excellence across the entire scope of the curriculum.

The LCME encouraged integration of basic and clinical sciences through all years of medical school and earlier exposure to clinical practice for the medical students.

Dr. Brater stated that curricular ownership lies in the Dean's office, according to the LCME, and, at IUSM, the executive associate dean for educational affairs is responsible for all educational activities. He charged the EAD for educational affairs with the responsibility and authority for planning, implementing, and evaluating curricular change.

Drs. Brater and Leapman indicated it is logical that the Dean's Office for Medical Education and Curricular Affairs (MECA), as the curricular arm of the Deans Office and the current administrator of the curriculum, be at the forefront of curricular development.

MECA will research curriculum best practices, set timelines and partner with faculty to develop collaborative processes that will result in a stunning, cutting edge curriculum. Diversity in faculty working groups will be essential and it will be expected that contributors to the process will be drawn from all nine IUSM campuses, through all years, and both basic and clinical sciences represented.

Any proposed curricular change or model will pass through the faculty curricular bodies -- CCSC, Curriculum Council Clinical Component, Competency Directors, Component I, II and Academic Standards Committee for input. The EAD for educational affairs and the Dean, in consultation with these primary advisory groups, will provide final approval. The goal is to involve as many faculty members as possible and develop the best ideas and models without sacrificing efficiency.

Dr. Brater also indicated the current model for allocating school resources dedicated to education may need to be reexamined to make sure it is aligned with the new curriculum.

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U.S. News rankings include IUSM primary care, research

Seven Indiana University graduate schools and programs are ranked among the nation's top 25 by U.S. News and World Report magazine in its latest annual report, "America's Best Graduate Schools."

The School of Medicine in Indianapolis improved its ranking in two different areas. It was moved up from 26th to 21st in primary care and moved up one position to 45th in research.

"In these difficult times where fewer and fewer students choose to pursue careers in primary care, we are buoyed by our moving up in the ranks of medical schools," said Dr. D. Craig Brater, dean of the IU School of Medicine. "This will help meet the primary care needs of Hoosiers in the future; similarly, when research funding has never been more competitive, we are relieved to maintain our rank though we are committed to moving up this ladder also. Our success in research translates directly into jobs and economic development for the state, and we aim to do even more."

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Cytogenetic lab adds CGH analysis

The Cytogenetic Laboratories at IUSM has added comparative genomic hybridization (CGH) microarray analysis to its laboratory testing menu. This analysis utilizes a targeted and whole genome distribution of clones including coverage for more than 150 syndromes and extensive density of the pericentric and subtelomeric regions. (Correction: The purpose of the CGH analysis was incorrectly explained in last week's Scope.)

CGH array testing is effective in detecting genomic abnormalities in patients with:

- Mental Retardation
- Developmental Delay
- Dysmorphic Features
- Congenital Anomalies

If chromosome analysis is normal, the American College of Medical Genetics supports CGH testing as the next step in patient care for the evaluation of unexplained mental retardation or developmental delay.

Additionally, CGH microarray testing will advance the laboratory's cytogenetic technology and provide physicians with an opportunity to advance the diagnosis and treatment of their patients.
