IUSM to collaborate on neonatal nursing program

The IU School of Medicine will collaborate with the University of Indianapolis and Riley Hospital for Children at IU Health to implement a new master's degree program to address the growing need to provide intensive care for newborn infants.

The Neonatal Nurse Practitioner program is the only of its kind in the state and includes a mix of classroom instruction, online studies and clinical work in local health care facilities. Hands-on training and observation will take place at Wishard Hospital, IU Health University Hospital and Riley's neonatal intensive care unit.

"For the students to have access to those kinds of clinical experiences is unprecedented," said Anne Thomas, dean of UIndy's School of Nursing. "These new nurse practitioners will be thoroughly prepared to fill the gap in communities that simply don't have enough neonatal physicians to meet the demand."

The program is designed for working nurses, and the instructors will include active pediatricians and nurse practitioners and will lead to a specialized Master of Science in Nursing degree from the UIndy School of Nursing.

The Riley neonatal intensive care unit is one of the largest in the state and one of the top-ranked in the nation.

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Indiana CTSI grants to spur community health projects

The Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute Community Health Engagement Program will provide about \$120,000 in small grants to seven innovative partnership projects between local community groups and researchers at Indiana University, Purdue University and the University of Notre Dame. These partnerships will focus on improving health and health care in neighborhoods across the state.

Projects supported by the Indiana CTSI CHEP pilot grant program involve partners from the Indianapolis Urban League, Safe Kids Indiana, the Indiana Minority Health Coalition, St. Joseph County Minority Health Coalition, La Plaza and HealthNet. They will seek to promote healthy habits, improve awareness on HIV, prevent obesity, curb smoking among expectant mothers, and explore water birth safety.

"We're pleased to provide pilot funding to some of the many talented community groups and researchers who are engaged in improving health and health care throughout Indiana," said Douglas K. Miller, M.D., co-director of the Indiana CTSI CHEP and Richard M. Fairbanks Professor of Aging Research at the IU School of Medicine. "These organizations and the partnerships they represent are the folks who go out in our communities every day to help people across the state experience better health care and achieve healthier lives."

IUSM grant recipients include Joseph O'Neil, M.D., associate professor of clinical pediatrics, IU School of Medicine; Mary Ott, M.D., associate professor of pediatrics; Lisa Staten, Ph.D., associate professor of public health, IU School of Medicine; Sarah Wiehe, M.D., associate professor of pediatrics; Michael Weiner, M.D., associate professor of medicine, IU School of Medicine.

All projects were selected for their strong potential to gain additional support from other agencies after the one-year "cultivation" period provided by the pilot funds. "We see all these projects as the start of long-term collaborations with the Indiana CTSI CHEP program," Dr. Miller said.

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Irwin awarded IU President's Medal for Excellence

Glenn Irwin Jr., M.D., dean emeritus of the IU School of Medicine and chancellor emeritus of IUPUI, received the President's Medal for Excellence from IU President Michael A. McRobbie March 28 during the ground breaking ceremony for the IUPUI Science and Engineering Laboratory Building at the IUPUI Campus Center.

The President's Medal is one of the highest awards the university can bestow and recognizes, among other criteria, distinction in public service, service to IU and extraordinary merit and achievement in the arts, humanities, sciences, education and industry.

Irwin graduated from the School of Medicine in the spring 1944 class, one of the school's two wartime classes that year, which was the result of the school's effort to produce more doctors to serve the troops injured in the war. After serving at the Schofield Barracks Hospital in Hawaii, he joined the faculty at the School of Medicine in 1950 and became dean in March 1965.

As dean, Dr. Irwin began the drive to build IU Hospital in June 1965. He presided during the development of the "Indiana Plan," which called for a coordinated statewide system of undergraduate, graduate and continuing medical education, as well as during projects to enhance and expand Riley Hospital for Children and IU Hospital, and the openings of the Regenstrief Institute and the Ronald McDonald House. He was appointed as chancellor of IUPUI in 1973.

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Glick Eye Institute benefactor dies

Marilyn Glick, who with her husband Eugene supported vision research, clinical care and education by providing the foundation for the Eugene and Marilyn Glick Eye Institute, will long

be remembered for her dream to place Indiana University at the forefront of vision research. She died Friday, March 23, at her home.

"The entire Indiana University community experienced a great loss with the passing of Mrs. Glick," said IU President Michael A. McRobbie. "She led her life by example, finding solutions to problems and challenges that would clearly make the world a better place, and a place that could be seen and enjoyed by all."

The Glicks' gift of \$30 million to Indiana University allowed the creation of an endowment and provided the support necessary for the creation of the Glick Eye Institute, a 77,000-square-foot building that provides clinical space, research labs, educational opportunities and an administrative home for the Department of Ophthalmology at the Indiana University School of Medicine. The gift that allowed for the development of the Glick Eye Institute was the capstone of the couples' philanthropy and the culmination of Mrs. Glick's longstanding interest in vision care and the prevention of blindness.

"It was her wish, indeed, her directive, that cures for blindness and treatments for vision threatening diseases happen at Indiana University and in this building," said Louis B. Cantor, MD, chairman of the Department of Ophthalmology. "She knew that she would not live to see the benefits of this work, but that was her challenge to us. It was something very personal to her, and something directed very much from her heart."

Her philanthropic spirit was part of her DNA. It was who she was," added Dr. Cantor, who knew Mrs. Glick for many years and spoke at her funeral on Monday.

Gregory P. Gramelspacher, MD, professor of medicine, also spoke at the service.

The most widely circulated medical journal in the world, *JAMA* launched its coverage of the presidential campaign with a Jan. 25 blog posting by Dr. Carroll and Boston University health economist Austin Frakt, PhD, on President Barack Obama's State of the Union address.

On Tuesday, March 27, Dr. Carroll weighed in on the Supreme Court's role in health care legislation with a timely post titled <u>"The Other Important Issue Before the Supreme Court: Medicaid Expansion."</u>

Dr. Carroll has been a guest blogger for *The Washington Post* and contributes to CNN.com. He is a frequent guest on *Sound Medicine*, an award-winning radio program co-produced by the IU School of Medicine and WFYI Public Radio. In addition to contributing to The JAMA Forum, he writes on health care policy at his own <u>blog</u>.

Dr. Carroll is director of the IU Center for Health Policy and Professionalism Research, vice chair for health policy and outcomes research in Department of Pediatrics at the IU School of Medicine, and is a Regenstrief Institute-affiliated scientist.

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News to Use

IUSM to implement secure email system

The IU School of Medicine will begin to use Cisco IronPort, a secure email system, to encrypt email containing sensitive data on April 9. This process will ensure that identifiable medical, personal and financial information is protected when it leaves the IU network.

Only IU faculty and staff on the Indianapolis campus will be affected at this time.

Cisco IronPort ensures that email and attachments that appear to contain critical or sensitive data (i.e. social security numbers, driver's license numbers, protected health information, etc.) will be encrypted and held in Cisco's "Registered Envelope Service," where it can then be accessed by the recipient. The process is entirely transparent on the user's end and will not affect users' email interface within the IU system.

Messages also may be encrypted by including the phrase "[secure message]" in the subject line (no quotation marks). Faculty and staff are encouraged to use the function when sending an email containing Protected Health Information or any other critical data in the body or attachments. Do not rely on the automatic scan to catch all critical data.

The new system does not affect IU's privacy policy (<u>IT-07</u>) and does not allow anyone at IUSM and IU additional access to email.

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Masters in Translational Science fellowships — applications due April 15
