MEDICAL ALUMNI TO FETE CLASS OF '37

On May 20 under a big red and white striped tent on the lawn, east of the Union Building, returning School of Medicine alumni will enjoy their annual special strawberry shortcake, dedicate a new courtyard at Riley and learn about the significance of the new Medical Research Center and Library being built on campus. The class of 1937 will receive special recognition on this 40th annual Medical Alumni Day. Participants who will talk about medical facility development on campus include Executive Vice President of IU and President of the IU Foundation George Pinnell, Vice President Gerald Bepko, Dean of the School of Medicine Walter Daly, Chairman of Medical Genetics Dr. Joseph Christian and President of the Eli Lilly Research Laboratories and Executive Vice President of Eli Lilly & Co. Mel Perelman. At 2:30 p.m. an inner courtyard at Riley Hospital for Children will be dedicated in the name of James O. Ritchey, M.D., who was chairman of the IU Dept. of Medicine from 1932-1956. He was the first internist from the state to be elected to a Mastership by the American College of Physicians. He also served for nearly 40 years as chairman of the school's admissions committee. Intended as a haven for patients and staff, the courtyard will include unique plantings that reflect Dr. Ritchey's love of horticulture.



TRUSTEES APPROVED TUITION HIKES FOR ALL CAMPUSES during a recent meeting at IUB. Our undergraduate resident fees are \$58 an hour, up \$4.25 over last year and \$1.60 less than IUB students will pay. Non-residents will pay \$159.50. Graduate fees per credit hour, including the School of Law, are now \$77.80 for Hoosiers, \$212.80 for others. Annual fees for dental students are \$4,300 in-state and \$9,000 for out-of-staters. Annual rates for the School of Medicine are \$4,500 for residents, \$10.500 for non-residents.


