PARTNERS 2000 PROJECT NETS TWO AWARDS AND JOBS FOR 140

A gain this summer, IUPUI was one of hundreds of private and public employers who volunteered to find summer jobs for more than 3,000 young people in the Partners 2000 project, and in doing so gave jobs to 140 low income teens and reaped two awards. Among the top awards given to eight of the 545 participating employers, IUPUI won for the greatest increase over last year, and one of our Partners 2000 people, William Smith, 18, won one of four \$1,000 college scholarships. Smith has worked for two years under the supervision of Angel Fernandez in the audio/visual department in the School of Nursing. Vice President Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., accepted our award and commended supervisors on campus who shared their expertise with the young people. Because of the summer job, many in the program can stay in high school, enter college or the job market. Direction for the Partners 2000 on our campus was managed by Barbara Jones and Maryellen Beckman, both in Personnel.

THE PASSWORD IS GRANTS

A new and unique service provided at no cost to users by Research and Sponsored Programs will be a valuable asset to faculty and staff regarding grant information. Grant/scan* (a menu-driven electronic information system especially designed for the Indianapolis faculty) provides 24-hour access to continually updated grant-related information. It includes topics that will assist in preparing and processing proposals, making budgets and locating funds. Also included are answers to frequently asked questions, a list of printed materials available through Research and Sponsored Programs, as well as dates and locations of grant-related workshops and other instructional programs. GRANT/scan* is on the Indianapolis Computing Services IBM 4381 and can be accessed by a campus terminal (CRT, DECwriter or microcomputer) that is connected to the IU Computing Network. It may also be accessed from any off-campus location by using a microcomputer or terminal equipped with a modem and by dialing (317) 634-7041 for a 1200 baud line or (317) 636-1548 for a 300 baud line. In all cases, the access code is INDY200 and the password is GRANTS. For details on GRANT/scan* and copies of a brief instructional brochure, call Research and Sponsored Programs, Ext. 8285.

SCIENTISTS SAY HUNTINGTON'S SIGNPOST THERE FOR SURE

The presence of a genetic marker for Huntington's Disease has been reaffirmed in a study published in the Aug. 23 issue of "Science." The project included the work of I.U. School of Medicine researcher Dr. P. Michael Conneally, professor of genetics and neurology, who collaborated on the article, along with researchers from Massachusetts General Hospital and Johns Hopkins Hospital. Discovery of the long-sought marker for inheritance of Huntington's, a progressive neurological disorder, was made public in Nov. 1983 by the IU Dept. of Medical Genetics and others. The devastating disorder is characterized by gradually worsening jerky, involuntary movements, dementia, and emotional symptoms including severe depression. Until the discovery of the gene marker, a fragment of DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) called G8, there was no clinical test for the genetic disease. The new research confirms that the test for G8 is at least 95 percent accurate. IU established the world's first DNA bank in 1984, a step toward helping families afflicted with Huntington's and other genetic diseases. After donors give a sample of blood from which DNA is extracted, they and their relatives have a record that might help them in future decisions relating to the disease. Though the gene marker for Huntington's has now been well-established, the search for the actual gene which results in the disorder goes on. "When we find the gene, we'll be able to learn what's gone wrong with it and may be able to fix it," Dr. Conneally said. "It will take a while, but with what we now know it's certainly possible." -- TW
